Dear Sir:---

Received the eleven boxes peonies at Glacier Park, O. K. in fine condition are very nice divisions, some running as high as seven and eight eyes. Planting them starting near the border of the walk south of the tree patch in front of the Hotel, continuing around the tree patch up to the drive in front of the hotel and dining room and around the north and east sides of the grounds as per drawing herewith, this planting will take about 1100, then to correspond with the pink peonies we put in front of the dining room, we are running a bed of pink peonies down the drive in front of the sun parlor, this bed will take about 125, putting about 200 in a large bed east and south of the annex, and the rest along the main walk, we are allowing room so we can put an edging of iris in front of the peonies.

We are spacing the peonies nearly three feet, they should do very well there and will give the grounds a lot of color, the beds are from five to six and seven rows wide.

My dear Mr. Budd:

I am greatly pleased with your letter of October 20th in regard to the Indian lands east of Glacier Park and between the park and the new road. Your idea about letting the Indians have complete title to the timber strikes me as feasible in every respect and its logic is unassailable.

I am leaving for the east on November 6th and I will arrive in Washington on the 10th. One of the things that I am going to give a great deal of attention to in Washington is this question of boundary revision, as the more I think about it, the more I feel that it is one of the most important if not the paramount problem confronting us in Glacier Park. It is likely that I will come back from Washington by way of Saint Paul and if I do, I will stop and see you. I will probably be on my way to Glacier Park to conduct a hearing on the west side on the origin of the big fires. I want to give all the malcontents and general objectors and critics an opportunity to get everything off their chests that they are harboring against Glacier Park and its administration. Ordinarily we would not be interested in this sort of thing but there is so much criticism being leveled at the park that we thought we had better give it a chance for a public hearing to prevent further spread of local antagonism. We have found that we get along a lot better if we can have the local people with us rather than against us although, of course, we never change fundamental policies to please local people.

You can still reach me here up until November 6th.
