Referring to our previous correspondence regarding the Cardston-Waterton road:

I am in receipt of the following letter from Prime Minister J. E. Brownlee, dated at Edmonton, June 17th:

"I duly received your telegram of the 13th instant, and have today received your letter of the same date.

"I previously reported to the Executive Council the results of our negotiations at Calgary, and the agreement was ratified by the Executive Council. Upon receipt of your wire I immediately communicated with the Department of Public Works, and as a result Engineers are being sent out at once for the sake of doing the necessary location work, and the Department will see that everything is done to expedite the work as soon as possible."

The matter of executing a formal contract will be handled by our Attorney at Lethbridge, Mr. A. B. Hogg, who will report to Mr. Dorety.

I assume that Mr. Hogeland will follow up with Mr. O. L. McPherson, Minister of Public Works, the details of road construction.

I think from this letter and from a communication I have received from Senator Buchanan the work on the road is being expedited, and we may expect it to be completed as soon as conditions will permit.

Referring to our conversation regarding post cards of the Prince of Wales Hotel:

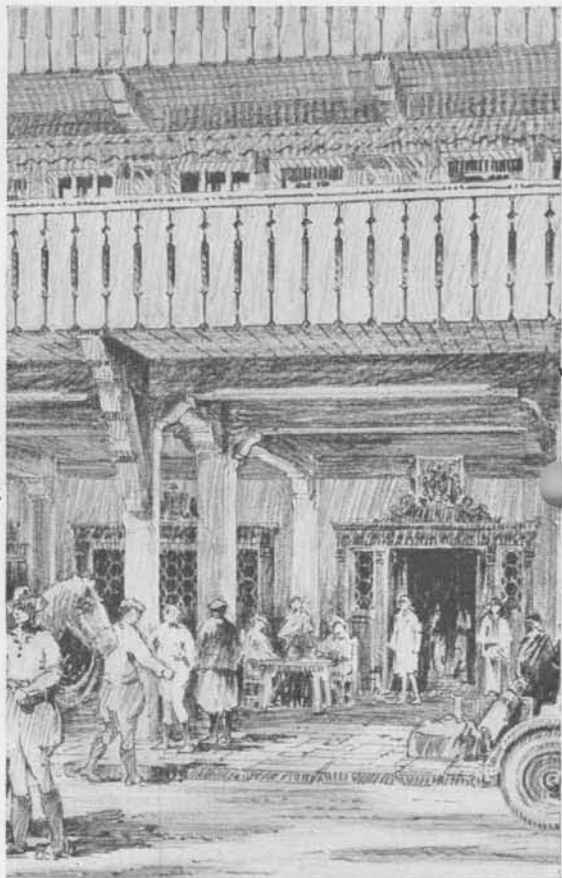

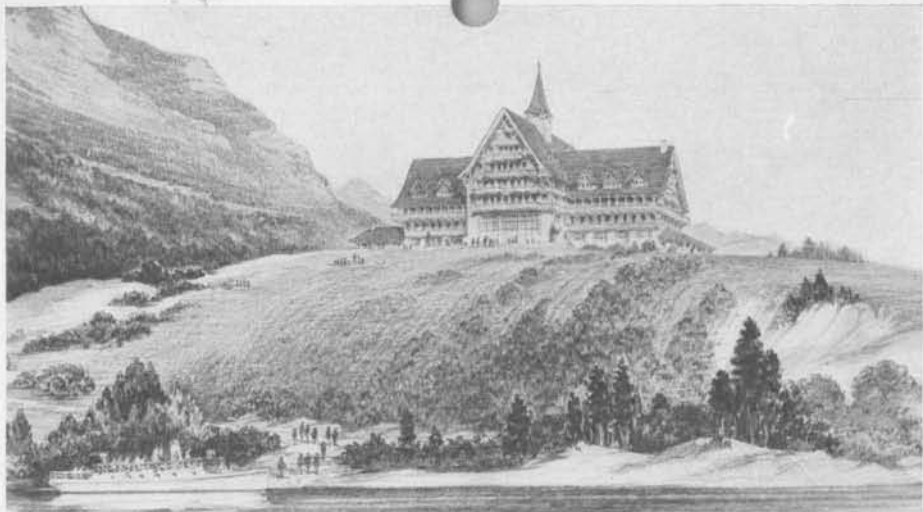

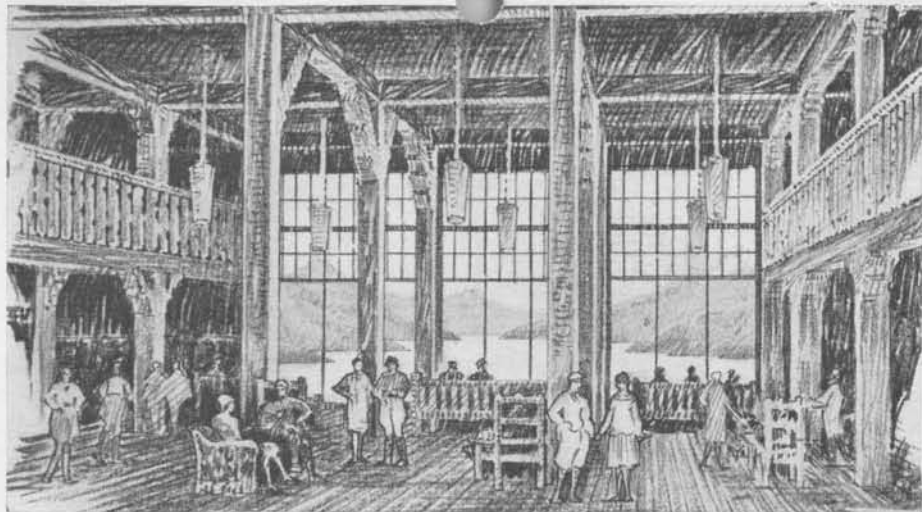

We have on hand at the hotel, sixteen 2-1/2-gallon pump type non-freezing fire extinguishers, which are the property of the Hotel Company.


Dear Sir:
