ORGANIZING COUNTRY DISTRICTS

To organize a county, follow the same general line as in organizing a city. Use the legislative district as a unit. (Where there are more than one county in a district it may be found advisable to subdivide into counties). The township is the election unit in the country as the precinct is in the city. Therefore the township is the logical subdivision of a rural legislative district.

It is usually advisable to begin work in the most important town in a district presumably the county seat, as that is the place easiest of access by train and most frequently visited by residents of the surrounding country.

MAKE A SURVEY of the district, learn its local conditions, type of inhabitants, nationality, etc., its clubs and its churches. Discover who are its leading women and decide who you wish to have elected district officers. Arrange for organization meeting; explain plan thoroughly, - What a Legislative District is; Why we use it as a Unit; What is expected of a district association; The Advantages of a Non-dues Paying Plan, and our system of Financing Suffrage work.

HAVE THE FOLLOWING OFFICERS ELECTED : - President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer. Submit Form of Constitution (on file at headquarters) for adoption. Call the officers together immediately and appoint the following committees: Press, Organization, Finance, Literature, Extension and Membership.

It is wise to have officers elected for ~~sixty~~ stated periods, -Six months or a year, so that those who prove undesirable can be eliminated without friction.

SUMMER ACTIVITIES

The organizer should especially stress automobile trips; county fairs; Chautauquas; Canvassing Parties and street meetings as summer work.

The success of an organizer depends largely upon her adaptability, her understanding of those with whom she must work, her patience and perseverance. She should have before her always the vision of what her work means and allow no amount of indifference and apathy to discourage her, remembering that these are always the bitterest foes of progress.

PLAN OF WORK FOR SUFFRAGE DISTRICT ASSOCIATION

REMEMBER that the object of all suffrage organization is to create favorable sentiment for woman suffrage to the end that our legislature may pass suffrage legislation and that we may ultimately win in a suffrage campaign. Let every activity of your association look toward this.

HOLD QUARTERLY MEETINGS FOR THE DISTRICT. Prepare interesting programs and see that they are thoroughly advertised. (See "How to Advertise a Meeting.") Study your constitution and live up to its provision. Have your executive committee meet frequently to discuss work and make reports. ~~XXXXXX~~

Committees can be created as the organization grows and the president finds that she needs them.

DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

ORGANIZATION

It shall be the duty of this Committee to organize ~~extraneous~~ a section of the district association in every township in the district; where it is found impossible to form a section secure a chairman to do the necessary work.

EACH TOWNSHIP SECTION should be a small edition of the district association, having its own officers, and taking care of the township in the same way that the district association takes care of the district. The chairman of organization should supply every township chairman with a list of the voters in her township and urge that she have each family interviewed as to its standing on woman suffrage, carefully listing the names not only of those who are favorable but of those who are indifferent or opposed and their reason for so being. This report should be turned over to the literature committee in order that suitable literature may be supplied them. A county polling list can be secured from the court house.

Each Township section should hold a meeting at least once a month. They should not be affiliated with any other organization because they must appeal equally to every class and creed. The organization chairman should ask for reports from the township chairman at least once a month.

EXTENSION

It shall be the duty of this Committee to push suffrage propaganda wherever it is possible. Know how all ministers stand on suffrage and get them to preach suffrage ser-

mons; get speakers before churches, aid societies, women's clubs, farmers organizations or any kind of possible audience. In working for ready made audiences one gets a suffrage speech to people who from lack of interest would never come to a suffrage meeting

FARMERS' CLUBS are extremely important. We depend on the rural vote to win our campaigns.

COUNTY FAIRS. Make a special effort for a demonstration at your County Fair. Secure a booth, decorate with bunting, pennants, posters, etc., and arrange for a speaker where possible. (Decorations and speakers will be furnished from headquarters upon request.)

Work in co-operation with the Literature and Membership Committees. The Distribution of suitable literature and the taking of enrollments are the important features of all demonstrations.

Chautauquas. Secure permission for a suffrage speaker at your chautauqua. If that is impossible, at least use your influence to see that someone already on the program makes a plea for suffrage. Suffrage buttons and pennants ought to be much in evidence on such occasions and literature freely distributed.

Automobile trips. There is no better way to extend suffrage work than by automobile trips through your county. Get as many suffragists as possible to furnish their automobiles, decorate them, and take with you a speaker and several helpers who will distribute literature, take enrollments, take the collection, etc. Advertise that you will be in certain towns at certain hours of a given day, and when you arrive hold street meetings. You should be able to cover four towns at least, in a day. This is most profitable because the machines passing through the county create an interest in suffrage where none has been felt before. It is also pleasant and ought to be easy of accomplishment.

LITERATURE COMMITTEE

The Chairman of the Literature Committee must work in close co-operation with the chairmen of Organisation, and Extension Committees, in order that she may know the kinds of literature that they find desirable for use in their work. She must see that the supply is on hand for their use, must know how much is distributed and arrange for distribution at all public demonstrations, meetings, etc. It is important that every one shall have as much literature as is necessary of the right kind and that no supplies shall be wasted.

MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

It shall be the duty of this important committee to devise ways of increasing membership, circulating enrollment blanks at all public meetings, places of public demonstration, arranging house to house canvasses, etc. Its reports must consist of a comparison of numbers each month in order that the increase in membership may be noted.

FINANCE COMMITTEE

FINANCE COMMITTEE

As nothing worth doing can be accomplished without money, this is perhaps the most vital and important of any committee. The duty of this committee is to devise ways or means for financing suffrage work for the district association. The chairman should understand the plan which has been worked out by the state suffrage association and should know what the apportionment of her district is. She should be conscientious and earnest in her determination to raise that amount and to send the district's full share to the state treasury. A systematic plan of giving should be worked out--each member should be reminded that the association is not dues paying and ea should be asked for a voluntary contribution. This is perhaps, when systematically carried out, the very best plan for raising money. There are, however, other methods which have not only the value of getting funds, but also promote propaganda. Subscriptions to the Woman's Journal should be taken and sent in to State Headquarters. On each subscription at \$1.00 a year, your association will receive 30¢. Suggestions for money raising have been compiled and will be supplied the chairman of the Finance Committee.


PRESS COMMITTEE:

It should be the duty of the Press Chairman to find out how each editor in her district stands on suffrage. This may be done by sending out post-cards, asking for an expression of sentiment by a personal interview or in any way that suggests itself. If he opposes suffrage, know why, and see that suitable literature is sent to him.

Get suffrage propaganda stories into the papers whenever it is possible. Get notices of every bit of suffrage news into all the papers. Send clippings from the district papers to Mrs. Walter Thorp, state press chairman, 403 Essex Bldg. Minneapolis, for filing.

The Press work is one of the most important things that is done by suffragists as through the newspapers we speak to our largest audiences, and it is the newspapers which create ~~suffrage sentiment~~ public sentiment. Take news from the Woman's Journal and get it inserted in the district papers. Never miss sending a good story to the papers, no matter how often they fail to use them. One never knows when something may be printed.

It may prove desirable to have other committees as the work grows, but from ~~year~~ new organization the above are all that are essential. Each committee should work with all the others, and the township sections should be as closely in touch with the district association as they can be made. Remember that numbers are what count when we attempt to bring pressure upon our legislature, or when a suffrage bill is voted upon at the polls, and so work to enlarge your membership. A big enrollment is the best answer to the argument that women do not want to vote,

Do not neglect your "Home-Coming" Days and "Harvest Picnics". Have a suffrage speech at every one if possible. They are next in importance to your County Fair.

CONSTITUTION

NAME

The name of this organization shall be the "Woman Suffrage Association of the _____ District."

OBJECT

Its object shall be to obtain the enfranchisement of the women of Minnesota at the earliest possible date.

MEMBERSHIP.

Any resident of this District, over eighteen years of age, who believes in woman suffrage is eligible to membership.

Membership is obtained by signing the enrollment blank furnished by the Association.

OFFICERS.

The officers shall be:

Leader *President*
Vice-Leader *V-* "

Secretary

Treasurer.

Their duties shall be such as usually pertain to such offices in like organizations.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS.

Officers shall be elected at the annual district convention, and shall assume the duties of their offices at the next regular meeting of the Association. The fiscal year shall begin in May and the convention shall be held on a specified day in that month.

NOMINATIONS.

A nominating committee shall be elected at the meeting preceding the annual meeting. After it makes a report, opportunity shall be given for nominations from the floor. The vote shall be taken by ballot. All duly accredited delegates from township branches are entitled to vote. Each township chairman shall be notified two weeks before election, of the ticket to be recommended by the nominating committee that her delegates may vote intelligently.

REPRESENTATION.

The officers of each township branch and five delegates elected by the branch shall be members of the convention and entitled to all its rights and privileges.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Executive shall be composed of the officers of the Association, Chairmen of standing committees, and three members-at-large, who must be recommended by the officers and voted upon by the general body. Its duties shall be to administer the business of the Association, and to direct its policy subject to the approval of the general body. In cases of emergency, the committee is authorized to act for the Association without waiting for the vote of the Association. It shall meet once a month & upon call of the president. ~~Secretary~~

B Y -- L A W S .

The Association is not dues-paying. Its support must come from voluntary contributions and the special efforts of its members. It is not affiliated with any other organization, and is absolutely non-partisan.

MEETINGS.

The District Association shall hold quarterly meetings, in February, May, August, and November. These meetings shall be held at such time and places as will best suit a majority of the members. No two consecutive meetings shall be held in the same town.

Each township branch shall hold monthly meetings upon a fixed day of the month. At such meetings, reports of all committees must be rendered, and a short educational program provided.

as many other meetings may be held as are deemed advisable

REPORTS.

Each township Chairman shall report monthly in writing to the President District Leader, upon the work of her branch, especially upon the increase in membership. The District Leader shall report in the same to the State President.

Note
The President is recommended to write to newly appointed Township Chairmen promptly ~~telling her nothing~~ thanking her for ^{her} co-operation & making her feel that she & her Section are ^{an} important ~~factor~~ part of the District Association. When ever District officers are elected

the secretary should notify all Township

HOW TO ADVERTISE A MEETING

1. Secure non-partisan place such as court house or hall to which people are in the habit of going.
2. Decorate with suffrage banners, slogans, etc.
3. Get most prominent man in town to introduce the speaker, generally the mayor.
4. Get two or three popular and prominent men to make five minute speeches on "Why I Am A Suffragist."
5. Have as many influential people sit on platform with the speakers as possible; it gives prestige to the meeting.
6. Have several attractive girls act as ushers wearing suffrage ribbon badges.
7. Use your newspapers, have long interesting stories about the speaker with her picture. Announce the local people who are to speak or who have any part in the meeting.
8. Get the best music obtainable, the local band or orchestra when there is one, or the High School Glee Club, or any good local talent.
9. Get the picture shows to run slides announcing the meeting.
10. Put in country calls on the long distance telephone.
11. Do endless chain telephoning to people in town.
12. Paint the announcement on side-walks (Get powdered chalk and wet it with water and use small brush; very easily done.)
13. Get the ministers to announce the meeting in church and to say a word for the cause of suffrage at the same time.
14. Have announcements made at all club meetings, aid societies, or any other kind of gathering and urge people to attend.
15. Put up posters of meeting in windows all over business part of town.
16. Distribute hand bills liberally.
17. Do much personal work, talk to your friends and praise your speaker, tell all the good things you know about her.
18. Decorated autos driven about town with an announcement on them make good publicity; one auto carrying a megaphone will do wonders.
19. Meet your speaker at the train to make her arrival as much of an event as possible (and incidentally it helps her wonderfully). This will create interest in her personality and will help the meeting.
20. Have announcement made in schools when possible; the teachers will often write it on the board and have pupils copy it to take home to parents.
21. These things will assure a good attendance at meetings and will help your suffrage work more than you imagine.

SUGGESTIONS FOR SUFFRAGE WORK

1. Secure polling list and be prepared to address envelopes for circularizing. We will circularize the state in February and March and will need your help.
2. Canvass voters on polling list to see how each one stands on suffrage.
3. Borrow a window or space in one, and decorate it. Put in big suffrage map, suffrage slogans, or pieces of suffrage literature so that passers-by can read it; change decorations often.
4. Use the paper pennants in every window possible, business and residence.
5. Use your newspapers. Have as many good suffrage stories as possible.
6. Get the ministers to preach suffrage sermons.
7. Have an evening at the picture show; this is excellent both as a money maker and for propaganda. Managers will secure films. "Your Girl and Mine" or "The Ruling Power." are best. Suffragists usually decorate the theatre - advertise the evening - ~~xxx~~ sell tickets and have a share of the profits. There is also usually time given for a short speech.
8. Keep your railroad station supplied with literature.
9. Have an auto trip thru the country if possible. Decorate machines, stop at every house, have literature, get signatures of all if they will sign enrollment slips, find out man's position on question of suffrage.
10. Appoint finance committee of which the treasurer is a part to consider ways and means of raising money. This is most important not only because we need money for the work but because it makes men especially realize we are in earnest. A canvass for money from every one who believes in suffrage is urged. Suffrage teas, cooked food sales etc., are all good methods to use. We must do everything we can to help, in even a small way, to raise the million dollar fund.
11. Try to see that a meeting is held and at least a small group of women is working in every town in your county or district.
12. Committees should be appointed for this work. No one person can even approximate doing it all---and besides, the more people who are working, the more general will the interest be.

Plan of Organizing the Minnesota Woman Suffrage Association by Legislative Districts

PROGRAM OF WORK.

1st STEP.—The appointment of an Organizer or an Organizing Committee for each Legislative District. These appointments may be made from the existing suffrage clubs and need not be of residents of the district.

2nd STEP.—The provision of a large amount of "Rainbow Literature," and of enrollment blanks. The money for this purpose may be supplied by the State Association or existing clubs.

3rd STEP.—The calling by each Organizer, or the Organizing Committee of a local convention in the District which she is organizing composed of all the known suffragists, both men and women, who reside in her District. For this purpose, the boundary lines of the District must be studied and all names set into the proper District according to residence. Do not hesitate to call the convention even if not more than a few persons are known to be suffragists. The object is only to make a start. At this convention a District Leader must be chosen who must reside in the District and who will be known as the Leader for the District. Also, an attempt must be made to secure as many persons as possible who will act as Chairmen of the Election Precincts, serving under the Leader.

4th STEP.—As soon as possible, the District Leader should call her chairmen together to consult as to the best way in which to proceed to cover the work in hand. This is to enroll every man and woman in the District as a member of the association by signing of an enrollment blank. She should tell them the exact boundaries of their Precincts, give them a full supply of "Rainbow Literature," enrollment blanks, and if possible, lists of names of residents, voters' lists, church lists, etc., to aid them in their work. She should fill them with enthusiasm, suggesting various methods of getting the registration, such as house-to-house canvass, small parlor meetings, big public assemblages, sociables, suffrage teas, dissemination of literature by hand or by mail, persuasive argument, outdoor speaking, debates, automobile trips, etc. Upon the enthusiasm of the Leader and the diligent work of the Chairman depends everything.

5th STEP.—The District Leader may form a District Club, with dues, composed of all those who are willing to pay dues and direct the activities of the District work. The Leader may or may not be the President. The Chairmen may well belong to this Club, as well as anyone who is desirous of taking a more active part than that of an enrolled member merely. The financial burden of the work must be solved by the Club, and it should be the center of activity for the District. There should be a Secretary and Treasurer, officers to be elected annually. Clubs joining the State Association pay dues at the rate of ten cents each member. The Club should meet at least once a month.

6th STEP.—The extension of this plan over the entire State, conventions of Leaders being called to elect a County Committee (if there is more than one District in the County) and a State Committee. These conventions are to be called once a year, with duly elected delegates; and the procedure should follow as closely as possible the political organizations of the men.

7th STEP.—Put the full force of your membership behind your Representative in the Legislature, and compel him to favor the Woman Suffrage Bill. Do the same thing in regard to your Senator.

Remarks.—In those districts in which there are no organizations one woman may volunteer as a Precinct Chairman, or a group of women may form themselves into a volunteer band of organizers, and follow the same general line of procedure. Maps showing boundaries of Districts and Precincts may usually be secured from the headquarters of the political parties. Each Election Precinct Chairman should keep a copy of the signatures she gets, but should send the enrollments themselves to her Leader. As soon as possible a County Headquarters should be established, and full lists of the enrolled membership kept there.

PLAN FOR CITY ORGANIZING

in district

Must find

In planning to organize ~~a city~~ for Suffrage, one must bear in mind that one must work almost entirely with untrained, volunteer workers, most of whom have home and other duties. This necessitates subdividing the work until it will not be a hardship upon anyone. At the same time, it should be made so thorough and democratic that everyone will have a part in it.

Bear in mind that the best results are gotten by definite attention to detail; give definite instructions as to what is expected from those who promise to work; then supply them with unlimited impetus from the central office; engender enthusiasm by continual demand for service and repeated expressions of appreciation.

Because a legislative district is the political unit from which a state senator and representatives are elected, a legislative district suffrage association can be logically used to influence the votes of senators and representatives in the legislature, therefore the legislative district has been adopted as the unit for suffrage organization. (The size of a legislative district is based upon population. In Minnesota a senator cannot represent less than 5,000 inhabitants; a representative not less than 2,000. There are, therefore, usually several legislative districts in cities, while in rural communities a legislative district often takes in the whole county and sometimes several counties. In Minneapolis there are nine legislative districts, in St. Paul there are six.)

Using the legislative district as a unit of organization :-

Appoint or elect district leaders. As a basis upon which to work, Supply each leader with a list of all enrolled suffragists who live in her district; a list of those who have signed "I believe" cards and of those women who voted at the last school election; a list of women's clubs and churches in her district; a map of her district showing wards and precincts, and any other information available concerning local conditions. Tell her that an average of one half day (four hours) each week, conscientiously devoted to work in her district will be enough to organize it in a few months.

(1) A district leader's duties would naturally be to divide her district into wards, find a chairman for each ward and have the ward chairman work with the precincts, but since a large majority of the districts comprise only one ward, it would be as well to drop the ward division and have the district leader work directly with the precinct.

The precinct is the voting unit.

With the leader's equipment for work, send her instructions as follows:-

INSTRUCTIONS

Give a definite amount of time each week to your district work. Think of your district as a collection of precincts. Begin work in the one nearest your home by calling upon any suffragist whom you feel has the qualifications of a precinct chairman. When you have found one who will accept the office, appoint her and at once telephone her name to the headquarters that she may be officially notified of her appointment.

Furnish her promptly with the same equipment for her precinct that you have received for your district, namely :-

/ A map of her precinct, her lists, etc., with definite instructions as to methods of work.
Make your instructions clear and definite, remember how hard it would have been for you to have gone to work without directions. Be sure also to show interest in and appreciation of her efforts. Tell her to divide her precinct into at least ten sections, finding a chairman for each section, and instructing her chairmen ~~toward the maximum work~~ as to her duties. Continue until every precinct has a chairman. It will then be your province to see that the precinct chairman organize their sections as you have done the precincts.

Have monthly meetings of all officers in your district and insist upon definite reports. Tell them that you must report at your Board Meeting and must make your report from theirs. Insist that they find section chairmen so that their work is divided. Remember that no one can do everything and do it well. Two hours a week of earnest work from a precinct chairman should organize a precinct easily within a few months.

Keep in touch with the headquarters constantly. Above all remember that district work is the most fundamental work attempted by suffragists, therefore the most honorable. To organize a district is definitely to advance the coming of woman suffrage because it is building up a machine for efficient service, and will be of value to women not only in obtaining the vote but as a civic organization afterwards.

Do not be discouraged by apathy or indifference or even active opposition. Nothing worth doing is done without persistent effort. Call upon the organization committee at the headquarters at all times for help and suggestions.

SECTION CHAIRMEN

The duties of a section chairman are to know how every individual in her section stands on the suffrage question; ⁶ to distribute literature that would meet their needs

of the particular objections that she hears expressed. To arrange for meetings when possible, or to get a speaker before any group of people; to increase the enrollment in her section, and to notify her precinct chairmen of changes in the addresses of members, as it is the duty of the precinct chairman to do these same things in her precinct.

The Organizer should see that the district leader does not neglect to furnish her precinct chairmen with the necessary equipment. In addition to this it is a good thing to send an official appointment card to her with a letter of welcome from the headquarters. The same method should be followed by the section chairman.

It is well to keep a chart at headquarters for each district showing the name of the leader, and the names, addresses and telephone numbers of all precinct and section chairmen. This inspires competition as anyone can see at a glance how nearly complete is the organization in any district and it is easy to make comparison.

The organizer should spend much time and thought in devising methods of keeping in touch with every worker in the field. Monthly letters should be sent out asking for reports and giving inspiration and encouragement. A list of newly enrolled members should be sent monthly to every district leader, who in turn should pass each precinct chairman hers, with the request that these new members be called upon or communicated with by telephone, made welcome and asked what they would like to do for suffrage. Also a certificate of membership should be sent to each new member from headquarters.

The organizer should hold quarterly conferences of district officers and establish a training class for precinct workers. A training class for speakers creates much interest, is a means of education and a great help, when the precincts begin to hold monthly meetings, as the demand for speakers will then increase greatly. It is necessary to plan many kinds of work, a kind to fit every sort of taste and ability because every suffragist should be kept aware of their that there is plenty for everyone to do.

Organization work is difficult at best, and in a big city where often the population of a district is largely foreign, it is so discouraging as many times to seem hopeless. To overcome this, the organization committee should make a strenuous effort to establish a close relationship between all workers and the headquarters. The workers should be made to feel that there they can always find help and encouragement and that their difficulties are understood and their services appreciated. No information of any sort which might help a field worker should come into headquarters without being immediately passed on to her. These things and asking for a definite amount of time and definite accomplishment are sure to bring success.

By these methods amplified as the work progresses, suffragists can build up a wonderful machine to be used not

only to acquire the ballot, but for all civic work thereafter,
and for the development of those characteristics which make
for the finest type of womanhood.







It would seem that the Senator's statement was exaggerated. At any rate, Mrs. Stevens found the receptive minds of Stillwater and Washington Co. a fertile soil for the growing suffrage sentiment. CASEY promised to get the petition signed. She is the wife of a prominent business man and very energetic. Mrs. PALMER the librarian is also a worker. There is also a MISS NELL PETERSON who keeps a hardware store, who is a suffragist, I was told. The town was having a holiday for some reason or other and all the stores were closed so I could not find Miss Peterson. The prospects for organizing there are rather dismal but I shall try to get some one in Hibbing who knows people there to go with me for a day, and see if we can get an organization started.

Saturday I spent in Biwabik, somewhat smaller than Chisholm. Here I found a Miss Grace Weitzel who knew your daughters in High School. She and Mrs Carl Schuster said they would take care of the petitions. Mrs. C Schuster's husband is a young lawyer. His father however owns a brewery in Rochester so he may object to his wife's suffrage activities. Mrs. Bray, doctor's wife the leading woman of the town says she believes in suffrage and will boost it among her friends, but she had been sick for a year and can do no active work. Biwabik is a town with petty quarrels and gossip and I think getting an organization there is quite hopeless. I am going to suggest to the Eveleth women at our meeting this afternoon that they invite the Biwabik women to join their association. Biwabik is always flattered by attention from Eveleth women. These towns are all very near to each other and are connected by street cars and bus lines. Virginia is the most central town so I go back and forth from here.
