



Fromptly upon receipt of your telegram last Sunday morning regarding the Governors' Conference to be held in San Francisco, I

regarding the Governors' Conference to be held in San Francisco, I endeavored to get in touch with both Mr. Lengby and Mr. McGillis but they were both reported away for the day. In view of your suggestion having to do with the Great Northern I thought you would wish to have the matter taken up through Mr. Kenney's office, which I did the first thing Monday morning. Mr. Lengby's memorandum is hereto attached.

Governors' Conference, special train, etc., as mentioned in your telegram, and found it was held the latter part of November and forepart of December of 1911. None of the newspaper stories, however, carried any photographs with them and Mr. Dunlap of the Dispatch after a search through their files advised they had no photographs. The Advertising Department also advised they could not locate nor did they have any record of any photographs of this first conference. Mr. Siems also advised the Daily News have no photographs in their files.

Mr. Siems advises he is going to prepare a story to send to California newspapers, as suggested by you, and will endeavor to obtain a copy and send it to you.

Because it is a Great Northern matter I did not want to interfere but am trying to help them to obtain information for their use in preparing newspaper story which I hope meets with your approval. I noticed from the Dispatch newspaper clippings that a number of the stories were written by Lloyd McDowell of Portland who was at that time a publicity man for the Great Northern.

ST. PAUL, Minn., July 23. - How tunnels and bridges held up the first governors' conference was recalled here as the state executives opened their 25th session at San Francisco.

The first meeting was an eventful affair. It was a mobile conference which began and ended in St.Paul and extended to most if not "all points east." It was held in the fall of 1911.

Governor James H. Hawley of Idaho, who was president of the Western Development Association, promoted the idea. It had for its slogan, "Get the East to Know the West." The Idaho governor was having trouble putting the plan over, when Louis W. Hill, then president of the Great Northern railway, stepped in, assembled the finest passenger train that had ever been coupled together, and placed it at the disposal of the governors for a circuit tour of the east.

Five cars of exhibits were included, wherein were displayed the finest products of the richest soil of the western states. The train had electric lights, a barber shop, observation car, drawing rooms, compartments and other luxuries then little known to the ordinary railway traveller.

Membership in the "Governors' Special," as it was called, was restricted to western executives and officials of only slightly less importance, and, of course, "the press." Samuel G. Blythe, well known writer for the Saturday Evening Post, was along.

Governors who participated were J. M. Carey of Wyoming,
John Burke of North Dakota, Edwin L. Norris of Nebrasks, R. S. Vessey
of South Dakota, Oswald West of Oregon, Adolph O. Eberhardt of Minnesota, and the official host, James H. Hawley of Idaho. Other states,
in the absence of the governor, were represented by Lieutenant Governor Stephen R. Fitzgerald of Colorado, Former Governor Gillette of
California, and J. E. Barnes for Washington.

Steaming out of St.Paul the night of November 27, the Governors' Special began an eventful 4,000 mile jaunt, visiting 22 eastern states, making official stops at 23 cities, selling the west,

mixing politics, meeting other governors enroute, and having dinner with President Taft, then occupant of the White House.

Their special train, which all along the route was almost as much of an attraction as the celebrities aboard, did not get to Washington. It proved just a bit too deluxe for some of the bridges and tunnels on the lines leading into the national capitol, so after several attempts to roll into Washington in elegance over circuitous routes where the tunnels and bridges might fit the train, the effort was abandoned, and the governors had to proceed as passengers on an ordinary train.

Concern also was felt about the special when some of the political concoctions put together enroute threatened to blow the lid off the shiney cars. Woman suffrage was quite an issue at that time, and there was considerable difference of opinion on the subject among the gubernatorial guests.

The train, however, arrived back in St.Paul safe and sound the morning of December 16, after visiting Chicago, Kalamazoo, Grand Rapids, Detroit, Toledo, Cleveland, Buffalo, Rochester, Syracuse, Utica, Albany, Philadelphia, New York, Harrisburg, Pittsburg, Columbus, Cincinnati, Indianapolis, St.Louis, and making a valiant albeit unsuccessful attempt to get into Baltimore and Washington, D. C.

Elaborate receptions were the order at all of the stops.

From this first touring conference of the western governors' the present institution of governors' conferences sprung.

Mr. Hill:

Herewith is copy of article prepared and sent to newspapers in California by Mr. Siems. A copy of the article has also
been given to the Northwest Press Bureau of the Associated Press
and the United Press.

The material for the article was taken from old newspaper clippings covering the first Governors' Conference held in Saint Paul in 1911 in the files of the Pioneer Press and Daily News. As advised you, we were unable to find any photographs of the trip.
