## ALL TELEGRAMS TAKEN BY THIS COMPANY ARE SUBJECT TO THE FOLLOWING TERMS:

2. In any event the Company shall not be liable for damages for any mistakes or delays in the transmission or delivery, or for the non-delivery, of this telegram, whether caused by the negligence of its servants or otherwise, beyond the sum of FIFTY DOLLARS, at which amount this telegram is hereby valued, unless a greater value is stated in writing hereon at the time the telegram is offered to the Company for transmission, and an additional sum paid or agreed to be paid based on such value equal to one-tenth of one per cent. thereof.

A deferred day service at rates lower than the standard day message rates as follows: One and one-half times the standard Night Letter rate for the transmission of 50 words or less and one-fifth of the initial rate for each additional 10 words or less.

#### SPECIAL TERMS APPLYING TO DAY LETTERS:

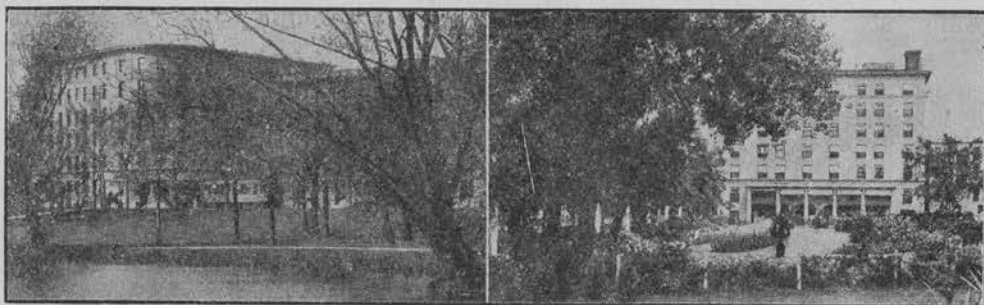

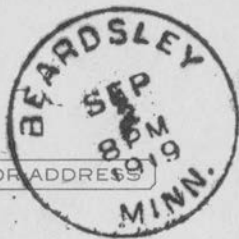

Dear Mrs. Ueland:-

I felt quite flattered at receiving your letter of inquiry but I am afraid I cannot give you an answer of any value. We are "considering" very seriously the question of changing our organization into a league of women voters and at a Board meeting on Friday a resolution was adopted favoring such action. There are, however, certain difficulties in the way of that change, the big stumbling block being the fact that we have not paid any part of our pledge to the National. It doesn't seem quite proper to turn the payment of this pledge over to a new organization. It occurs to me at the moment that we might run the two jointly for the period of time while our financial obligation to the National American Woman Suffrage Association continues. I mean we might call the association the Wisconsin Woman Suffrage Association and League of Women Voters. The legal side of the proposition remains a blank to my unlegal mind. In case the Wisconsin Woman's Suffrage Association ceases to exist and the League of Women Voters is created in its place I suppose we would surrender our Articles of Incorporation to the Secretary of State and secure others. You have the tentative platform of the league, have you not? It can be secured from Mrs. Brooks, the president or, I think, from the office of the National.

Let us know how you work this out. Am in hope to read good news from your state within a day or two.

What League of Women Voters is to hold a conference in Minneapolis? Is it the old Mississippi Valley Conference under a new name? I should like very much to come if it can be managed. Wisconsin needs all the enlightenment on this question that it can get. Our convention will probably be held October 17-18.






Dear Miss Wells,

I have examined the enclosed ratification resolution by the Minnesota State legislature and see no vital defects. There are incongruities and imperfections which are in my judgment not substantial objections to the validity of the resolutions, as for instance in No. 1 "this" for "the," assuming that the copy sent you, page 2, is correct.

The important thing is that section 1, (3), on page 1, the part necessary for the ratification is, I think, all right. Section 2 is no part of the ratification and need not be considered.

I would have been glad to see a better constructed resolution but I cannot think that the imperfections go to the validity of the act. If the resolutions were properly passed as they doubtless were, they are valid and I have no further suggestions.

JOINT RESOLUTION RATIFYING A PROPOSED TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

$\frac{2}{3}$  of both houses

WHEREAS, Both houses of the sixty-sixth Congress of the United States of America, by a joint resolution, a two-thirds majority of each house concurring therein, proposed an amendment to the constitution of the United States of America, which resolution reads as follows, to-wit:

"JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution Extending the right of suffrage to women.

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled (two-thirds of each House concurring therein), That this following article is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution which shall be valid to all intents and purposes as part of the Constitution when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several states.

'Article--\_\_\_\_\_.

'The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex

'Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation'".

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, By the legislature of the State of Minnesota:

Section 1. That the said proposed amendment to the Constitution of the United States of America be and the same is

hereby ratified by the legislature of the State of Minnesota.

Section 2. That the Secretary of State be and he is hereby directed to forward certified copies of this preamble and joint resolution to the presiding officer of the United States Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives of the United States and that he transmit official notice hereof to the Secretary of State of the United States as provided by the law of this State.

A joint resolution is a resolution of the joint assembly. See Sec 44 GS 1913
