EDITOR AMERICAN HORSE BREEDER:

I dislike to trouble you upon a subject which does not interest but a few persons, compared to the great number who read the Breeder, and would not have done so at this time had your St. Albaus correspondent, in the article which appeared in the Breeder of Feb. 25, given dates, as he should have done; but as he failed to do so, it is only due me that they should be stated, to show that in my letter of Jan. 7 in the Breeder, page 7, concerning the stailion Allen, I stated facts, as will be seen.

In my letter referred to I stated that if Allen was foaled in 1880 he must have been sired by Morgan Prince (a stallion owned by me at that time, and as will appear later on, it would have been no discredit to him if such had been the fact) and stated my reason for thinking so. Your St. Albans correspondent it seems was in doubt in regard to my statement, and wrote to Mr. Lawrence Brainerd, the breeder of Allen, and ascertained the fact that the dam of Allen was bred to Morgan Prince, and had a foal by him but does not give the date.

him, but does not give the date. Now to make my statement clear and exactly as I asserted it. I may be pardoned for referring to an unsolicited statement from my esteemed friend, Lawrence Brainard, in which he alludes to the matter in the following words, under date of March 3, 1893: "I have seen in the HORSE BREEDER what you say about Allen's breeding. I raised two colts from Nellie, the first a filly, the other Allen, foaled in 1881, both by Star Ethan. Nellie's foal, a filly by Morgan Prince, foaled in 1880, was between the other two and the most promis ing of the three, but she died of distemper at two years old." You will see from the above that I stated simple facts in my letter of Jan. 7, as I intended to do.
