Attached is a statement showing operating expenses accumulated during the months of April, May and first half of June 1929 for the three main hotels. You will notice on this statement that the entrancehotel has the highest amount. This is due to the fact that the season was opened June 13, 1929 in order to take care of Shriners special party.

No maintenance expenses are included in the statement. They have been excluded because it is difficult to distinguish repairs to buildings and equipment caused by the elements from the cost of replacing drain traps, varnishing floors, etc. which are true costs of opening for the season. Then at the entrance there has been the unusual maintenance work on the golf course and water line, water supply in the hotel, beautifying grounds, etc. which are not costs of preparing the hotel for operation.
