As you know, the Federal Suffrage Amendment has been passed by both Houses of Congress, and is now before the State Legislatures for ratification.

In order that all the women of the country may be enfranchised so they can vote in 1920, our National Suffrage Association has opened a campaign to get special sessions called in as many states as is necessary to insure ratification.

In reply to your questions of the 10th inst. will say:-
NO to both questions numbers one (1) and two (2).
Because of the abnormal conditions brought on by the war I think it would be extremely unwise to expand the suffrage at the present time. Were I to vote for any change at this juncture it would be for such educational qualifications of the voter as would insure a reasonable degree of intelligence at the polls. Beautiful but impractical theories of government at this critical period of reconstruction could not have other than injurious and possibly destructive effects. Beyond all this I have found that a large portion of the female population made up of the more conservative and sensible elements are opposing suffrage. Until women are united in their demand and until this better and more substantial element desire it I shall be in opposition.

My Dear Mrs. Ueland:

In reply to your letter of yesterday will say that I believe it will hurry the more doubtful states along if a reasonably early extra session of our legislature were called. In view of the ease with which legislation in that line was passed last winter by our legislature there can not be any doubt but that a measure ratifying the amendment of the federal constitution enfranchising women will be passed as soon as the legislature meets.

I can not see that any thing can be gained by waiting, except that if our state should be one of the last ones to adopt such a ratification measure, so that enough states should ratify the same before the next election, then it would be unnecessary to submit the same question to the Minnesota electors at the 1920 election. If it should so happen that a rush is made by the legislative bodies of the different states to ratify the amendment so that it appears to be a foregone conclusion that it will be ratified by a sufficient number of states before our next election, then likely an act repealing the 1918 Minnesota act submitting the woman's franchise question to the voters could be passed; thereby saving the trouble and inconvenience connected with a campaign.

From the foregoing I assume that you feel that I will answer yes to both of the questions you submitted.

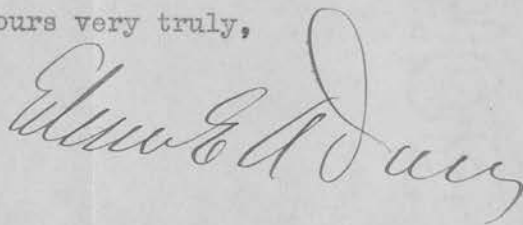

Replying to your favor of June 10th would say that I take the same stand that Gov. Burnquist does, that in case it would take Minnesota to ratify the Federal Suffrage Amendment I would be in favor of a special session for that purpose, but I do not think it advisable to call a special session if there were no hopes of passing the amendment in time for the women to vote at the next election.

As you know, we had to spend a lot of extra money this year and the taxes are going to be very high, and I feel that unless we will be assured that other states will join in so that we will have reasonable assurance of the measure passing, we ought not to go to that expense. As you well know, I will vote for the ratification of this amendment whether at the regular or special session.

I think the Governor has taken the right stand, as so much money was appropriated at the last session that we ought to be as frugal as possible in the expenditure of public funds unless there is a possibility of putting this thing over by the whole nation. I certainly hope there will be enough states ratify it so that we will find it necessary to call an extra session.

Answering yours of June 10th, would say that I intend to vote for the ratification of the Federal Suffrage Amendment whenever the matter is brought before the Legislature.

In regard to the calling of a special session, I cannot say that I am very enthusiastic about it, because I am a pretty busy man as a rule and my objection to a special session would perhaps largely be based upon selfishness, as I cannot very well spare the time at least in the near future. If some way could only be devised for the calling of a special session which would confine itself to the suffrage amendment there would not be any difficulty, but as you know, the trouble is that when a special session convenes, all ^{kind of} ~~cases~~ of Legislation may be taken up and we might be kept in session indefinitely. If a special session is to be called the suggestion of Governor Burnquist that it be called during the coming winter would rather appeal to me, but on the other hand, if the friends of suffrage could agree upon a special session for the purpose of ratifying this amendment and this only, I believe it would be a good idea to call the session very soon and dispose of it and go home.

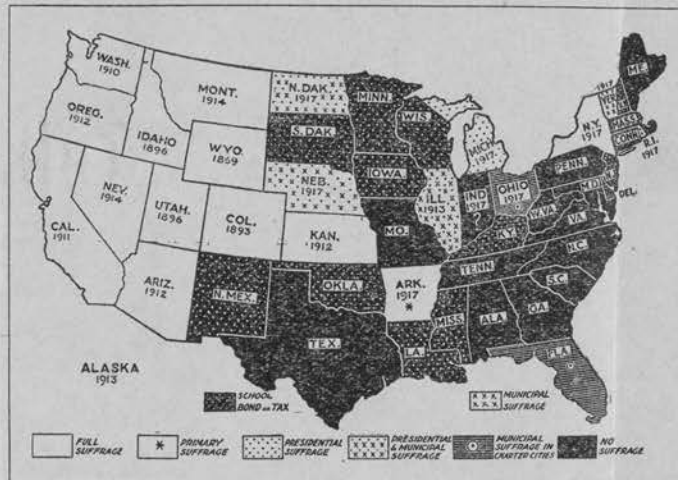

Dear Mr Stevens - Last summer
during my absence from home
a lady called at my house in re-
gard to suffrage work. Mr Schuber
later brought some literature to me
and I have had several letters. You
wonder of course if there are not a
few women in Herman who are
enough interested in the work to
get signatures to the petition. Well if
there are I do not know who they
are. I am not able to make a house
to house canvass. I asked Mrs A. V. Wells
if she could help but church and
Sunday school work besides her even-
ing takes up all of her time. Suffrage
is not popular here because the
men are opposed to it. We have had
two women on the school board for
several years but they say their
duties are very light. The women

to it that they are not put on
any important committees. I am
not an active Red Cross worker
nor a church worker and so of
course am not popular. Those
days are over for me. Besides I
am expected to do a man's part -
pay taxes, buy liberty bonds -
because I am a property holder
though that property has not
earned anything in account
of war conditions, and I am not
able to earn anything myself.
I want to help in the suffrage
work because I know it is needed
and is right but I see no way to
do anything here. But this is
not the only thing I want to write
about. Let me tell you a story:
Some ten years ago a young
girl and young man were en-
gaged to be married but found
they could not legally do so be-
cause the girl was an epileptic.
Later she gave birth to a child.
She and the child were sent
to a state institution. I believe
it is called a school for the

feeble minded. I saw her last summer and had a talk with her. She told me that she works at this institution and when I asked her if she had received any more education she said, no, she had not learned anything more than she knew when she went there. She told me she did not have fits except at certain times - during the menstrual period. Surely this place cannot be called a school, for during those ten years she could have been well educated. Is there not need of women to investigate such cases? Perhaps an operation or proper treatment might overcome the condition in her case. I do not know of any one who might be interested in such a case unless it be the suffrage women of the state. This is only one case there may be many others. Can anything be done?

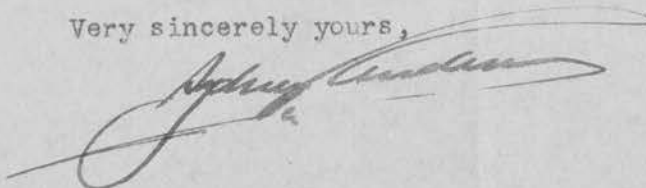

My dear Mrs. Noland: -

I am sending you by Parcel Post the signed petitions containing women's names. There are 877 in all. I have delayed sending them, as I was waiting for some who are still delinquent, to fill the blanks left with them. The women, who agreed to attend to the canvass of the third & seventh wards, have done nothing & it is no use asking them any more. Some of the others have done more than I expected. There would not be a large number of signers in the third & seventh wards, as they are

not as a whole the most intelligent
of our women. The third ward ^[2]
is largely Catholic. The canvass
has waked up a good many
women & has been good for
the cause.

I have in my possession two
flanks with the names of 9 +
11 names respectively, secured
by Miss Quayle. Mrs. Ahlers has
also started a list. We thought
it wiser to do nothing further
about them until there was
a prospect of their being needed.
If you think you ought to have
the signatures of the men, when
our Legislature meets to consider
the suffrage amendment, we
will make the effort to secure
them. Possibly they will not

be needed. Most of our intelligent men
signed willingly before. Senator Sullivan
is now in prison, so he does not need
the petition to or beat him. I wrote
him last winter that I had secured
the signatures of several hundred strong
members. I do not know how our repre-
sentative stands - he was opposed a year
ago. One of his sisters has signed the
petition.
