IN SUFFRAGE OR NON- SUFFRAGE STATES?

The average woman cannot be expected to know the peculiarities of the laws in 48 different states. She cannot be expected to know that the age of consent for her daughter is 18 years in Wyoming and 10 in Florida; that she is an equal guardian with her husband over her children in Illinois but that she has no claim upon them at all in Louisiana. She is not likely to know that in Colorado she may legally demand an 8 hour working day, but that she should be compelled to work 16 hours in Alabama for her daily wage; that her children could not legally be employed under the laws of Oregon but that no law will protect them in the event their father desires to hire them out in North Carolina.

She would not be apt to know that in Idaho, for example, the state is expending nearly 50¢ per \$100 of wealth to provide competent schools which are scattered over the state every two miles and that at the same time a compulsory educational law will, in that state, compel her children to take advantage of the good high schools provided; but that in Alabama only 18¢ per \$100 of wealth is expended on public education, which means that good schools are rare and that no compulsory educational law would compel her children to attend any school, in the one case her children would grow up prepared to take their place in the world and in the other they might be mere illiterates.

The average woman would not be apt to know that in every state where women vote there is a mother's pension for the widow left with children to support and without means of her own, whereas in a good many states no such provision is made.

Your recent letter regarding the Peace Conference in Europe, addressed to the White House, has been received and noted in the Department of State.

Jan. 1, 1878.

My dear Mrs. Weland: - I have a list of 100 names of leading men in St. Cloud, a copy of the petition secured last winter for the benefit of our congressman & senators.

Mrs. Atwood & I think it unnecessary to secure their signatures again. I could have them type-written probably on the blanks you sent me for men & certified to by Mrs. Atwood or myself. She & Mrs. Ahlers, Miss Duayle & I secured them. If they will be acceptable please let me know. I expect to have some new names ^{of men} also, would you like them type-written or shall I send the original sheets?

Would it be wise to have the women's names copied on

the typewriters for future use?
Some of the workers have already
sent in their lists & I hope to have
them all soon. This has been
an unusually busy fall for the
women. They have been asked
to do so many things for the
public, that it has taken longer
than otherwise to secure the names.

Nearly all of the women in
the better parts of the city are ready
to sign, although there are a few
among the society women, who
are antis. The canvass will
certainly be good for the St. And
women & the cause.

One thing more - we almost are afraid to say so in these busy times - and that is, will you have a few of your most influential people either write or telegraph Mr. Knutson asking him to vote in favor of the suffrage amendment. Telegrams are considered best - letters should be mailed not later than the 6th (Sunday).

Mr. Knutson has been very friendly to the suffragists in his district, but he has not pledged himself to vote in favor of the amendment. We expect that he will, but we want him to know that the people in his district are in favor of woman suffrage.

My dear Mrs. Stricker:-

We are in grateful receipt of the petitions you sent in. No doubt you felt that you must send these petition in though you had not attained the required quota because you believed the time for work to have expired. However, the inaction of the United States Senate in passing the Federal Suffrage Amendment automatically extends our time as it also increases the necessity of our presenting petitions of convincing proportions.

You realize that the chief strength of our argument is that where the petitions are circulated a majority of men and women have signed. Alexandria being a town of importance makes it most desirable that the work be carried to completion there. Other districts in the state have suffered from the unusual conditions that have prevailed for the past five months, as has your own. In such districts the women in general are seizing upon this extension of time to see if they cannot accomplish what has been impossible up to this time. We are asking that they report results by the 20th of this month. Of the 312 women whose signatures you already have, do you not believe that a dozen or more would be glad to give an afternoon to a canvass?

One of the most effective ways we have found, and perhaps you have already tried it, is to get a group of women together at an appointed hour, apportioning the streets, and just make a house to house canvass. The business houses and offices should be included in this canvass so as not to miss the men.

Lest you are out of supplies, we are sending
you a limited amount of material under separate cover.

With very genuine appreciation of the work

I am very sorry indeed that you are not well, and under the circumstances you mention I can see very well that you cannot undertake the petition work. I am also much grieved about that. However, we have steeled ourselves somewhat to this situation because of the flu everywhere.

In accordance with my promise to you that you would not be called upon to do anything additional, I have not sent you letters that went to chairmen of other committees.

Now then that you are being released from the canvass, will you do the following:

The Minnesota Suffrage Association, which represents practically all the organized suffragists of the state, are working solely for the FEDERAL AMENDMENT, and are much opposed to a state amendment. The Federal Amendment is bound to pass Congress next session, if not this, and we feel that a state amendment, like the prohibition amendment, would be futile in Minnesota. In spite of the work we have done, and the general publicity we have obtained, the House this morning passed this state amendment. It is now up to us to head it off in the Senate. If it passes there it means that the suffragists in every county in Minnesota will have to raise \$1,000 and will have to fall in line for a two years' campaign - with the consciousness that possibly after all it will fail. Your Senator Romberg has pledged himself to woman suffrage - WILL YOU therefore please write to please vote in favor of the ratification of the Federal Amendment but by no means to vote for the state amendment. If you can get several other influential women to do likewise, will you not please do this?

You have probably learned that Mr. Warner's bill for the State Amendment passed by a large vote in the House yesterday and that our vote on our resolution to the United States Senate and House developed so much enthusiasm and strength that Mr. Warner was clever enough to take advantage of the occasion and put through his State Amendment so there is no use to bring any further influence to bear on Mr. Warner. He has done all the harm he can but I wish you would write a letter to Senator Viborg, telling him that the women in your district do not want the State Suffrage Amendment. We have had no word as yet from Mrs. Ueland as to the appointment of a State Circulation Chairman for the Woman Citizen in Minnesota, ~~but~~ since you have been sending us subscriptions on Minnesota's quota we suppose that we may write to you as the 'responsible party'. We are mailing you under separate cover 50 subscription blanks for special use in this campaign work. Your signature, for which space is provided, will assure us that the work is being done through the proper agency and that commissions are not being paid to other than accredited league treasurers. You will notice that we are asking to have check for the full amount of the subscription sent to us, and that we plan to send back (probably monthly) the accumulated commissions by check from this office.

The last census shows that there were in 1910 more than 510,000 women of voting age in Minnesota. Of these only 421 are subscribers to the Woman Citizen. It is almost incredible that the number is so small, but we are convinced that this is due to the fact that many suffragists do not know that the Woman Citizen is published, and we are quite convinced that they would be glad to subscribe to the magazine if it were brought to their attention. It should be an easy matter to do this through the appointment of County or Assembly District Chairmen, who, in turn, will know local conditions well enough to enable them to select enterprising suffragists throughout each county who will be eager to promote the circulation campaign of the Woman Citizen.

A cause so important and so far reaching as suffrage should have a magazine published in its interest that could take its place with the leading periodicals. If the pride of the staunch suffragists can be properly stirred, we know that the Woman Citizen can become such a magazine.

We cannot state the following too strongly: If suffragists will stand back of their official magazine at this time by subscribing to it and will urge their friends to do so, it can be made a magazine unequalled in its interest and value to women. The Woman

Citizen is doing a more important work than many persons appreciate. It is publishing weekly an accurate account of suffrage in the making, and this year will record perhaps the most interesting period in suffrage history. It is vitally important that all earnest suffragists should appreciate the value that their personal backing will have this year for the Woman Citizen. Once securely established, the size of the magazine can be increased and its scope broadened to meet the appeal of the woman movement in general. It can be made an organ to satisfy thinking women everywhere, if only the foremost suffragists in the country will help it through its first year.

We are preparing various kinds of printed matter for distribution to the workers in the campaign, which will be of help to them in securing subscriptions. This office is ready at all times to give advice and aid to the individual workers.

If you have any suggestions to make which will further the working out of this campaign, and will send them to us we shall be most appreciative.

The 30% discount on subscriptions allowed to the credit of local suffrage organizations, although not an appallingly large commission on first consideration, will net the small league the useful amount of \$30.00 on every 100 names sent us.

This is a long letter, but the subject is so important and the time so short that we are crowding into it many of the necessary points we wish to make. Please write to us freely and often. We are anxious to co-operate with you in every possible way.

My dear Miss Heckrich:

You will see from the February 16th number of the Woman Citizen just what the woman suffrage situation is in England. Briefly recapitulated it comes to this: the Representation of the People bill had about 33 clauses in it. I think it was clause 27 that was the woman suffrage clause. The provisions of that clause are that all women over 30 are to be allowed to vote, that is to say, they have both the municipal and parliamentary franchise. Men are allowed to vote at 21 in England. The discrimination is a manifestly unjust one. Indeed the English statesmen did not pretend that it was anything else. They just said that for reasons of expediency they could not let all the women in at once because so many men were going to be killed off in the war that it would upset the balance of things unless some arbitrary discrimination against women was made, so they arbitrarily discriminated.

I think the above answers your query as to whether or not the woman suffrage bill has anything to do with the Representation of the People bill. In a word, it is a clause in that bill. The Representation of the People bill readjusted the franchise even for male voters. For one thing it has done away with the principle of plural voting. One of the unfairest things about the English franchise situation has been the fact that a property owner had as many votes as he had property in the different voting districts.

I enclose some sheets taken from the Woman Citizen that will still further clear up this franchise situation for you, if this letter leaves anything obscure.

England has not only always especially favored her property holders but has shown a similar favoritism to university people. The trend of the Presentation of the People bill was toward getting the franchise established on the basis of one person, one vote.

Suffrage Progress in Great Britain

ON November 20 despatches pointed out that the British House of Commons had unanimously decided "to extend the municipal franchise to women on the same terms as they now have the parliamentary franchise." This was misleading. The purport of the action by the House of Commons was so to extend the woman suffrage clause of the Representation of the People Bill that married women, over thirty, whose husbands are entitled to the municipal franchise, should have it also. They never have had it, though single women over 21 have had it since 1869, in England and Wales, since 1881 in Scotland and since 1898 in Ireland. In doing away with this old-time discrimination against married women with regard to the municipal franchise the action taken adds just so much to the original woman suffrage clause of the Representation of the People Bill, which grants parliamentary suffrage to women over thirty. By increasing the age limit from 21 to 30 for all women it cuts in on the present municipal franchise rights of unmarried women. But the two gains, parliamentary suffrage for all women over 30, and municipal suffrage for all married women over 30, far more than offset the cut on single women between 21 and 30. Final favorable action on the whole bill is expected daily from the House of Commons.

THE REPRESENTATION OF THE PEOPLE BILL.

It adds about 8,000,000 to the electorate, of whom 6,000,000 are women over 30 years of age, who are "occupiers" (rent or rate payers), or the wives of "occupiers". It is believed that they will constitute about two-fifths of the whole number of voters.

The bill enfranchises sailors and soldiers over 19, but two years after the war ends the age is increased to 21, the same as for all men. It temporarily disfranchises "conscientious objectors" who refuse to perform any kind of war service. The measure lowers the required period of residence to six months; provides that all elections shall be held on one day; reduces their cost; simplifies the law, and redistributes the seats to give equality of "voting values."

Proportional representation was defeated, but a compromise was made in a so-called "alternate vote". The Liberals are disappointed that, while plural voting is diminished, it is not abolished. The Labor Party is dissatisfied because complete adult suffrage was not established. The Conservatives, of course, regret the widening of the franchise.

Dear Madam Chairman :

With more acute realization of the fact that we are at war, the interest in registration of women is increasing all over the state and probably you would better give a good deal of local publicity now to the fact that you have the Registration cards. Letters that have come to this office show that many women do not know about the local opportunity for registration.

I hope you will all read the resumé in Minnesota-in-the-War of Helen Fraser's wonderful speech on the war work English women are doing. It made a tremendous impression on everyone who heard it and I feel like recommending that everyone get her book "Women and War Work", published by G. Arnold Shaw, Grand Central Terminal, New York City. (price \$1.50)

In this country we have not yet felt the terrific pressure that they do in England. They started in the war with one and one-fourth million more women than men: we started with 2,000,000 more men than women. The industrial upheaval therefore is not very great in the United States and in Minnesota we still have many men out of work. We must be on our guard against rushing women into industries where they displace men unnecessarily.

WOMEN MUST DO THEIR PART BUT MUST NOT INCREASE IN ANY WAY THE UPSETTING OF BUSINESS MORE THAN THE WAR CONDITIONS ACTUALLY DEMAND.

In almost every case, the greatest service that we can offer is right in our own home towns and often in doing the job that we are at, better than we have ever done it before.

Nevertheless, the demand for certain special services is already growing pressing. The Government needs clerks, stenographers and typists. With the drawing of nurses to the battlefronts we must increase the home nursing guard and the Council of Defense is asking for lists of all women who have had the full training but who have married or for home reasons are no longer working, but who would be willing to help either in service at home or in national service. In this connection, I would like to mention the special summer intensive training in nursing at Vassar College for which they would like to enroll 1000 younger college graduates. Similarly, it is suggested that in every community a list be made of women who have done clerical work and would be willing to help in their home towns if there comes to be a local shortage.

Women specially trained for some expert work like photography, telegraphy, etc. can often get excellent jobs.

Our local employment bureaus are:

1. Public Employment Bureau (established by the Safety Commission)
101 South 2 St., Minneapolis, which handles both skilled and unskilled labor and will deal with the supply of agricultural labor in which undoubtedly women and boys of High School age will have to serve for the coming crop.
2. Woman's Occupational Bureau, 827 Andrus Bldg., Minneapolis, which deals with trained women.
3. Miss Katherine Ball, Vocational Advisor at the University of Minnesota can often help individual problems of college women.

For untrained women, there are practically no openings except the industrial ones which are not very numerous locally as Minnesota is not one of the great manufacturing states.

Women are making ordnance and engaged in other Governmental contract work and probably more such women will be needed later but it is to be remembered that such work is not a "vocation", i.e., it does not offer a life career but must be considered emergency service.

For work outside the state, we may refer to the Federal Employment Bureau, 22 East 22 St., New York City, and to the U.S. Employment Service for Teachers and Professionals at 845 South Wabash Av., Chicago.

Lay stress upon the fact that registration is only an enrollment. The Council of National Defense and its local representatives are not employment bureaus, and while they are anxious to get all information they can from the Government and to render all assistance to women, this registration does not necessarily secure a job but only adds the registrant's name to a long list of possible workers. The Employment Bureaus mentioned above are the direct agents for getting positions.

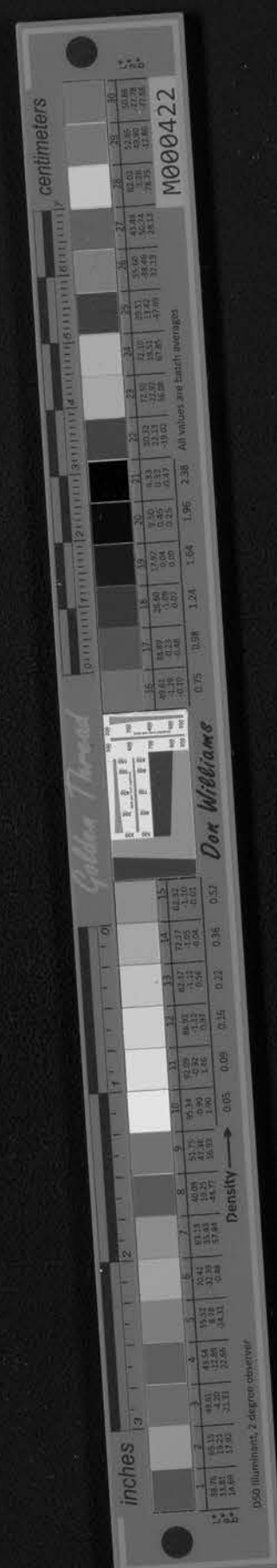

We are entirely willing to deal direct with the individual league when there seems to be a preference for such an arrangement and when the volume of business sent in is sufficient to justify it.

We have sent Ramsey County a list of St. Paul subscribers which they requested but have had no recent communication with them as to the premium - that is quite apart, you see, from the matter of the commission payment. Each subscription, for instance, that Ramsey County sends in is really credited in two ways. It adds to the credit of the County Association in its race for the Second Cash Premium and also to the credit of the State Association in its race for the First Cash Premium.

Minnesota has so far done better than any of the states in securing individual subscriptions. Georgia and South Dakota have each sent in several hundred 'gift' subscriptions to assemblymen and editors, but valuable as these are they do not represent the individual effort and demand that Minnesota's list does. I have your letter of the 7th inst. inviting me to become a member of the Advisory Committee of the Minnesota Woman Suffrage Association, and this is to inform you that I accept your invitation.

In accepting it, it may not be amiss for me to say to you that my conviction of woman's right to a vote was always linked with the right of man to vote. As the subject of suffrage appears to me, man has been able to gain and extend his right to vote in the measure as he became conscious of his place as producer in national and world economy. Likewise womankind began to demand the same right in the measure as it became conscious of its place as producer of wealth in modern society. Strictly speaking ~~woman~~ should have had the vote first, as she brings into the world every producer of wealth. This only additional proof that history does not always travel along the most logical route. Both, man and woman however, must share the blame for this mistake in the order of historical process. To correct this mistake and render justice to womankind (mankind including) is not only the task, but also the duty of man and woman.

You are at liberty to call on me for such service as I can give to this cause, which I shall gladly give consistent with the requirements upon my time for other work.

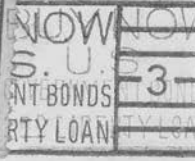
