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June 2. 1919. Miss Alice Murdock, Still water, Minnesota. My dear Mrss Murdock: " We are indeed glad to learn thru Mrs. Forrestal that you have assumed the chairmanship of the Finance Correctee in Stillwater, to raise \$25.00 toward Woman Suffrage in Minnesota. I enclose with this, a copy of the estimated budget for the year's work, and the quotas that have been accepted by the various counties. There probably are several suffragists in your county who would like to subscribe \$10.00, or 15.00 each, and many who would contribute \$1.00 towards the cause of woman suffrage. One woman raised quite a sum by asking a number of women to raise 31.00 in 25 cent contributions. The following counties have already assumed their quotas: Hemmagin, Ronsey, St. Louis, Winona, Olmsted, Mue Earth, Wabashn, Micollet, Goodhue, Steele and Renville. The money can be paid at any time before October 1st. We should be very glad, indeed, to have part of it at least, before very long, as we are to pay our National Association about \$1,700.00 this year, and have not been able to send very much of this so far. Suffrage moves so fast these days that what was done last week now seems almost like ancient history. As you know, our Federal Amendment was passed May 21st by the House of Representatives by a very large vote, and we expect almost any day to learn that it has re-

As soon as possible after, that, we hope to have a grand jubilee, probably a meeting on the steps of the State Capitol, with an automobile parade from Minneapolis, with bands, speeches, Community Singing, and perhaps a pageant. We expect it to go thru. and we are planning to have a big colebration on the steps of the Capital in St. Paul as soon after the vote is taken as possible. If it would be passed tomorrow we expect to have our calebration on Friday evening. We work much want you to be one of our speakers. Governor Burnquist, Mayor Bodgson, Maria Sanford, and President Burton will speak. Of course, our plane are all tentative, but I want to ask you to maye that time for us if you promisly ean. Of course, we are prepared for further delay in the Senate, and I kope you are not going to be so far away that we can not secure you. We consider this one of the greatest events in the history of Suffrage, naturally, and we want to make our celebration correspond. One other question that we want your consideration, and you can give us your advise upon at a later date-; Our Mational Association is going to make a great effort to have enough states call special sessions of the Legislature in order to get this emendment ratified so that the women may vote in 1920. This looks rather formidable, but when we learned that the

Homewolf No Democratic Party at its Convention, is going to urge special sessions for this purpose; and also the Republicans are urging their claim to the women's vote, we believe it is a possibility on account of the political situation. Anyway please think it over in regard to our Minnesota legislature. I enclose a clipping which bears upon this subject. There is no limit to the time a special session can sit except the pocket books of the members. As you know some conditions exist in the State which might make it dangerous to call a special session with no restraint on the subjects to be considered. So far as legislation is concerned, it would have the same power as a general session. Personally I would have no objection to a special session if the governor could limit the subjects to be considered. Under existing conditions, I would want to consult some of the other members before I would feel like advising a special session.


So far as the soldiers are concerned, I feel that we are not in shape yet to pass legislation for the real benefit of the returned soldiers. The sixty dollar gift proposed last Winter does not help anybody and in my judgment it is the wrong way to reach the matter. Whatever we do for the soldiers, I want it to be a real lasting benefit to them and not a mere temporary makeshift. Many of them

Dear Friend:

The U. S. Employment Service, as you will recall, was left unprovided for by the last session of Congress, and the country is therefore at this moment facing the prospect of no federal agency, and no coordinated system of state sgencies, to deal with the great problem of finding jobs for men and women, and finding men and women for the jobs that must be filled in order to prevent unemployment on the one hand and to supply, on the other hand, the needs of our own and other nations.

There has accordingly been introduced in Congress, by Representative Nolan of California and Senator Kenyon of Iowa, a bill for the establishment of a permanent federal employment service and for cooperation of the states. This bill provides, furthermore, for a woman assistant director general, in order to guarantee proper attention to the questions of women's employment.

We believe that this bill should pass, and our national convention, just held in Philadelphia, has pledged the National Women's Trade Union League to do everything in its power to induce Congress to take favorable action. Feeling sure of your interest also, we are therefore sending you herewith a copy of the Kenyon-Nolan bill, and a statement of the work of the women's department of the existing U. S. Employment Service, with the request that you join us in urging your Representatives and Senators to support this bill.

Will you please write or telegraph to every Representative from your State, and to each member of the Labor Committee of each House, asking them to expedite the measure? Will you also have telegrams and letters sent by other influential people and organizations in your locality, in order that the members of Congress may realize that the country is deepy?concerned in seeing the post-war labor prob-I enclose a list of the members of the House and Senate lems adequately met? Committees on Labor.

You will be interested to know, in regard to the Woman-in-Industry Service, that the subcommittee dealing with the bill containing that appropriation is expected to consider the question next week. We have reason to believe that the many letters and telegrams that have come in from women and women's organizations everywhere are having effect, and we hope for a favorable report from the committee.

BILLS TO MAKE THE UNITED STATES EMPLOYMENT SERVICE PERMANENT H.R. 4305 INTRODUCED IN THE HOUSE BY REPRESENTATIVE NOLAN MAY 31, 1919, REFERRED TO THE COMMITTEE ON LABOR 9. 1442 INTRODUCED IN THE SENATE BY SENATOR KENYON JUNE 6, 1919, REFERRED TO THE COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION AND LABOR The text of the House bill is as given. Variations in the Senate bill, immediately follow the sections in which they appear. A BILL To provide for the establishment of a national employment system and for cooperation with the States in the promotion of such system and to regulate the orpenditure of moneys that shall be appropriated for such purposes. 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United states of America in Congress assembled, 3 That in order to promote the establishment and maintenance of a national system of public employment offices the 4 United States Employment Service is hereby created a 5 bureau of the Department of Labor. There shall be a 6 director general of such bureau who shall be appointed by 7 the President. There shall be appointed by the Secretary 8 of Labor a woman assistant director general who, subject to HOUSE BILL page 2 the director general, shall have general supervision of all 1 2 matters relating to the securing of employment for women, and there shall also be appointed such other assistants and 3 employees in the District of Columbia and elsowhere as 4 shall be necessary to carry out the purposes of this act. SENATE BILL: IN enacting clause page 1 line 8 after "PResident" there is inserted "and shall receive a salary of \$5000 per year." On bill page 2, line 2, after "empleyment for women" there is inserted "who shall receive a salary of \$3000 per year." In line 5, after "of this act" there is inserted "Other than . as above provided no salary in excess of \$2000 shall be paid. That it shall be the province and duty of the said bureau, under the direction of the Secretary of Labor, to 7 8 establish and maintain a national system of employment effices for men, women, and juniors who are legally qualified 10 to ongage in gainful occupations; and, in the manner here-11 inafter provided, to assist in establishing and maintaining systems of employment offices in the several States and 12 13 political subdivisions thereof, and to coordinate the public 14 employment offices throughout the country by furnishing and publishing information as to opportunities for employment, by 15 16 maintaining a system for clearing labor between the several 17 States, by establishing and maintaining uniform standards, policies, and procedure, and by assisting in the transportation of workers to such places as may be deemed necessary 18 19 for the purpose of securing employment.

SENATE BILL: In section/line 9, after "juniors" there is omitted "who are legally qualified to engage in gainful occupations". In line 15, after "information as to" there is omitted "opportunities for employment"; and inserted in place thereof "labor conditions". Sec. 3. That for the purpose of carrying out the pro-22 visions of this act there is hereby authorized to be appropriated the sum of \$4,000,000 for the fiscal year ending 24 June 30, 1920, and for each fiscal year thereafter up to and 25 including the fiscal year ending June 30, 1922; that not less Bill page 3 1 than 75 per centum of the money appropriated under this act shall be allotted by the Secretary of Labor among the 3 several States on the basis of their respective populations to 4 be available for the purpose of establishing and maintaining 5 systems of public employment offices in the several States 6 in accordance with the provisions of this act.
