St. Paul, Minnesota, September 22, 1925.

Mr. Hill:

Just before you went away you spoke about proper place for planting the lot of peonies ordered from Mr. Miller for delivery this Fall, and mentioned particularly that you considered ground now occupied by tree nursery in the greenhouse lot would be the most likely place. You also mentioned it might be best to have Mr. Reed of Holm & Olson Landscape Department handle the transplanting of nursery stock as well as planting peonies when they are delivered, in order to have the "job done right".

I talked with Mr. Reed in a general way on this subject, and he tells me it would not be practicable to remove the tree nursery this fall in time to plant the peonies where the nursery now is located; neither would it be good policy to plant the peonies in that location without first growing a grain or vegetable crop in that soil, because the nursery stock having occupied the soil for several years will have used up the vitality, and first growing a grain or vegetable crop and providing fertilizer for it, would be instrumental in insuring a better success with peonies.

I inquired whether soil on which potatoes were raised this season would be satisfactory to plant the peonies this fall, and Mr. Reed informed me it would.

In view of the above, is it your desire that the poenies be planted in the space where potatoes were grown this year, and do you wish Mr. Read to handle the peony planting instead of having Schulenburg (our greenhouse man) do the work?

Mr. Reed tells me that the poplar nursery stock could be transplanted this fall, but the work should not be undertaken until after the first heavy frost. In this connection, I believe you spoke to Mr. Reed before going to California, outlining in a general way, some of your views regarding where you wish the nursery stock placed, that is along fence lines, along the water board ditch between Charles Lake and Pleasant Lake, etc. Mr. Read mentioned your talk, but before going ahead, he would with more specific instructions, and for that reason it seems best for him to call sometime at your convenience. For your information, he will be available all of today, and between the hours of 10:00 A.M. and 3:00 P.M. tomorrow.

P.S. On the lile attached, you have notation to send 4500 peonies to the farm, and 500 to Glaciel Park, and to natify Dishmaker. I understand Dishmaker is at present on the Kalispell Division, looking after some tree planting work, and could readily go to the park to look after planting of the peonies there, and in case you have the lot of 500 shipped there, Mr. Miller can have the 500 lot ready almost any time you wish shipment made.
