

month I am bound with order's ready a dozen of
them, as you will see of good weather I'd like
to have plenty to do if you can do so, however
Nature you know more faithful either to rain or not

Yours of 14th at hand. Am sorry we can't
make the connected round-trains in coal cars. Haven't yet sold
quite enough to clear off the freight acct. which you know
amounts to considerably more than the original cost of the
coal at Duluth. The fact is I am somewhat disappointed at
the result of the coal trade ~~thus far~~ but still think it will pay
all right. In ordering I calculated on an increase of 50 per cent
over last ~~season~~ judging by past experience. I don't know how but this
was too much. The cars were also loaded heavier than I had expe-
cted which added over 50 tons to my intended order.

We are likely to carry over from 15 to 20 tons of branched &
possibly 50 to 100 hard coal. The Blacksmith will all be sold
before or by spring - as there is a gradual but more steady trade -

Money is so tight that people hold off buying coal to the
last minute. I know at least a half doz people who have coal
stoves & no coal that have not been down as yet - & as many
more who have recently purchased coal stoves & must have
coal to burn in them. Others who have bought have may taken
half a supply expecting to replenish later -
