My dear Miss Murdock:-

We are indeed glad to learn thru Mrs. Forrestal that you have assumed the chairmanship of the Finance Committee in Stillwater, to raise \$25.00 toward Woman Suffrage in Minnesota.

I enclose with this, a copy of the estimated budget for the year's work, and the quotas that have been accepted by the various counties.

There probably are several suffragists in your county who would like to subscribe \$10.00, or \$5.00 each, and many who would contribute \$1.00 towards the cause of woman suffrage. One woman raised quite a sum by asking a number of women to raise \$1.00 in 25 cent contributions. The following counties have already assumed their quotas: Hennepin, Ramsey, St. Louis, Winona, Olmsted, Blue Earth, Wabasha, Nicollet, Goodhue, Steele and Renville.

The money can be paid at any time before October 1st. We should be very glad, indeed, to have part of it at least, before very long, as we are to pay our National Association about \$1,700.00 this year, and have not been able to send very much of this so far.

Suffrage moves so fast these days that what was done last week now seems almost like ancient history. As you know, our Federal Amendment was passed May 21st by the House of Representatives by a very large vote, and we expect almost any day to learn that it has re-

ceived a favorable vote in the Senate. As soon as possible after, that, we hope to have a grand jubilee,- probably a meeting on the steps of the State Capitol, with an automobile parade from Minneapolis, with bands, speeches, Community Singing, and perhaps a pageant. I hope you and some of the other women in your county will come.

My dear Mr. Nolan:-

You may know that the United States Senate is expected to vote upon the Federal Suffrage Amendment tomorrow (June 3rd). We expect it to go thru, and we are planning to have a big celebration on the steps of the Capitol in St. Paul as soon after the vote is taken as possible. If it should be passed tomorrow we expect to have our celebration on Friday evening.

We very much want you to be one of our speakers. Governor Burnquist, Mayor Hodgson, Maria Sanford, and President Burton will speak. Of course, our plans are all tentative, but I want to ask you to save that time for us if you possibly can.

Of course, we are prepared for further delay in the Senate, and I hope you are not going to be so far away that we can not secure you. We consider this one of the greatest events in the history of Suffrage, naturally, and we want to make our celebration correspond.

One other question that we want your consideration, and you can give us your advise upon at a later date:- Our National Association is going to make a great effort to have enough states call special sessions of the Legislature in order to get this amendment ratified so that the women may vote in 1920. This looks rather formidable, but when we learned that the

Democratic Party at its Convention, is going to urge special sessions for this purpose; and also the Republicans are urging their claim to the women's vote, we believe it is a possibility on account of the political situation. Anyway please think it over in regard to our Minnesota legislature. I enclose a clipping which bears upon this subject.

Personally I shall not be able to continue the work for suffrage in our town. I wish I were able to name someone who had both time and inclination to do the work more completely than it has been done. But at best there is no prospect, that I can see, for a good showing from this locality.

One or two facts may be sufficient to explain the situation. One precinct in our town cast something like fourteen dry votes at the last election. I can't give you the exact figures for the others but I am safe in saying the above is representative.

Solely through the efforts of a group of women Jordan has a library

of some three or four hundred books. The city council (men) have never voted a single dollar for its support.

It is my personal belief that business interests might be a determining factor against a public stand for suffrage in some instances.

I favor a special session of the Legislature to ratify the Suffrage Amendment, but I do not believe that the session should be called before next winter. I should like the chance to introduce in the House the resolution to adopt the Amendment, and hope that the job may be reserved for me.

If there is anything that I can do to help bring about such a session, let me know. I shall advocate it in my paper and urge the matter on the Governor personally the next time I am in St. Paul, which will probably be about June 20th.

Madam:

I have your letter of June 3rd concerning special session. This is a hard question to answer. Under our constitution, the governor has no power to limit the subjects which may be considered by the legislature at a special session. There is no limit to the time a special session can sit except the pocket books of the members. As you know some conditions exist in the State which might make it dangerous to call a special session with no restraint on the subjects to be considered. So far as legislation is concerned, it would have the same power as a general session. Personally I would have no objection to a special session if the governor could limit the subjects to be considered. Under existing conditions, I would want to consult some of the other members before I would feel like advising a special session.

So far as the soldiers are concerned, I feel that we are not in shape yet to pass legislation for the real benefit of the returned soldiers. The sixty dollar gift proposed last Winter does not help anybody and in my judgment it is the wrong way to reach the matter. Whatever we do for the soldiers, I want it to be a real lasting benefit to them and not a mere temporary makeshift. Many of them



do not need any aid and in my judgment the aid should be limited to those who need it.

The Woman's Party have been having meetings here and in St. Paul, and with their usual precipitation have started a public clamor for special sessions, so that there is no use in trying to move diplomatically or quietly, so we are preparing to throw our full force into the movement for extra sessions.

We are holding a big celebration on the steps of the Capitol Monday evening, and are rushed to death for a few days, but I want to say that any time you can spare us for the purpose you suggest, we will be very glad to pay your expenses in going about the state in the interests of calling a special

session.

Dear Friend:

The U. S. Employment Service, as you will recall, was left unprovided for by the last session of Congress, and the country is therefore at this moment facing the prospect of no federal agency, and no coordinated system of state agencies, to deal with the great problem of finding jobs for men and women, and finding men and women for the jobs that must be filled in order to prevent unemployment on the one hand and to supply, on the other hand, the needs of our own and other nations.

There has accordingly been introduced in Congress, by Representative Nolan of California and Senator Kenyon of Iowa, a bill for the establishment of a permanent federal employment service and for cooperation of the states. This bill provides, furthermore, for a woman assistant director general, in order to guarantee proper attention to the questions of women's employment.

We believe that this bill should pass, and our national convention, just held in Philadelphia, has pledged the National Women's Trade Union League to do everything in its power to induce Congress to take favorable action. Feeling sure of your interest also, we are therefore sending you herewith a copy of the Kenyon-Nolan bill, and a statement of the work of the women's department of the existing U. S. Employment Service, with the request that you join us in urging your Representatives and Senators to support this bill.

Will you please write or telegraph to every Representative from your State, and to each member of the Labor Committee of each House, asking them to expedite the measure? Will you also have telegrams and letters sent by other influential people and organizations in your locality, in order that the members of Congress may realize that the country is deeply concerned in seeing the post-war labor problems adequately met? I enclose a list of the members of the House and Senate Committees on Labor.

You will be interested to know, in regard to the Woman-in-Industry Service, that the subcommittee dealing with the bill containing that appropriation is expected to consider the question next week. We have reason to believe that the many letters and telegrams that have come in from women and women's organizations everywhere are having effect, and we hope for a favorable report from the committee.

BILLS TO MAKE THE UNITED STATES EMPLOYMENT SERVICE PERMANENT

H.R. 4305 INTRODUCED IN THE HOUSE BY REPRESENTATIVE NOLAN MAY 31, 1919,

REFERRED TO THE COMMITTEE ON LABOR

S. 1442 INTRODUCED IN THE SENATE BY SENATOR KENYON JUNE 6, 1919,

REFERRED TO THE COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION AND LABOR

The text of the House bill is as given. Variations in the Senate bill, immediately follow the sections in which they appear.

A BILL

To provide for the establishment of a national employment system and for cooperation with the States in the promotion of such system and to regulate the expenditure of moneys that shall be appropriated for such purposes.

1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives
2 of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
3 That in order to promote the establishment and maintenance
4 of a national system of public employment offices the
5 United States Employment Service is hereby created a
6 bureau of the Department of Labor. There shall be a
7 director general of such bureau who shall be appointed by
8 the President. There shall be appointed by the Secretary
9 of Labor a woman assistant director general who, subject to

21 Sec. 3. That for the purpose of carrying out the pro-
22 visions of this act there is hereby authorized to be appro-
23 priated the sum of \$4,000,000 for the fiscal year ending
24 June 30, 1920, and for each fiscal year thereafter up to and
25 including the fiscal year ending June 30, 1922; that not less
