Dear Mrs Useland:-

You are cordially invited to become a member of a national conference, which will meet in Cincinnati, Ohio, October 23, 24, and 25th, to consider the development of a definite, practical program for democratic social organization.

The conference meets on call of the National Social Unit Organization, which for the past two and a half years has been conducting a community experiment along certain well defined lines of citizenship and group organization in a section of Cincinnati. The conference is called to consider the bearing which these principles, as they have so far demonstrated themselves, have upon the whole field of democratic effort and to devise a future program upon the basis of past experience.

Within the past few weeks twelve national committees of distinguished experts, representing as many fields of social effort have been studying the Social Unit plan from the standpoint of public health, recreation, municipal administration, education, social work, industrial relations, religious work, statistics, etc. The reports and recommendations of these committees will be presented to the conference in the form of a specific program which will form the basis for exact discussion leading to action.

We all know that since the war first taught us the dynamic power in co-operative effort, the community movement has taken on gathering impetus, until now it affects every phase of our social life. The whole trend of the times is away from "welfare", "charity" and "paternalism" toward vital, co-operative democracy in which all of the people study their own needs and meet them through their own organized effort. Nevertheless the movement is still lacking in form, and nothing is more needed at this moment than a concrete program.

PURPOSE—To hasten the coming of a democracy both genuine and efficient, by building up on a basis of population units an organization through which the people can get a clear idea of their common needs and can utilize the technical knowledge of skilled groups in formulating and carrying out programs to meet those needs.

The conference is being organized out of the citizenship of the United States. Obviously under such circumstances it is impossible to arrange for the expenses of delegates, though it is our hope that many local organizations, of which yours may be one, will undertake the expenses of an official delegate.

A program for the conference will be sent you in a few days. Meanwhile we shall appreciate hearing from you as to the possibilities of your attending yourself, or of your organization delegating someone officially.

My dear Mrs. Ueland:

Your letter of Sept. 29th addressed to Mrs. Gellhorn was received during her absence from the City. Under separate cover, I am sending two of Miss Mary Bulkley's books, "An Aid to the Woman Voter in Missouri!"

I am also enclosing in this package copy of a suggested program for a Citizenship School which we are using in our citizenship school work, one for a three days school and one for a five days school, as well as suggested publicity with which we furnish our chairmen to be used in preparation for a school.

In this connection I think you may also be interested in the Model Constitution we issued to League presidents and the Instructions to County and League Chairmen.

The Model Constitution you will note was issued last spring and it will be necessary for them to be changed somewhat to apply to the League of Women Voters organization.

On Oct 16, 17, and 18 the State Convention of the Missouri Woman Suffrage Association is called for the purpose of merging the suffrage organization into the League of Women Voters. At this meeting the Constitution and By-Laws to govern the latter organization will be adopted, after which the Model Constitution will be furnished our Chairmen





Dear Suffragist:-

The Minnesota League of Women Voters was formed at the great Conference held in Minneapolis, October 28th and 29th. Our suffrage work in Minnesota is practically finished. Our Association will soon be dissolved.

What Next? Our very first duty is to take steps to become intelligent voters.

To this end an intensive five-day course has been arranged by the University of Minnesota acting in co-operation with the Minnesota League of Women Voters. The course, which represents a whole term's work compressed into five days time, was especially arranged for the benefit of the out-of-town woman in order that she might share in this opportunity to learn the fundamentals of government. The course begins November 17th, and in a series of afternoon and evening classes, will deal with such practical subjects as the structure of our government, - local and national, social and political problems now pressing for solution, and the principles underlying American institutions.

I am enclosing a printed program, every word of which should be read carefully. It is hoped that every suffragist will avail herself of this wonderful opportunity offered by this course which is designed as a preparation for the duties of citizenship.

This is in answer to your letter to Mrs. Ueland asking us to check up on your statistics regarding our state constitutional amendment.

The measure passed by our legislature January 22, 1919 was a joint resolution urging the Senate of the United States to vote favorably on the pending amendment to the federal constitution granting suffrage to women. The vote was as follows:

Jan. 22	-	House	-	100	-	28
" 23	-	Senate	-	49	-	7

The vote on the amendment to the state constitution giving full suffrage to women was taken as follows:

Passed	Jan. 22	-	House	-	96	-	26
Defeated	Feb. 28	-	Senate	-	40	-	21

Your figures on our Presidential Bill are correct, i.e.,

Mar. 5	-	House	-	103	-	24
" 21	-	Senate	-	49	-	11
" 24	-	Gov. Burnquist's signature.
