Dear Sir:

On the 24th day of November last, James H. Woolsey and James C. Boyden, late partners as J. H. Woolsey & Co., made a general assignment to me of their joint and separate property for the benefit of their creditors.

The Statute of this State provides that within ten days after such an assignment, the insolvents shall make and file in Court a sworn itemized statement of their assets and liabilities, and that within five days thereafter the trustee shall give a bond in double the amount of the value of the property assigned, conditioned for the proper execution of the trust, the sureties to be approved by the Court. Under this statute an inventory of the debts and trust estate has been made, verified and filed, and I have given the required bond according to law.

The indebtedness of the firm J. H. Woolsey & Co., is, according to above inventory \$33.130.23, and their assets consist of stock on hand, made up of Mill Supplies, Gas Fixtures, Plumbers Steam and Gas Fitters Supplies \$12,020.77. Book accounts and bills receivable \$13,956.43, in all 25,977.20. The item of book accounts does not include some old accounts which stand on their books charged to profit and loss.

I am not as yet familiar enough with their accounts to give an opinion as to their probable value, but I find some of them are from two to five years old. The inventory of the stock has been made upon the basis of their present trade value, less in some cases, a discount for shop wear, &c.

At the time the assignment was made, Messrs. Woolsey & Co., issued a letter to their creditors giving them reason to hope that there would be no loss, and as the assets turn out to be much less and the indebetedness more than they seemed to expect, I feel it but justice to myself, the creditors, and Messrs. Woolsey & Co., that the creditors should have an opportunity to fully and freely look into and examine the whole matter, if they choose to do so; therefore, I propose to wait a reasonable time before doing anything that will materially change the position of the assets so as to make such an examination either difficult or unsatisfactory.

The depressed state of business and the fact that Saw Mills and Machinery of almost every kind is shut down for the winter, and the season for the sale of much of the other goods being past, any one acquainted with the business will realize the difficulty of finding ready sale for the stock unless a purchaser could be found for the whole or for each class of the stock in bulk, while a forced sale at auction would probably result in too great a sacrifice. I desire to handle this whole business so that the creditors will feel that no part of their loss can be attributed to me, and to that end I ask that you will either in person or by some agent make an examination of the actual condition of all matters in my hands, within the next fifteen days, and meanwhile I would like to hear promptly from the creditors as to what course they would like me to take.
