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CALL TO THE THIRTY-FOURTH ANNUAL CONVENTION OF THE MINNESOTA WOMAN SUFFRAGE ASSOCIATION

To the women of Minnesota:

The Annual Convention of the Minnesota Woman Suffrage Association will be held in the St. Paul Hotel, St. Paul, October 7, 8 and 9, 1915.

All women interested in the cause of human freedom are invited to the meetings of this Convention.

The very rapid growth of sentiment throughout the world, for our great cause, makes this meeting of extraordinary interest to us.

In nearly one-half of the territory of the United States women are politically free.

Eleven of the United States and one territory have granted full suffrage to women.

One state has given presidential and municipal suffrage.

In twenty states women have partial suffrage.

Four great Eastern states are to vote upon the question this fall. In Congress one-fourth of the Senate, one-sixth of the House and one fifth of the electoral vote comes from suffrage states.

Minnesota women are rapidly organizing the state by legislative districts and voting precincts, and in most of the congressional districts of Minnesota, committees have been formed to influence federal legislators.

Success for the cause in the United States is in sight.

Come to the Convention and help us to make it a memorable one.

DELEGATES.

Each club is entitled to four delegates, including the president, and one additional delegate for each ten members.

Delegates must come to the convention with credentials, properly signed by the president and secretary of the club.

Each club is urged to send its full quota of delegates. The association needs the co-operation and advice of all its members.

It is hoped that each club will instruct its delegates to make a liberal pledge for this year's work.

NOTE.—According to the present constitution, which was based on an association of clubs, the legislative districts are not legally entitled to delegates, but one of the chief purposes of the convention is to change the constitution so that the legislative work may legally as well as in reality become a part of the work of the association. One of the most interesting as well as significant features of the convention will be the reports of those newly-organized legislative districts.

REPORTS.

The secretary or president of each club, and legislative district should report all activities of her club or district for the past year. If it is not possible for a representative of the club or district to be present, this report should be mailed to the corresponding secretary before Oct. 7th.

REVISION OF CONSTITUTION.

Notice is hereby given that at this convention a revision of the Constitution to fit the present plan of organization will be presented by a committee of which Mrs. Albert R. Hall, of St. Paul, is chairman. Resolutions Passed At The 34 Annual Convention of the Minnesota Woman Suffrage Association, Oct. 1915. WHEREAS, the governments of two Canadian Provinces, Alberta and Manitoba, are taking steps to enfranchise their women, and, WHEREAS, Queen Wilhelmina has announced that the government of Holland will introduce a bill removing the political disability of the women of that country, therefore, BE IT RESOLVED, that we of the Minnesota Woman Suffrage Association in convention assembled give expression to our rejoicing with the women of these countries, and further, to our great rejoicing that President Wilson has announced his belief that the time has come to extend the privilege and responsibility of suffrage to women. WHEREAS, the world is aroused to a sense of calamity due to the ravages of war in Europe, therefore, BE IT RESOLVED, that we take our stand on the side of organized constructive effort for permanent world peace. WHEREAS, the abolition of the saloon is now an active issue in the state of Minnesota, therefore BE IT RESOLVED that we are unalterably opposed to the saloon as a menace to the home and strongly commend all effort to rid the community of this intolerable burden. WHEREAS, Suffrage amendments are pending in the states of New Jersey, New York, Massachusetts, and Pennsylvania, therefore, BE IT RESOLVED that we send messages of greeting to the women of these states expressing our earnest hope that they may be enfranchised at the coming election.

WHEREAS, the Minnesota Federation of Labor assembled in Convention at Winona, in July, 1915, rescinded many former declarations in favor of Woman Suffrage, therefore BE IT RESOLVED that we deplore this repudiation of the principle of democracy by the organized labor of our state. WHEREAS, publicity is one of the greatest assets of the Equal Suffrage movement, therefore BE IT RESOLVED that we express our appreciation to the press of St. Paul and Minneapolis for the generous space accorded us throughout the convention and during the past year. FINALLY WE RESOLVE that this Association express its grateful appreciation to our hostesses, the Political Equality Club and the Woman's Welfare League of St. Paul, and to all others who have by service and by gift contributed to the success of this convention.

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CALL TO THE THIRTY-FIFTH ANNUAL CONVENTION OF THE MINNESOTA WOMAN SUFFRAGE ASSOCIATION

The Annual Convention of the Minnesota Woman Suffrage Association will be held in the City of Minneapolis at the Radisson Hotel, December 4 and 5, 1916.

The purpose of this Convention is to establish among the women of Minnesota a common understanding of their needs; to foster in them a singleness of purpose which will bring results; to further that unity of action which will conserve energy; to hold before them a lofty ideal which will command universal respect and to strengthen in them a spirit of co-operation which must result in victory.

The year 1916 marks the entrance of Woman Suffrage into the political history of the United States.

All the National Political Parties have incorporated in their platforms a Woman Suffrage Plank.

The Presidential Candidate of a great party has declared favorably for a Federal Woman Suffrage Amendment.

Women voted for President for the first time in Illinois, Nevada, Montana, Kansas, Oregon and Arizona.

The map of North America is fast growing "White."

Within the last nine months equal suffrage has been extended to the women of four great Canadian Provinces, Manitoba, Alberta, Saskatchewan and British Columbia, which comprise a total area of over a million square miles, with a population of nearly two million.

All who are interested in the further advancement of this great cause and in the progress of civic righteousness are urged to attend the meetings of this Convention.

a humany by Mrs SA Stachtuell 1916 It is customary for the President of the Association to appoint at one of the summer meetings of the Executive Board. a Program Committee for the State Convention. This committee may consist of three, five or more members, one of whom is named as chairman. For convenience, most of the women on this committee are from the Twin Cities Usually ALL, but not necessarily. At the first meeting there should be roughly outlined, plans for the two full day sessions, two morning sessions which are devoted chiefly to reports and business, two afternoon sessions which should have something of interest for the general public as well as reports, and two evenings to fill. These evenings sessions have sometimes BOTH been open meetings with a program of addresses, music etc. Sometimes a banquet has been given on one evening, sometimes a reception. The Program Committee has full charge of all arrangments The President should formally notify the presidents of the local clubs to appoint a joint Committee of Arrangments to decide on the auditorium for all meetings, to make plans to entertain out of town delegates, to decorate the auditorium chosen, choose luncheon places for each day etc. It is important that this local Committee of Arrangments, immediately appoint an Entertainment Committee Chairman, for in all our advertising of the Convention we need to mention her name and address, and urge delegates to correspond with this chairman. This Executive Chairman secures places in advance in houses of suffragists for all out of Twin City delegates, most of whom will either write at the eleventh hour that they desire entertainment, or not write at all but APPEAR at the convention and expect a place Ushers and Bages should be provided by the local Committee of Arrangments. One member of the Program Committee should act as Press Committee for advertusing the convention, and assisting the reporters of Twin City papers at the convention. You will see by the enclosed programs which may be suggestive, that there is always at the first session the item, "Appointment of Committees", This is for the President to do and should be thought out beforehand and women asked to serve. Here is an opportunity to recegnize out of Twin City people. The committees referred to are Credentials, Z members Resolutions 3 members 5 members Finance Hospitality. 3 members or more

3 The old custom was to open each session with prayer by a local minister, but of late we have dispensed with that. Better discuss it in committee however. It is important to have the names of the officers, directors and chairman of Standing Committees some where on the program, as the list is needed at election time. The treasurer should call upon the Auditor just before the convention, to audit her books and accounts, setting a day for them. The Treasurer should also provide and send to each club president, the credential blanks, informing her of the number of delegates to which her club is entitled. I make all these suggestions as so much depends upon the preliminary work of a convention and of course I have learned much by experience some of it a bit trying

Resolutions offered at the 35th Annual Convention of the Minnesota Woman Suffrage Association, December 1916 Before the recent National election all political parties endorsed the principle of woman suffrage, and Whereas, since our last annual convention, four Canadian provinces, Alberta, Manitoba, British Columbia and Saskatchewan have given full suffrage to their women, Resolved, that we of the Minnesota Woman Suffrage Association in convention assembled give expression to our rejoicing at these and at many other indications of the progress of woman suffrage in our own part of the world. Whereas, it is generally recognized by suffragists and others that the opportunity is ripe to carry our movement on to complete victory in the near future, and that the passage of a amendment Federal has become an undoubted possibility, but Whereas, it has been amply demonstrated that national Bolmore suffrege can ware to won without the specific help of the individual states than state suffrage Whereas, it has been amply demonstrated that suffrage through Federal action can no more be won without the specific help of the individual states that suffrage through state action can be won without activity in the counties, Be it Resolved, by this Association that we affirm our belief in the necessity for immediate, unremiting, organized work and publicity in our states and in all its counties. Finally We Resolve that the Association express its gratitude to the Press of the state for the generous space it has accorded us at this time and throughout the year, and to our own chairman of the Press and Publicity Committee for the splendid results she has accomplished in obtaining publicity for suffrage through the state, and to the Radisson Hotel management for its unfailing courtesy and great generosity.

ADDRESS OF MRS. ANDREAS UELAND BEFORE ANNUAL CONVENTION OF THE MINNESOTA WOMAN SUFFRAGE ASSN. Dec. 4, 1916.

The most significant development of the suffrage movement in the United States the past year is the persistent, determined and almost universal demand for the passage of the Federal Amendment. The women of the nation have made up their minds that to be obliged to ask for their political freedom from every man of every race and color and with every degree of intelligence is a burden and likewise a humiliation that they should not be asked to bear. Minnesota women are especially in earnest in working for this measure because our state has a tight-locked constitution, which permits no amendment which has any opposition to pass, and which provides that all voters who do not vote on the amendment are counted as against it .. The question of women suffrage has become a national one. It is in practical operation in twelve states. An immense amount of favorable public sentiment has been created as shown in the resolutions adopted by hundreds of national organizations for other objects, representing millions of men and women members, while not one has gone on record in opposition. Its own membership has increased by hundreds of thousands, and most significant of all every political party has put in its platform a plank for woman suffrage and every presidential candidate has expressed himself in favor of it.

Minnesota suffragists join with the National Association in demanding that congress shall recognize this situation but submitting without delay an amendment to the federal constitution which shall secure nation-wide woman suffrage. We call attention to the increased public opinion in favor of national legislation. We hold that the doctrine of states rights would not be violated by the submission of a national amendment for woman suffrage since it would have to be ratified by three-fourths of the state legislatures which are elected by popular vote. The four Canadian provinces, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia, have given

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America will fail to give its women what the Canadian women enjoy under a monarchy. We will ask from the Legislature just elected to pass a presidential bill. The legislature of every state may confer upon women the right to vote for presidential electors regardless of the restrictions of the state constitution. The federal constitution bestows this right in the article which declares that each state shall appoint in such manner as the legislature thereof may direct, its number of electors, etc. We believe that at present this is the greatest service the Minnesota Legislature can do to advance the cause of thefreedom of women. To pass this measure will not only give to Minnesota women greater power and influence but will give great impetus and strength to the national movement.

Our National Association, directed by its splendid leader, Mrs. Catt, has outlined a great plan of work which includes organization, press work, circularization and monthly demonstrations, all of which are to be concentrated upon and to lead up to the final passage and ratification of the Federal Amendment. One million dollars is to be raised and spent in the United States this year for suffrage. Minnesota women must do their share. \$30,000 is to be raised in this state and that amount is to be apportioned to the different congressional districts, divided among the counties and sub-divided so that every town and precinct may do its share, so divided that no one community need be overburdened. Every suffragist of Minnesota will be asked to work to contribute towards this great united effert by which we may reach the goal of enfranchising all the women of the United States, within a few years. We agree with the public sentiment that recently declared the ballot was of such great value and importance as to demand that a special session of the lgislature should be called to pass an act enabling the soldiers on the Mexican Border to vote at the recent We deloare that a government which guards so carefully the election. rights and privileges of the citizens on the border should be equally solicitious to do justice to its women. Women of Minnesota must make haste

and join in a united effort to throw off from all women the country for all time, the indignity and the injustice which places them, in regard to the franhise, with the group who are morally unfit or mentally defective or undeveloped.

Dec. 10-11, 191 EXECUTIVE THE Recommends: THE FEDERAL AMENDMENT That the National American Woman Suffrage Association concentrate its utmost endeavors to secure the passage of the Federal Amendment by the 65th Congress during the early months of 1918. 2. That if the 65th Congress fails to submit the amendment before the Congressional election of 1918 a number of Senatorial and Congressional Districts be selected equal to the number of votes necessary to change the result in each House, and that a campaign against candidates opposing the Federal Amendment be made in the 1918 elections. In our opposition to individual candidates, loyalty to the Federal Amendment shall not take precedence over loyalty to the country. That a compact of State Associations willing and ready to conduct campaigns for ratification of the Federal Amendment be formed. That as soon as the Federal Amendment be passed, the Washington House be sublet, if possible, and a Campaign Headquarters opened in Chicago, or St. Louis. 5. That the Board of Directors be authorized to call a midyear meeting of the Executive Council in a centrally located City for the purpose of consideration of plans for the ratification of the Federal Amendment if it shall have passed Congress, or plans for the Congressional Elections if it shall not have passed. THE STATE CAMPAIGNS That Kentucky be asked not to proceed to referendum in 1918. That Nebraska be asked not to submit the entire question 7. to vote in 1918 by the circulation of an initiative petition. 8. That a definite offer of help be made to South Dakota when the needs and plans of the State have been set forth by the President. That a visit of survey be made to Oklahoma and that no aid be extended to the campaign unless assurances which seem reliable can be obtained from the two dominant political parties.

-2-10. That Massachusetts be urged to do its utmost to prevent a referendum from the Constitutional Convention. 11. That the Michigan Convention to be held in January be urged to consider carefully the needs of the campaign and to take definite and clear action as to what it will do and what help it wants from the outside. 12. That the request of Arkansas be considered and advisory action taken. WAR SERVICE (a) That the National American Woman Suffrage Association continue the four special departments devoted to war service, namely, Food Production, Thrift or Food Saving, Americanization and Economic Protection. (b) That a new department designed to maintain the Weman's Hospital Unit in France be established. (c) That these five departments be placed under the direction of a Committee, the Chairman of which shall be a member of the National Board. (d) That each State auxiliary be asked to establish a War Service Committee, composed of a Chairman, and Chairmen of each of the five special departments of suffrage war service together with an additional one on Liberty Loans. This Committee of Seven shall direct the war service for each State Association and shall work in co-operation with the State Division of the Woman's Committee of the Council of National Defense in each State. CONSTITUTION 14. That the Board of Directors be increased by the addition of four new members. 15. That the rule established last year be continued, that is, that the Board be permitted to appoint four Chairmen of main departments who shall be members of the Board but without a vote. 16. That all questions concerning the Budget for the National Association be referred to the Executive Council instead of the Convention.



THE CALL

The past year in Minnesota has been the most tragic in its history. It has seen its sons march away to the great war, many of them never to return. In common with the rest of the world, a dangerous sickness has spread over its cities and towns and countryside, claiming hundreds of victims. And its crowning and peculiar woe has been the forest fires which have devastated some of our fairest land, which destroyed a thousand lives and the homes of thousands of our citizens.

We are a stricken people and yet, in spite of all, it is a time for thanksgiving.

The Great War is over. Our Minnesota boys have played a noble and thrilling part in averting the danger that threatened civilization. Those left in the fire swept regions are making a brave stand against the forces of discouragement and despair. They are rebuilding their homes and taking up the threads of their broken lives while our citizens are rallying to their assistance with sympathy and energy.

A strong determination and zeal has arisen to build a better civilization. Women will be partners with men in this reconstruction as they have been in the sorrows and labors that are past.

They will need mightily the tool—the ballot—that will make their aims and opinions effective, that will give power to the viewpoint of mothers and teachers and industrial workers.

The end of the long road of our suffrage association is in sight. Our cause is gaining momentum day by day. As with the end of the great war, our victory, when it comes, will come suddenly.

Three states—Michigan, South Dakota and Oklahoma—have rolled up great majorities in favor of suffrage amendments; and in Louisiana, the first southern state to have a referendum vote on woman suffrage, the amendment received a favorable vote throughout the state only to be defeated by the vote in New Orleans.

The Federal Suffrage Amendment is pending in the United States Senate having been passed by a two-thirds vote in the House of Representatives. The recent elections indicate the final passage of the amendment in Congress before many months.

We must see to it that our Minnesota Legislature does its share in helping to enfranchise the women of the country by duly ratifying the amendment.

We are of course extremely sorry this action is forced upon us because we hoped many of our out-of-town workers would meet with us and together we could make plans that would make Minnesota's Suffrage quota assured.

But after all it is only another manifestation of the confusion of the day. Let us take hope and courage from the certainty that our cause is gaining day by day.
