PROSPECTUS

1. This Company has been formed for the acquisition of the beautiful summer resort known as the "Inch Arran" Hotel, and all the lands connected therewith, together with all the fittings and furnishings of the Hotel and its appurtenances, together with all the fishing rights or privileges controlled by the owners of the property, either in the Province of New Brunswick or the Province of Quebec.
2. The Hotel, but recently erected, substantially built and comfortably furnished, besides spacious drawing rooms, sitting rooms, reading rooms, billiard room, bowling alley, etc., contains 140 large and airy bed-rooms; the kitchen is large and fitted with every modern culinary appliance. The sanitary arrangements are excellent and drainage thorough; there are water-closets of modern style on each floor, and bath rooms supplied with hot, cold and salt water. Notwithstanding the comfortable character of the existing Hotel, such improvements of the property are contemplated as will render it one of the most complete and inviting watering places on the Continent.
3. Inch Arran is half a mile from the Town of Dalhousie, the County seat of Restigouche County, New-Brunswick, which is beautifully situated at the head of the Baie des Chaleurs. Dalhousie is a station on the Intercolonial Railway and is also the terminus for the Mail Steamer which runs between Gaspé and Dalhousie, calling at the several ports on the Baie des Chaleurs. No place on the continent possess more attractions for tourists, artists and health seekers than Inch Arran and its environs; the walks and drives are beautiful and the roads excellent, and in addition to the attractions of the sea, it is surrounded by some of the very finest scenery in Canada, the views from the north side of the Hotel being especially grand.
4. The Hotel stands on a bluff within a few yards of the shore facing the Atlantic Ocean, a carriage drive only separates its broad verandahs from a sandy beach, where bathing can be enjoyed at both high and low tide, with absolute safety, the gradual slope of the beach making it especially favorable for swimming. The place may be indeed called the "Long Branch" of Canada. The air of Inch Arran is free from the dampness which usually characterizes places situated near the sea, and is most bracing and invigorating.
5. The views from the Hotel and its immediate surroundings, namely, from Dalhousie Mountain behind it, from Tracadiegashe Mountain on the opposite shore of the Baie, from the Sugar Loaf Mountain near Campbellton, and from the Morrissey Rock near Metapedia, are of the most attractive character. At every turn the eye rests on some beautiful piece of scenery.
6. The fishing and shooting in the neighborhood and within easy reach are unequalled in America. In the immediate vicinity are the far-famed Restigouche and Metapediac rivers, at the junction of which stands the Lodge of the Restigouche Salmon Club of New York, one of the most aristocratic and wealthiest fishing clubs in the world, Causapsal, the fishing ground of the Marquis of Lorne and the Princess Louise, and the Cascapediac, the favorite fishing resort of His Excellency the Governor-General. And in close proximity are streams teeming with trout, whilst the sea fishing is unsurpassed. Within easy distance, snipe, plover, duck, partridge, brandt, geese and deer, are, in season, to be found in abundance. The facilities afforded for yachting are unsurpassed.
