Dear Sir:

The Revenue Act of 1924 has repealed Section 602 of the Revenue Act of 1921, which provided for a tax upon beverages. This repeal is effective upon the enactment of the new law, which was signed June 2, 1924.

Paragraph 5 of Section 800 (a) of the Revenue Act of 1921 has been amended by adding thereto the following sentence:

"Where the amount paid for admission is fifty cents or less, no tax shall be imposed."

This amendment is effective on and after July 3, 1924. Under the new law, twenty per cent. of the amount paid for refreshment service and merchandise at any roof garden, cabaret or other similar entertainment, is regarded as a charge for admission. Where the total charge for refreshments, etc., is \$2.50 or less, the amount regarded as a charge for admission would be fifty cents or less and no tax would be payable. Where the charge for refreshments, etc., is more than \$2.50, a tax of one and one-half cents for each ten cents of the admission charge (twenty per cent. of the refreshment service) is payable. This provision would seem to make it necessary to compute the tax on each individual charge slip, instead of on aggregate receipts.



Dear Sirs:

We have just received copy of the Appropriations Act for the Department of the Interior for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1925. This contains the following appropriation:

"Glacier National Park, Montana: For administration, protection, and maintenance, including necessary repairs to the roads from Glacier Park Station through the Blackfeet Indian Reservation to various points in the boundary line of the Glacier National Park and the international boundary, including not exceeding \$3,200 for the purchase, maintenance, operation, and repair of horse-drawn and motor-driven passenger-carrying vehicles for the use of the superintendent and employees in connection with general park work, \$145,000; for construction of physical improvements, \$136,000, including not exceeding \$100,000 for the continued construction of the transmountain road connecting the east and west sides of the park, and not exceeding \$7,400 for the construction of buildings; in all, \$281,000."
