The Southview Golf Club near South St. Paul, eighteen holes, has 126 acres of land, which cost \$300 per acre. The greens are sand. About \$3,000 was spent constructing the greens and putting the course in order. The cost was low because the land was originally a pasture field and did not need much preparation for seeding. An old barn was remodelled into a club house with toilet facilities, lockers, etc., for about \$2,500.

Following is the cost of two of the municipal courses constructed by the Minneapolis Park Board within the past two years:

ARMOUR COURSE - 18 holes, 155 acres, cost \$1000 per acre.

Grading, seeding, and planting, tees, fairways, and greens	\$24,500/ 15,318/ 10,500/ 2,500/
Architects and engineer's fees	2,250
Total, excluding land	\$55,068

MEADOW BROOK COURSE - 18 holes, 207 acres, cost of land \$80,000

Grading, etc	\$19,500
Water system	14,500
Buildings	12,400/
Equipment	3,050
Architect's and engineer's fees	2,900
Total, excluding land	\$52,350

The difference in the cost of grading, etc., is due to the lie of the land.

The upkeep of the Armour Course from April to \square November last year was \$20,898.

Ordinarily an eighteen hole golf course can be laid out on from 100 to 125 acres if there is no waste.
