My Dear Sir;

Your favor of 9<sup>th</sup> inst  
came to hand this AM.

I am detained here  
still by the protracted illness of Mrs B but as she  
is now convalescent I hope to go to Vesper by the  
14<sup>th</sup> without fail. In the meantime I am trying  
to profitably occupy the time in getting the Rail-  
road matter before the people of the several Counties  
in the manner or to the effect as suggested by  
you - which I had anticipated and already taken  
such steps as will no doubt result in favorable  
Newspaper articles and letters from the prominent  
men of each County. I "open the ball" at Ft D  
this week, and next week expect to reach every  
Newspaper in the seven (7) Counties in interest,  
which will be the basis of letters from the best  
men of each locality. These letters will be addressed  
to you or Willins, as you direct. Please let me  
know your choice in that regard.

The reason of my  
telegram to you was that Grayson & Father got  
notice of trouble from Mrs Woods and both were  
in bad mood and took me rather severely to  
task. Father saying "that he had embarrassed

himself to aid me, had compromised himself with his friends, and then given me advantages with which I had represented that I could get relief for myself and him - that after frequent postponements I had yet failed to do anything and that he was weary of the matter". I could not blame him. So I telegraphed you and on your assurance he was pacified.

The reason I ordered seeds was this. I know that the land is good coal land and we need it and as it has to be got by piece-meal I had better commence. He could not order it in one seed - 600 acres - too much - and will require three or four purchases to gather it all in - which will consume two or three months - for this reason and the likelihood of our wanting to seed it within 60 days I thought best to begin and therefore ordered the North half of the section (less the 40 acres Marsh owns, i.e. N.E. of N.E.) or 280 acres @ 10<sup>00</sup> with \$500<sup>00</sup> only to be paid cash. balance in 5 annual payts. The remainder of the fee and fee 17 or 20 we can order after 1<sup>st</sup> June. I hope this will meet your approval.

I hope Hillius will enable us to carry out our scheme concerning the West side lands. if he dont some one else will no doubt.

If you refer to my letter which I sent with the Census Reports you will see

that Father feels confident that \$5,000<sup>00</sup> per mile  
can be gotten along the proposed Road.

Stevens is this week at work on fee 17 and I  
hope with success.

In case you wish me to meet  
you at Chicago on your return please telegraph  
me a day or so in advance so if I am at the  
Mines I will have time to get around.

While in Chicago  
we might call on Bullock, and also stop at  
Madison, It is a day and see the Machine  
made there.

I will be ready to go to C or St P  
any time after 14<sup>th</sup> inst when you send word.  
good luck in all things
