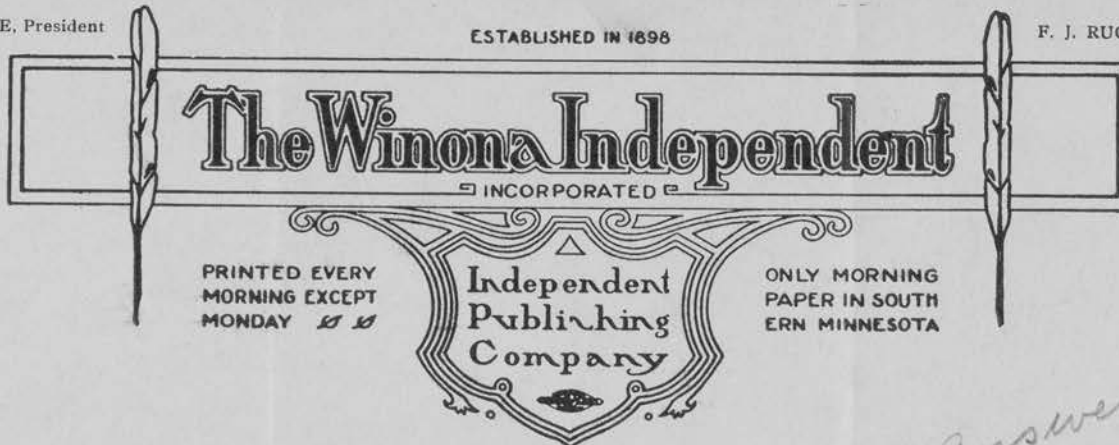

Dear Madam President:

Representative James W. Good, of Iowa, is chairman of the Appropriations Committee of the House of Representatives, and because of his position at the head of this powerful committee will very largely determine the fate of the Woman-in-Industry Service of the U. S. Department of Labor. This bureau, as you know, will automatically go out of existence July 1, unless funds are provided by Congress before that date. We women must save it.

Will you, then, be good enough to wire or write Mr. Good immediately, urging an appropriation of \$150,000 for the Woman-in-Industry Service, as recommended by the Secretary of Labor? This is the only bureau in the federal government devoted primarily to the interests of women and the problems with which it has to deal are daily becoming more numerous, more complicated, and more difficult. The danger in Congress is that the cry for economy may cut out the bureau altogether or else allow but a small and inadequate appropriation.



## WOMEN'S WORK IN THE UNITED STATES EMPLOYMENT SERVICE

### BEGINNINGS - Before 1918.

Nine Federal and 46 state and municipal offices for women.  
No recruiting of jobs or applicants.  
Placements usually limited to domestic and low paid clerical work.  
Executive supervision by women limited; in two or three states only.  
No policy for women's work.

### WAR TIME DEVELOPMENT - Jan. 3, to Nov. 11, 1918 .

Offices increased to 400.  
Supervision by women executives established: National - Assistant (to) Director General, United States Employment Service Department of Labor; State - Assistants and superintendents in 42 states; local - women superintendents and examiners in all but smallest offices.

Recruiting of war workers provided for in President's Proclamation and policy of War Labor Policies Board, etc.

Class of women handled - all types of domestic, clerical, industrial, farm and professional workers.

Equal membership and vote on state advisory and community labor boards given women.

Support from women's organizations almost universal.

Placements increased 1000% - from 9000 to 90,000

### POST - ARMISTICE SERVICE

Thousands of war workers transferred without loss of time and money immediately after armistice.

Central Committee to care for soldiers and sailors and war workers provided machinery for handling women as well as men and recognized women's welfare organizations.

### BASIS FOR PERMANENT SERVICE

Policies help workers in labor surplus as well as employer in labor shortage: no entirely new policies or offices necessitated by shift in labor conditions after armistice, owing to ability of United States Employment Service to readjust itself to peace conditions.

Specialized work - junior, professional and farm - provides machinery for development along needed lines.

Policy for supervision by women firmly established. Assistant (to) Director General; 17 Assistants to Federal Director, 25 women superintendents in charge of 42 states.

Women's divisions developed and used: 22% of employers' calls and 15% of applications handled are women. Twenty one percent of persons employed are women (Census 1910); 700,000 placements out of four million total are women.

Funds now apportioned for non-administrative work average 25% for women's work.

Outside support of women's divisions has kept 200 offices in total of 500; unanimous endorsement of provisions for women's work given by governor's representatives from 30 states at conference to outline bill for permanent Service to be presented in the 66th Congress.

This bill safeguards women's work by provision for Public employment offices for "men women and juniors".

A "woman Assistant Director General" appointed by the Secretary of Labor to have general supervision of all matters relating to the employment of women"

Allotment of funds to each state on basis of latest census figures of persons engaged in gainful occupations (which includes women) and provision that state must meet federal rulings in order to obtain funds.

A BILL

FOR AN ACT EXTENDING TO WOMEN THE RIGHT TO VOTE FOR CANDIDATES FOR  
PRESIDENTIAL ELECTOR.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:

SECTION 1. Every woman who has attained the age of twenty-one years and who possesses all other qualifications requisite to a male voter, shall be entitled to vote the same as men, at any election held for the purpose of electing presidential electors.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

M E M O R A N D U M

The method of appointing presidential electors is determined, not by the state constitution, but by the United States constitution, which provides as follows:

"EACH STATE SHALL APPOINT IN SUCH MANNER AS THE LEGISLATURE THEREOF MAY DIRECT, a number of electors equal to the whole number of senators and representatives to which the state may be entitled by the Congress." (Article I, Sec. 2, U.S. Constitution)

There are many precedents in which state legislatures have acted independently of their state constitutions in choosing presidential electors. In the early history of the United States, there were several instances in which the state legislatures, themselves, chose the presidential electors. This method was regularly followed in South Carolina up to and including the year 1860.

On several occasions State Legislatures have passed regulations for the presidential election enabling persons to vote who, by the State Constitution, would have been debarred from voting; and the right of the State Legislatures to do this has always been upheld by the courts. Thus:

THE MAINE LEGISLATURE, on March 24, 1864, passed an act to enable soldiers who were absent in the field to vote for presidential electors, and the next day it submitted an amendment to the State Constitution to enable soldiers absent in the field to vote for State Officers. The latter required a constitutional amendment, the former did not.

NEW HAMPSHIRE (see Public Laws of 1864) passed a Soldiers' Voting Act for presidential electors, the legality of which was unanimously upheld by the State Supreme Court (45 N.H. p. 607), although the act was in conflict with the State Constitution. The Supreme Court held that the question as to how the presidential electors should be chosen "is governed wholly by the Constitution of the United States as the paramount law, and the Constitution of this State has no concern with the question."

THE VERMONT SUPREME COURT gave an opinion to the same effect (37 Vermont Appendix)

THE NATIONAL HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, also upheld the constitutionality of the Michigan Soldiers' Voting Act (Feb. 14, 1866). The report of the case appears in 2 Bartlett's Contested Election Cases, at page 46.

MICHIGAN: Elaborate consideration of the subject of the manner of appointing presidential electors was given by the Supreme Court of Michigan and the Supreme Court of the United States in litigation brought to test the constitutionality of a statute of Michigan passed in 1891 dividing the State into districts for the election of



presidential electors. The Supreme Court of Michigan held that the act was valid. The decision in this case, which was entitled McPherson v. Blacker, is reported in 92 Mich. 377; 52 N.W. 469; 16 L.R.A. 475; 31 Am. St. Rep. 587. The decision of the Supreme Court of Michigan was reviewed on writ of error by the Supreme Court of the United States 146 U.S. 1 and was affirmed.
