DESCRIPTION OF PROPOSED HOTEL SITE - WATERTON LAKES PARK.

All that part of the N. E. $\frac{1}{4}$, Section 23, and the S. E. $\frac{1}{4}$,

Section 26, Township 1, Range 30, West of Fourth Meridian,

Province of Alberta, situated between the present Govern-

ment Road and the shore line of Waterton Lakes, as outlined

in red on attached blue print.

Concerning proposed hotel site at lower end of Waterton Lakes,
Alberta:

I had a second meeting with Mr. J. B. Harkin, Commissioner of Dominion Parks at Ottawa on the 5th instant. Mr. W. D. Cromarty, who is the Acting Superintendent of the Waterton Lakes Park, was also present.

I believe there is no question but what we will be granted a permit for the land required, about as shown on the attached plat, aggregating about sixty acres. They explained that a strip of land 100' in width would be reserved for public use all along the lake shore, but that no other parties would be given a permit on this strip, except it might be to put in a boat landing. Also that any boat landings that we might want on this 100' strip could be covered later by special permit.

They explained that a small area in the South-west corner of the site we desire would have to be reserved for an automobile park for public use; also that the Northerly part of Linnet Lake would have to be reserved account of the use made of it for bathing by the public.

While they were not prepared to say just how much of an area would have to be reserved for these purposes, I gather from our talk that they would give us a permit for about what I have shown outlined in red on the plat.

They asked us to make application on the standard form, per copy

attached. If we can have our Canadian Hotel Company organized in time, application should be made in its name, but otherwise application can be made in your name, and later the permit can be made out to the correct name of the Hotel Company we expect to organize, or if the permit is made out to you, it can be transferred to such Hotel Company.

This application should be forwarded to Mr. J. B. Harkin, Commissioner of Dominion Parks ^{of Canada} at Ottawa, and a plat should be attached showing what we want, and a letter written outlining what we have in mind erecting in the first instance, and about how we would add to it later as growth of business warranted.

I believe prompt action should be taken in making the application so as to get the permit as soon as possible.

This application is made to secure a lease of proper lands at the lower end of Waterton Lakes, in Waterton Lakes Park, on which to construct and operate a hotel of the same general character as the hotels now operated by the Glacier Park Hotel Company in Glacier Park, U. S.

If a lease is granted it is the intention to organize a Canadian Company to construct and operate the hotel.

The expectation would be to construct a group of buildings connected together where advisable, so as to provide for all of the requirements of a large tourist hotel as now found necessary at the National Parks in Canada and United States.

Frame, or log construction, with considerable stone work and concrete, or masonry foundations, would be used. It would be desired to secure from adjacent points in the Park any suitable building materials that could be used to advantage in these buildings.

The first installation would provide lobby, dining room and kitchen of sufficient size to take care of about 400 guests, and ^{Annexes} ~~dormitories~~ of about 120 guest rooms, arranged so that additional ^{Annexes} ~~dormitories~~ could be added from time to time as business required.

Other buildings, such as recreation halls, help's dormitories, garage, etc. would be erected.

A boat landing would be provided along Waterton Lakes and a bath house on Linnet Lake.

A private road connecting with the main Government Road to properly serve the hotel buildings would be constructed.

The grounds around the various buildings would be improved.

The approximate cost of the work to be carried out for the first installation, as above roughly outlined, would be about \$500,000.00.

Work on plans would be started at once, and materials arranged for as promptly as possible, so that construction could be carried out during the 1926 season and be ready to start operation at the beginning of the 1927 season.

It is considered that all the land covered by this application is necessary to provide for a proper grouping of the buildings, the enlargement and extension thereof from time to time as required; the construction of private driveways to reach and serve all of the buildings, and for access to both Waterton Lakes and Linnet Lake.

It would be the intention to operate this hotel in conjunction with the hotels of the Glacier Park Hotel Company, featuring it in all of the advertising matter gotten out from time to time, the same as is done now for Glacier Park.



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
