Dear Walter:

I have your note of May 24 regarding  
the contemplated Waterton Lake Hotel.

While the site is in every way desirable, we find they have not constructed satisfactory roads to reach it - either from Glacier Park station via Babb, or from Belton via the North Fork of the Flathead. Both these roads are very simple to locate and construct. Neither have they a road from the proposed site to the Belly River on the Canadian side, nor a road from the Canadian boundary South to the various lakes and attractive scenery in the Belly River section of Glacier National Park. Without these we could not hope to operate a hotel. Practically all we have is a freight road from Lethridge and a heavy grade mail route road from Pincher Creek.

It is also likely that it would be more economical to put in a small mill - as there has been one on Waterton Lake - and manufacture our lumber there. The principal problem on this would be permission to do the logging; the trees are available but the

question is to secure permission to cut them.

Therefore with all this uncertainty, we have decided to await the development of roads and highways before making the large expenditure, which might stand more or less idle, as some of our Glacier Park developments have for want of suitable roads and trails - which we have waited for for years and we are still waiting.

I hope something else will come up in which your firm might be interested but the Waterton project seems to be postponed for a year and probably more.

**TWO MEDICINE:** Miss Julia A. Roney - age 53. Miss Roney has been with us as Manager here for the past five years. She has been very successful in managing our camps, and during the winter months she is engaged in boarding young women students at the Minnesota University.

**CUT BANK:** Mr. and Mrs. T. E. Rhoads - ages 45 years. This is their first season with us. Mr. Rhoads has been a cook for twelve years and has operated a small sixty room hotel about five years at Perry, Iowa. Mrs. Rhoads has assisted him in cooking. **SUN CAMP:** Mrs. Bertha Barley. This is Mrs. Barley's third season with us. The last two seasons I believe she made a decided success as Manager at Sun Camp. Mrs. Barley has also spent one or two seasons at Yellowstone under Mrs. Underwood. She has also managed the cafeteria at the Johnson High School, this city, until this past winter when she went to Omaha to manage, and re-organize the J. L. Brandeis & Sons' Tea Rooms.

Mr. W. P. Kenney:

I learned of a situation at Waterton Lake in connection with the Canadian government irrigation program that you may be familiar with, but feel it safe to call your attention to it. I met a representative of the Legal Department of the United States Reclamation Service on a Great Northern train a few days ago. I have forgotten his name. He was going to Malta to meet Mr. Gilman. He told me the Canadian government had taken up with the United States authorities the question of getting permission to dam the lower end of Waterton Lake in order to use the water so impounded on a new irrigation project they have in mind in Alberta in return for which they would permit the United States to use a larger volume of the flow of the St. Mary's waters in the Milk River project in Montana.

It occurs to me that if this went through it might effect the desirability of Waterton Lake as a hotel site.
