I have Canvassed the ground all over and can get no better rate than \$3.00 per ton freight from mine to Chicago & this is via the P.C. & St. L. Ry.

We are building a new rail road and are now almost through and ready to connect track with the L.S. & M.S. at Toledo, but the ballasting is yet to do for several miles & may not be complete and ready for trains for from 20 to 60 days, the weather turning in so bad. & even when we are ready to give the L.S. & M.S. Ry. Coal to freight it is a question what rate they will make for Chicago - I hope to ship a great deal of Coal to Chicago via this route. Yet will have to wait & see what can be done.
