## MARCONI'S WIRELESS PHONE IS A SUCCESS

(By Associated Press.)

Rome, May 17.-Wireless telephone communication over a distance of 500 miles with apparatus of a strength of only three kilowatts has been achieved by William Marconi, the Italian inventor, he announced here upon his return from a cruise in the Atlantle and Mediterranean on board the vacht Tiectral. Signor Marconi said he regarded it a greater success than those which have been attained in speaking with a stronger apparatus for a distance of 1,000 miles.

Another experiment carried out on board the Electra was the use of a "radio gonometer," with the aid of which it was possible to navigate to Cape Finisterre during a heavy fog. Signor Marconi said the radio gonometer made it possible to approach within a short distance of the rocks
