Strong and I visited you at the Art Gallery of your former home and suggested our needs for enlarging our Science building to the amount of \$25000., we thought you exceedingly generous in offering to give a large part of that amount yourself; and you added "let the other fellows do some". We have raised \$10000. which with the highest figure you then named would complete \$25000.

About a year ago when you visited the Observatory here, you were again kind enough to say to me, as you bade me good night at your private coach, that you "would do what you said and maybe more". Now in the absence of Pres. Strong from the state,

it falls to me to tell you that we very much desire to go forward, at once, and make the improvements contemplated in Science Hall. This we cannot do without your aid. Will it be agreeable to you to help us this spring to the extent that you have decided wise and best to do?

In regard to the mountain station I would say that we now have an excellent instrumental outfit, partly new, for the Midvale observations this summer. It has cost us nearly \$1000. We can test that station thoroughly, for we can do No. 1 Visual or photographic work with new instruments. We will be ready to go June 20 if that pleases you.



The Situation Today. Twelve years ago our Scientific School as it then existed was amply accommodated in Williams Hall, which was built in 1880, being the gift of Dr. Edward H. Williams of Philadelphia. Together with the Observatory it is still the work-shop of the scientific departments of the College. It contains the Chemical and Biological laboratories, the philosophical apparatus and the museum.

The Building Outgrown.

But with the growth of students, the enlargement of collections in the museum and the new demands made by the advancement of scientific instruction and the improvement in methods and apparatus, this building has become entirely inadequate to the work in hand.

The Museum is so crowded that our excellent collections of minerals, fossils and animals can only be partially utilized and displayed.

In Chemistry there is only laboratory room for forty students, while over one hundred must be provided for in 1892-3.


The Biological work is similarly crowded. The laboratory is in the basement and accommodates eighteen students, and yet from thirty to sixty must be taught each term.

There is no laboratory for Physics, and the appliances are quite incomplete.

**The Proposed
Addition.**

For several years the enlargement of Williams Hall has been contemplated and the cuts of the building and floor plans below show what is proposed to be done. An addition to Williams Hall is to be built which will then give us the much needed room. When completed this building will afford admirable quarters for the departments of Chemistry and Biology, corresponding to our fine Astronomical Observatory, and temporary provision will be made for the department of Physics.

on its Axis.*




WILLIAMS HALL ENLARGED.


**Can it be
