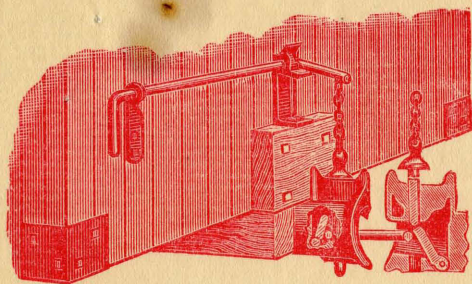
My dear Sir

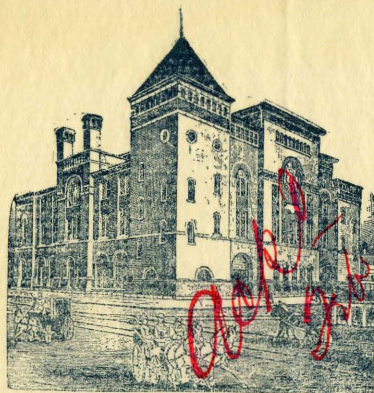
