A few days ago I received a letter, through your secretary, making inquiry as to the objects and purpose of the "American Institute of Civics."

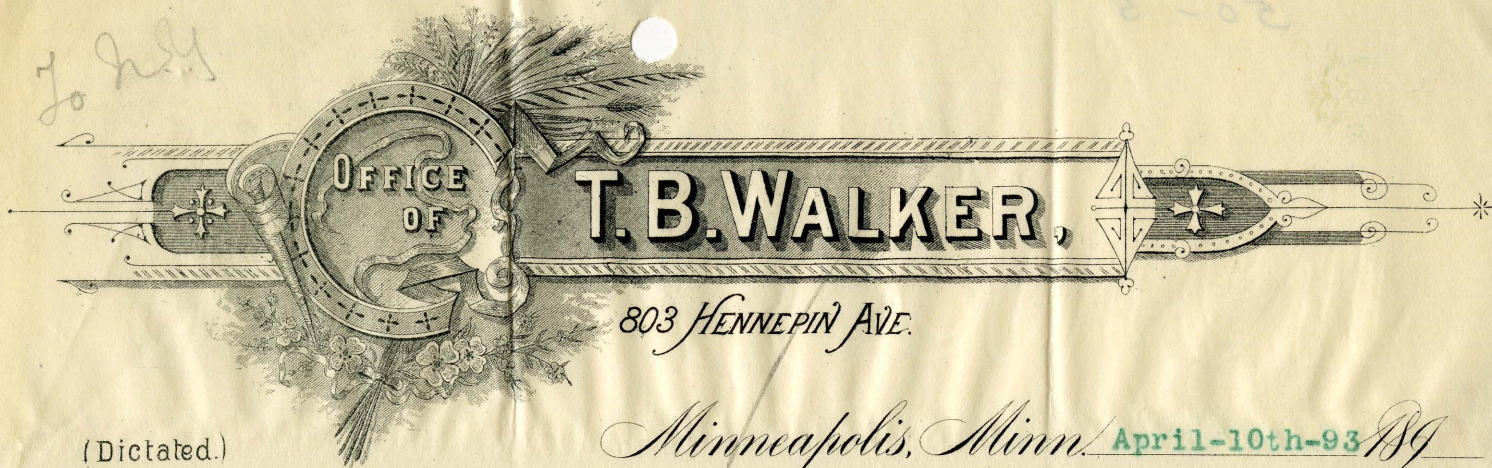
