Dear Sir:-

Acknowledging your telegram of the 31st. ulto., reading as follows:-

"Letter 27th., received. Matter is entirely in your hands. Extend option until May first if you wish to".

Clark's option expires on the 15th. inst. Fifteen days longer will not give him time enough to effect the purchase, or do not imagine he would ask for sixty days: Have wired you as follows:-

"Do not think extension to May first will benefit Clark: He wants sixty days to June 15th. Am disposed to grant it, or will propose May 15th., or June 1st., if you prefer limiting him to shorter time".

Although the property may turn out valuable, the present uncertainty about silver, coupled with the knowledge that I could not expend money in development work, and assuming that you would not be inclined to do so, creates a desire that the property should be disposed of, especially so in my case, as the Estate needs money, otherwise assume from Clark's telegram that he has not succeeded in development work, as he expected, and if he does not take the property eventually, we wish him to put it in such shape that it may be presented to others and for that reason alone, an extension of time to him, such as he asks for, would seem to be policy; still, with good weather, he may accomplish this in a shorter time.
