

Only four miles separate these Cities, which embrace the head of navigation of the Mississippi river, the mouth of the Minnesota river, the Falls of St. Anthony, with their two hundred thousand horse power, the renowned Falls of Minnehaha, the State Capitol, the State University, Hamline University, Macalester College, Industrial Institute, and State Reform School, the Financial centre, the Commercial centre, the Manufacturing centre, and the great Railroad Centre of the New Northwest.
