The hotel has 10 bed rooms, lobby, dining room and kitchen. The studie has 5 bed rooms, and a large room upstairs, with skylight. The cottages each have 3 bed rooms, and a sitting room. The dormitory has 24 bed rooms and a large lobby - all bed rooms having hot and cold water. The bed rooms in the plant total 45, containing 39 double and 40 single beds.

The buildings are in very good shape, considering the small amount of maintenance. The roofs need a small amount of repair work, and probably a coat of stain would help the appearance on the outside, but even as they are, they are in very good condition. The buildings are plastered inside, - the plaster being in very good shape, not cracked, and has not fallen down. Undoubtedly the appreciation in building costs would more than off-set any depreciation that has taken place.

This highway probably will be completed in two or three years.
