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Stillwater. Breweries.

In 1850 or 51 Arbut Kimmick started a distillery in his kitchen, at Cor. 3d & Chestnut and made five barrels a week. In 1852 he built a brewery on lower main street and in 1854 took in Frank Siple and they ran it till K died, in 1857. In 1860 his widow, Mrs. K. and Siple, who ran the brewery till May, 1868, when building was burned. Mrs. Siple began re-building, but in Nov. (1868) when building almost ready, recd. injury which caused death. Mrs. A. then took management as she had done after Kimmick died. In Dec. 1869 she married Herman Lepars who operated it

Upass died & then Frank^{J.R.} Sipe
took it. He and June's daughter
& J. secured it & closed it

No fairs held in 1861 and 1862.
Officers of 1860 seem to have held
over till Aug. 8, 1863, when Exec. Com.
met and elected W. L. Ames, ^{St. Paul} Pres., and
C. N. Clarke, ^{mpls.} Secy. and resolved to hold
a fair at Ft. Snelling Sept 30 and Oct.
1 and 2. ^{circulate a plan, put up.} Issued a poster, saying the

Fair would be held, "through the beneficence
of the proprietor of the buildings and grounds,
Hon. Franklin Steele, and the military appro-
val of Maj. Gen. Pope." The poster went on
to say: "While sister State societies have
kept up their annual exhibitions, this society
has, for two years, abstained from them, only
on account of the all absorbing interest of the
people in the struggle pending for self-gov-
ernment and constitutional ^{rights.}

Heitated to hold fair on acct. of war and
reports of dearth. But by ^{the} sheets being and
dearth wasnt bad as reported.

By the ^{amended} ~~new~~ Constitution of 1865 the President & Secy, were made ex officio members of the Exec. Com. The Vice Pres. were to be composed of the Presidents of "each regularly organized county or district agricultural society."

The amended Constitution of 1872 made the Pres. and Pres. of the University ex officio members of the Executive Committee.
