The Park Service Department were quite willing to concede the reasonableness of our request for an increase in hotel rates. It will raise our rates an average of \$.50 a day.

They also allowed Mr. Noffsinger an increase of \$.50 a day on horse rates and the Transportation Company an increase of \$2.00 on a round trip from Glacier Park to Many Glacier, and \$.50 on the Two Medicine trip.

The new rates have been incorporated in the attached circular, which is being sent out by the Passenger Department.


Dear Sir:


Mr. L. W. Hill:-

Referring to your memo. of the first instant, re tornado insurance for Glacier Park.

No insurance of this character is available, excepting upon the basis of co-insurance, that is, the company would have to guarantee the values upon which the insurance premium is calculated to be a certain percentage of the total value, failure to do this making the company also an insurer to the extent of such failure. Quotations are made for various percentages of co-insurance from 90 down to 50, the higher the percentage of co-insurance the smaller the proportional rate.

Taking the 50% co-insurance for an illustration and using the three-year rate, the cost of the tornado insurance would be about \$2,400.00. The wind loss for the past three years aggregates approximately \$3,000.00.

Please say if you wish to have tornado insurance placed. If so, I will work out the best possible plan and put it into effect.
