A license was received some two weeks ago by Captain Harrison from the Alberta Liquor Control Board to operate such a sales room. A room 14' x 48' referred to on the plans as the "East porch", being the extreme east end of the first floor of the building, has been prepared for such beer sales room, and is now in service.

There has also been partitioned off a space in the basement directly under this room with an ice box, etc. for beer storage.

I am asking Assistant Engineer Parker to take up with Mr. Hogg to see whether it is necessary to furnish a plan of this layout, and if so, to prepare and submit same to Mr. Hogg promptly.

Pobble Beach, Cal., Aug. 12,1927. Mr. Noy Childs Jones of Toltz, King & Day, c/o Howard Hoble, Glavier Park, Montana. Dear Mr. Jones: Returning the pencil ekstches for annexes and taproom for new Prince of Wales Hotel: Plam B & C makes the taproom too prominent and too near the Hotel Lobby, etc., also too near bedrooms and dormitory passages. There might be a in many parts of the hotel; also taproom should be on north side available to public without entrance or exit via Hotel. Also north side new road for convenience ice and supplies. I believe all the plans crowd the main building too closely, so I have suggested modification of Plan "A" as per enclosed rough sketches. First: Ground layout on contours-Borth armax is moved Bortheast so that it takes advantage of contours and puts taproom on ground level by very little excavation. Floor level taproom to be about 4320. Service room same. Storage room 4324. Taproom to be of stone arches or wood, etc. Taproom entrance reached by covered walk 8 feet wide, open at sides. This amer could have three full floors of bedrooms, and as the longth is increased to about 172 feet would make about 24 rooms with bath, lat floor; e Srd 23 13 22 70 POOMS. With a more practical roof plan there should be more rooms on 3rd floor (without baths, many more). Considering shortness of season and difficulty and expense of operation, so far from markets, supplies, etc., I am very certain we should consider the practical more than the architecturally artistic features. By that I mean, in addition to lower and more practical roofs, eliminate all fireplaces, too much fire risk and increases insurance rates. My suggestion provides ample space connecting two annexes where room for pass. &freight elevator with stairs around (possibly fireproof or nearly so) and in addition other stairways at west end door of each dormitory. There should be outside balconies on every floor for every room connected with stairways and hand rails, not ladders. All this

(8-12-1927) Roy Childs Jones -2 for additional opportunity to make exit from any room or part in case of fire, etc. You will note the space connecting new addition with present building is of large dimensions, 32 X 80. This will be useful space and can at any time later be partially partitioned off if desirable. It is the best place for soda, ice cream, etc., as it is available to the public by direct north door without passing through Main Hotel, etc. Also note location of dance hall, which, like taproom, is a nuisance if too near on account music and noise for guests who wish quiet, etc. This bridge or connection 32x80 between present Hotel and proposed annex need only be one story with as flat a roof as practical, with possibly a sharp pointed tower in center. Dance hall, etc. about 48X64, one story only and skylight. Hall to be also used for conventions, movie shows, church services. Note the south or smaller annex that's below the 4320 countour line, so that with very little excavation one-half or more of its length could be made available for rooms for any purpose; probably perfectly good for hotel guests. This would add 8 or 10 rooms to the 124 already provided for and this would be increased by 10 or 12 more if more practical roof used, so as not to make this entire 3rd floor of both annexes all Dormer bedrooms. The space on 1st floor connecting 2 annexes provides amply for Barber shop, Beauty Parlor; women's small toilet and washwoom off Beauty Parlor, also elevator and stairs around, and 2 additional stairs at each end plus unassigned space available for shop, service, boots, valet, porter. On second floor of this space should be Housekeeper's room, linen, blankets, extra cots, matron's, and a small service pantry to serve breakfast to all three floors, etc. On returning to St. Paul wish you would go over this all with Mr. Hogeland, and while in the Park hope you will have a chance to study carefully on the ground and go over it all with the present Manager of Prince of Wales Hotel, and at your earliest convenience would appreciate hearing from you with any new ideas and sketches. Enclosed small sketch suggests 3 floors, 9ft. ceilings; building 40 ft. high; stairs added in middle of building with central hall and opposite service pantry, linen, blankets, etc., opening in each case on to large porches with stairs from 3rd floor to ground; also on each floor 8 alsoves added to bedrooms.

This also makes 3 breaks in the long elevation or face of building and simplifies problem of lowest possible roof. We should find out from this year's experience (if possible) that the requirements will be in additional rooms, etc.

I doubt if the class of guests we will have will all want to pay for bath with every room. Also question as to how many bedrooms can be served or used with present dining room, and kitchen capacities. This would probably, for the present, cut us down to only the one dormitory, the large one with taproom below. A Open .
