I rec<sup>d</sup> your letter from Mr Rhodes requesting me to render him an account of sales of the coal at this point. As I don't know anything about purchases in this matter but am dealing directly with you. I simply wrote him a polite reply - put him off for a few days.

The coal trade did not pan out here last winter as expected. That was mostly on account of the sickness of the winter. though I think we got a little too much coal anyway.

I now propose to return you of this coal because if you are willing I should do so - That is I will take the coal on hand here & pay you the balance which stands on your ledger against it - To do this I would have to ~~take the~~ borrow the money (not for I think from #1700-) on the security of the coal & not realize on it before November -

This is our agreement in a modified form. As the first agreement was that all sales were to be applied to pay for the coal balance against me. In this case I will raise the money in advance of sales & look up for it myself. Should you consent to this transaction I would likely want to make some arrangements to get from #75 to 100 tons to add to that on hand in order to be able to

I would bring the money I have with me (last of next week)  
& square up the whole business.

Should you consent to this transaction, I would likely want to make some arrangement to get from 75 to 100 tons add to that on hand in order to be able to guarantee a supply to all consumers who saw fit to deal with me.

If this is satisfactory and you will say so by telegraph I would bring the money down with me last of next week, and square up the whole business.
