ROCKY MOUNTAIN TOURIST TRAVEL

ECLIPSES ALL PREVIOUS RECORDS

Glacier Park, Mont -- Sept 15 - All previous

attendance records were surpassed by summer tourist travel into Glacier National Park this year. Today marked the close of the twentieth season for this wonderland of the Rockies, and the figures given out by Supt. J. R. Eakin even show a surprising increase of tourist travel over last year, which was the previous banner season in the park's history.

According to the records at the two gateways, the total attendance was 70,752, or 32.3% over last year's attendance.

Dear Al:-

I expect that you will be surprised when you read this letter, but am doing it to ask you to do me a little favour if possible,

You know when you were here last with Mr. Hill he ask me to live in his house all winter to take care of it in connection with the caretaking of the hotel and I promised to do so, but now at the end of the season I find that Mr. Binder the Gen'l Manager has deemed it advisable to make a change in the personnel for the winter and is leaving the engineer here in charge and I suppose that I shall have to look for work elsewhere but expect that will be a very hard job at this time of the year, after I had promised Mr. Hill that I would remain here I turned down a good job as assistance Manager of a Hotel, but have written to the Manager again only to receive an answer to the effect that the position is now filled, I had a conversation with Mr. Binder about the matter who has promised to do all he can in the matter but is unable to say whether or not he can keep me on, I also wrote to Mr. Hill a personal letter but sent it to St Paul to be forwarded on to him but do not know if it will or not perhaps you could find out if he had received it and if not tell him that I sent him one asking him to use his influence in either keeping me here or obtaining a position of trust elsewhere

I have been placed in rather an awkward position here Al having purchasing all my supplies for the winter and having a small family on my hands it will not be so nice if I have no wages coming in every month as there is an awful lot of unemployed around this country and one cannot live on air I would not have felt it so bad if I had known it say a month ago but to go to the end of the season and then having heard it through another man and having to go to the Gen'l Manager and ask him if such was the case it makes one think what next will happen, the Gen'l Manager told me that as far as my work was concerned there was nothing the matter but that he was acting on instructions that he had received from St Paul,

Well Al I would ~~esteem~~ ^{decide} it a great favour if you would approach Mr. Hill in this matter and find out if he had received the letter and if he has not tell him about me if they build here I may be able to work in as Timekeeper and checker later on but cannot very well afford to wait very long I think that I will be here until the 15th October after that date I may have to stay here on account of the snow, Now I will ring off hoping that you are well also that I shall hear from you also Mr. Hill in the near future, I remain

Dear Sir:-

Last August when you were at Waterton Parks I promised you that I would live in your cottage all winter and take care of it whilst acting as caretaker at the Prince of Wales Hotel. Unfortunately Mr. Binder has deemed it advisable to make a change in the personal at the hotel for the winter in keeping an engineer in my place. I had a conversation with Mr. Binder this morning who informed me that as far as my work was concerned everything was O.K. but he had been instructed by the St. Paul office to keep an engineer at all the hotels and that was the reason for the change he had made. I pointed out to him the difficulty there was in my securing a position at this time of the year being a married man with a family and a long winter ahead of me at the same time asking him if there was any possibility of placing me here as caretaker of the hotel or in any other position, but he was unable to give me a deciding answer. I might say that after I had promised to take care of your cottage I refused an offer of a good position.

In writing to you I am not complaining anything about the way I have been treated but asking you for your kind assistance in securing a position either here in case you decide to build as Timekeeper and Checker of material or any other position of trust. Had I only known that there would have been a change for this winter I would not have gone to work and laid in my winter supplies as I have done.

I understand that there is quite a lot of work to be done in the power plant this winter in altering steam fittings so as to comply with the Boiler Act of Alberta. A 2nd man will be necessary to help the engineer but Mr. Binder did not know whether he could give me the job or not yet but has promised to do what he can for me. I would esteem it a great favour if you would use your influence in this matter and help me out for the sake of my Wife and small family.
