Mr Gordon
Came to see yesterday afternoon and
wanted \$1000⁰⁰ on a/c as he starts for St
Paul this A.M. and wishes to make
use of the money there. I did not give
him the money but gave him a note
addressed to Fall parties stating the cargo
would be unloaded Wednesday afternoon
and that I had neither paid the freight or
the 10¢ per ton. There is about 176 tons of
Wool in her yet, and if nothing prevents, we
will have her unloaded about 5 P.M. In
regard to the extra expense in unloading
there and on the coal dock, it is hard
to state positively what it will be, but it is
not much. On the arrival of the vessel
I contracted it at 13¢ supposing she was
to be unloaded at the coal dock. When
we first commenced unloading in cars

shall be embraced. Your letter of the 14th instructs me fully and I see no reason why I should go outside of it. But Griggs

Dec 5th, they wanted more but we told them they must take that or quit but we would furnish men to trim the cars. They went to work and the matter has stood in that shape ~~ever~~ since. When we were obliged to stop I told them after a day or two's hanging around to not come down any more and I would let them know when wanted. The team was hired to hoist at 4^{3/4} per ton. Of course he was dissatisfied when he got down there and could not get to work. On Dec 6th I told him I would pay for the second shoring of his horses and give him \$1.00 an hour or 4^{3/4}. I have not seen him since, as he was out home when I went after him the last time and he has hired men at his horses. The extra shoring would probably be at \$1.00. There will be a difference of about \$3.00 in favor of a \$1.00 an hour and the extra cost of trimming cars will be between \$5 & \$6. I have not refused to settle with Mr Gordon, but I have expressed myself and shown an unwillingness to do so until after the cargo

came last night and has a talk with me, I told Mr Gordon I would only act for you that Mr Jamieson or Griggs or Johnson had sent me to pay them 10¢


