Dear Sir:

I respectfully submit the following report upon the surveys which I made for Mr. Hill in the following Townships and Ranges in the districts designated:

Cutbank District:

Allotment 1852-Formerly owned by Divingaround in Section 16
Allotment 1922-Formerly owned by Joseph Home Gun in Section 15
Allotment 1925-Formerly owned by Strikesback in Section 23
All of these allotments are located in Township 33 North and Range
13 West. I ran the boundary lines of these claims; located all of
the corners; staked one side on the creek, both sides of the Highway,
and a few intermediate places all of which will be shown upon a plan
of the same to be forwarded to you when completed.

## Two Medicine District: Staked the following:

Section 1 Township 32 North Range 13 West
Section 36 Township 33 North Range 13 West
The NW1 of Section 25 - - - - - - All in Township 32
NW1 of NW2 of Section 24 - - - - - - North Range 13 West
E of the NW2 of the SM2 of Section 23 - B2 of the SM3 of the SM3 of Section 23 - Also claim 889 in Township 32 North Range 12 West

Around all of these boundaries Transit lines were run, the brush cut, all corners staked, all Highway crossines and creek crossines staked, and all lakes, streams, and springs were located.

St. Mary's District:

The work begun last fall was completed by staking the back line which was left uncompleted last fall due to the early snow.

I surveyed completely around allotment 1852, known as the Samuel Smith Allotment, staked all corners including the 1/16th corners, made topographical surveys of the southern 40 Acres of the above mentioned claim and also a semi-topographical survey of the remainder of the claim showing the elevations of all of the high points, also the location and elevations of your building sites wherever they could be determined, location of the lakes and their approximate areas. I traced the streams to their sources all of which will be shown on a plan which will be forwarded to you upon completion.

I also made a topographical plan of the twenty-three acres which you purchased last fall and the elevation of the spring. All elevations shown on the plans will be calculated from the elevation of St. Mary's Lake as given upon the U.S.G.S. topographical survey maps, i.e. 4460 (four thousand four hundred sixty) feet.

Ample water to supply all of your building sites could be easily piped from the creek which passes through the SE corner of the twenty-three acres above mentioned. The source of this creek is approximately five hundred feet above the water level of the lake.

This stream runs through the southerly portion of Allotment 2133, and the southwesterly portion of Octave Galick's claim, the northeasterly corner of claim 3010, and the most northwesterly 40(forty) acres of claim 1852, crossing the section line between Sections 25 and 24 at approximately the quarter corner.

It would not be necessary to go to the head waters of this creek for your water supply as there is at present approximate. I flow of one thousand gallons per minute where it enters octave Bulick's claim. The elevation at this point is well over one hundred feet above any of your building sites.

It would require approximately one mile of six inch wood stave pipe to deliver the water to your building site in the south forty acres of Claim 1852 and possibly the same quantity of pipe would be necessary to carry the water to the building site on the twenty-three acres. This is a far greater supply than you could be able to get from the spring which is located east of the twenty-three acres, although the spring has an elevation seventy-five feet above your building site.

I have had considerable experience installing water systems, the most recent one being a complete water system for the town of Hot Springs, including the location of the intake, the erection of a two hundred thousand gallon steel tank, a conduit line of nine thousand feet and a distributing system of approximately twenty thousand feet of cast iron pipe. This water system has prove very satisfactory and the Board of Underwriters of Montana have rated this town by giving it sixth place in the entire state for fire protection.

More recently I have engineered the installation of a sixty thousand gallon steel tank to be used for irrigation purposes in the Conrad Memorial Cometery of Kalispell.

Should you wish to have me furnish you a plan for a gravity water system for your building sites, I would be pleased to undertake the same, making the surveys necessary, giving you the estimated cost of a small dam, an intake, and possibly a small resevoir or tank.

It has been necessary to send for plats from the Highway Commission and the U. S. Bureau of Lands in Helena, but this should not delay the completion of your plans more than ten days from date.

I covered approximately fifty miles of line which was necessary to complete this survey as outlined above. A large portion of this was through brush and small timber. During the work my headquarters were at Glacier Park Station which seemed to be the most convenient and reasonable place to stay. I am planning to return to Kalispell tomorrow and can be contacted there at any time thereafter.

November 20th in connection with the situation at Glacier Park which terminated with the understanding I would meet with the National Park Service and Secretary of the Interior and after considering all the factors make recommendations to the directors by letter.

Met with the National Park Service, and later with Secretary of the Interior Ickes, in Washington on Monday, November 27th. Explained our situation quite thoroughly, calling particular attention to the unsuitableness of the Great Northern Rail ay being required to invest money to provide facilities in the Park to take care of the automobile tourist traffic.

larly Secretary Ickes, is that it is inconceivable the Great
Morthern Reilway Company would jeopardize its reputation in
cancelling a contract, or a part of it, with the United States
Government, the very essence of which was to take better care
of visitors in the National Park by establishment of more
modern and extended facilities. The National Park Service take
the attitude the new contract was entered into for this particular reason and to provide facilities for the automobile tourist
and that the time to have objected was when the contract was being negotiated and not new after the Park Service has gone
ahead and developed locations for tourist camps at lake
McDonald and Roes Creek on the strength of the contract.

In a few words, the feeling of the Secretary (and he has a very strong feeling along these lines, not only as far as the Park is concerned, but everything else) is that Glacier Park is now a resort for the well-to-do and people who

can afford the hotels and has entirely neglected taking care of the poorer classes. The Secretary said Glacier Park was a high hat park and there wasno place for the poorer people to go inside the Park with result they had to stay outside in questionable places and he was very desirous of making it possible for the poorer classes, and particularly tourists traveling in automobiles, to be able to stay inside Glacier Park proper in camps operated by responsible people and it was, in his opinion, up to the Great Northern Railway to provide such facilities.

While I gave no assurance at all that we would provide the facilities, was able to reach an understanding with the National Park Service that if we finally decided to do so we would not be called upon at this time to provide the facilities at Lake McDonald and Roes Creek in their entirety, but would start off with one-third of the investment and then develop as the business warrants. In addition to this it is desirable to construct a cafeteria at present location of the auto camp at

It is, therefore, my recommendation that I be authorized to proceed, starting work in the spring, with construction of facilities at Roes Creek, Lake McDonald and a cafeteria at Swift Current at an estimated outlay of allo,000 which will provide facilities in the Park for people who travel by automobile and cannot afford to, and will not, stay at the hotels.

Feel it would be a mistake not to carry on in Glacier Park with the United States Government, Our failure to do so would not only hurt us in the Park, but for the present at least, would hurt us with the Government in Washington. Your approval is requested. It is, therefore, my recommendation that I be authoriz-
