Dear Sir - I went to St Paul last week brim full of a scheme of my own to make a little money out of the Assiniboine trade. It was to buy the "Deekins" myself, with a certain friend of mine as a bailiwick partner - if he would consent to back an arrangement and keep me with the purchase - & form a connection with McArthur & Co. the "Deekins" & Marquette have the Assiniboine trade. I hoped some such arrangement might be made - from the fact - that Mr K & Yrue have more than once intimated to me - that after the Railroad was built, if there was any chance to squeeze a little money out of the old boats - I should have shown - but that to me - good time that I have been looking & hoping for - seems to recede & keep as far distant as ever. The above mentioned programme was based on the expectation that the "Winnipeg & Western T. Co." would be called on to do the R.R. business from St. Vincent another year - & as it would take three or four two passengers & one ton boat - to do that business they would have nothing left, adapted to or capable of accommodating the Assiniboine business - as the Alpha is wholly out of date & inadequate in power or capacity to meet the growing demands of this trade - But as you seem to think the R.R. business will take different shape before spring - My programme for the Assiniboine (as mentioned above) would probably be

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rendered impractical. As the W & W T. Co would then have at least one good boat to spare for business work.

As to the Saskatchewan, if any extensions being should be contemplated in that stream - it should be started on a good foundation right from the beginning. New boats of sufficient power & capacity built. None of our boats have either power or capacity for that river. For myself I should hate to be obliged to go so far into the wilderness to make my living or even to make money if I had a chance - but I will not anticipate any offers of that kind - it will be true enough for me to give my views when asked -

I find the river here has stopped falling - in fact we had a slight shore ice here of two or three inches caused from local rains - but not enough to favorably affect navigation.

I want all our boats in winter quarters by the 25<sup>th</sup> Dec (five weeks from now). & propose to cut down winter expenses to the minimum. We are hardly paying expenses. I can't afford to take chances in the ice - for what little good we might do the R. R. Co in the way of moving freight which would be but a few tons at best & only help you for a week or less - for if we could now tell Christmas the same trouble would exist - it would be better to make some arrangement for winter storage - Yours truly, F. Dear Sir:

I went to St. Paul last week brim full of a scheme of my own to make a little money out of the Assinabome Trade. It was to buy the Selkirk myself with a certain friend of mine as a silent partner -(if he would consent to such an arrangement and help me with the purchase) and from a connection with McArthur and let the Selkirk and Marquette have the Assinabome Trade. I hope some such arrangement might be made from the fact that Mr. K. and you have more than once intimated to me that after the R.R. was built, if there was any chance to squeeze a little money out of the old boats I should have a show. That to me - good time that I have been looking & hoping for - seems to keep in as far a distance as ever. The above mentioned program was based on the expectation that the W. & W. T. Co. would be called on to do the R.R. business from St. V. another year, and as it would take three boats, two passenger and one tow boat, to do that business, they would have nothing left adapted to or capable of accommodating the Assinabome Trade, as the Alpha is wholly out of date and inadequate in power or capacity to meet the growing demands of that trade. As you seem to think the R. R. business will take different shapes before spring, my program for the Assinabome (as mentioned above) would probably be rendered impractical. As the W. & W. T. CO. would then have at least one good boat to spare for Assinabome work.

As to the Sascatchuwan - if any extensions boating should be contemplated in that stream, it should be started on a good foundation right from the beginning, (new boats of sufficient power and capacity built). None of our boats have either power or capacity for that river. For myself I should hate to be obliged to go so far into the wilderness to make my living or anticipate any offers of that kind, it will be time enough for me to give my views when asked

Dear Sir:

Enclosed I hand you an account sent me by Messrs Robinson and Cary all of which except the item of \$62.21 for Steam Hose fittings (to connect our Cyphons with the boilers) is for use; fittings and freight on pumps - one of which we could not use, and the other with which we pumped out and raised the Manitoba. This bill is more than I expected and as you made the arrangement, I refer it to you before paying; we will pay it as it is or with any reduction you may be able to get made on it.

The "Manitoba" is completed & in the water in good shape there may be some slight repairs to her machinery and fire walls, also a very little joiner work but nothing of any consequence. All the damage caused by sinking is repaired in better shape than it was before, and the expense of everything from the day she sunk up to yesterday - (except Robinson and Cary's bill) is now \$2290.00. There may be a few small bills yet out, but I don't know of any, certainly nothing that could add \$50 to the above amount; so I think my guess of \$2500.00 was not far out of the way.

Our Navigation weather holds out well, we have prospects of one more full week, though the nights are very cold and six in. of snow has fallen only forty or fifty miles west of here. We are taking at present the Emerson & Winnipeg freight from cars at St. V. as fast as offered, but of course you won't rely on much (if any) help from us after Nov. 1st. There is great complaint here of man. of the Pembina Branch, & when it freezes up, with no water tanks Hell will be to pay.

We have beat the McLenegan Gang Lyons - Law Suits in the matter of sinking the barge "Chippewa" last season - on the second trial which they obtained this time before a jury, and you may rest assured this old man feels pretty proud. Will probably be in St. Paul by the 15th. of Nov.
