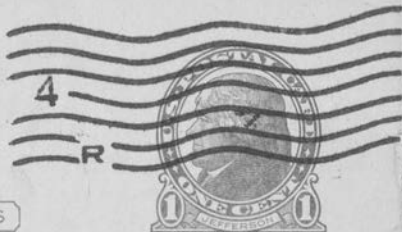

Instructions for immediate work in Chicago—Carrie Chapman Catt

*As the Demonstrations in Chicago and St. Louis are held for the purpose of emphasizing the demand for planks in the platforms of the dominant parties, only those parties are represented on the program. The Progressives adopted a suffrage plank in 1912, but as that party and the Republicans are considering amalgamation, it is included. The omission of the Socialist and Prohibition Parties from the program is not to be interpreted as failure to recognize the value their suffrage planks have been to the suffrage movement.

FOREWORD

DEAR CO-WORKERS:

Through the granting of Partial Suffrage by the 1917 Legislature of North Dakota, TWO DUTIES devolve upon all Suffrage organizations in the state.

FIRST, To show that women will vote if given the opportunity.

To accomplish this, urge upon all women in your vicinity the necessity of voting at all elections whether there is a contest or not, because the fact that women have not voted at all school elections is one of the most potent arguments against suffrage. The extent to which women will use the ballot is more or less the test that will be applied when the Federal Amendment comes up for consideration. Many ways to impress upon all women the importance of voting will suggest themselves. To incorporate in your constitution the following pledge will materially assist: I pledge myself to vote at all elections at which I am entitled to vote and to urge five other women to do so.

SECOND, To prepare women to vote intelligently on local questions.

Make a monthly study of your City Council or Town Board and School Board proceedings. Study methods of financing sewer and street improvements, how much is being spent for same and the laws of awarding contracts, etc. Investigate relief for poor, library expenditures, fire department, and study city water conditions.

If there are no civic societies in your town, the field for study is almost unlimited. Park improve-

ments, home and school gardens, public playgrounds, and all kindred subjects open a wide field for investigation of your home conditions. If there are no Parents' and Teachers' or Mothers' Clubs, school affairs and public health subjects may be considered.

KNOW THY TOWN, and local conditions will suggest many topics upon which time may be spent profitably and when the time comes for the women of your town to vote upon these questions they will vote intelligently. To aid you in this work the following outline of Topics For Study, with references showing where material may be found, has been prepared by the Committee on Programs for Leagues, and further information will be furnished upon request.

THE CALL

For the forty-ninth time in its history the National American Woman Suffrage Association issues a call to its State Auxiliaries to send their elected delegates to meet with officers, committees and life members in annual convention. The place selected is Washington, D. C., Poli's Theatre, December 12th to 15th, 1917.

Since last we met the all engulfing world war has drawn our own country into its maelstrom and ominous clouds rest over the earth, obscuring the vision and oppressing the souls of mankind. Yet out of the confusion and chaos of strife there has developed a stronger promise of the triumph of democracy than the world has ever known.

Every allied nation has announced that it is fighting for democracy and our own President has declared that "we are fighting for Democracy, for the right of those who submit to authority to have a voice in their own government." New Russia has answered the call; Great Britain has pledged full suffrage for women and the measure has already passed the House of Commons by the enormous majority of seven to one. Canada, too, has responded with five newly enfranchised provinces; France is waiting only to drive the foe from her soil to give her women political liberty.

Such an array of Victories gives us faith to believe that our own government will soon follow the example of other allied nations and will also pledge votes to its women citizens as an earnest of its sincerity that in truth we do fight for democracy.

This is our first national convention since our country entered the war. We are faced with new problems and new issues and the nation is realizing its dependence upon women as never before. It must be made to realize also that, willingly as women are now serving, they can serve still more efficiently when they shall have received the full measure of citizenship. These facts must be urged upon Congress and our Government must be convinced that the time has come for the enfranchisement of women by means of an amendment to the federal constitution.

Men and women who believe that the great question of world democracy includes government of the people, by the people and for the people in our country, are invited to attend our

convention and counsel with us on ways and means to attain this object at the earliest possible moment.

THE CALL

The past year in Minnesota has been the most tragic in its history. It has seen its sons march away to the great war, many of them never to return. In common with the rest of the world, a dangerous sickness has spread over its cities and towns and countryside, claiming hundreds of victims. And its crowning and peculiar woe has been the forest fires which have devastated some of our fairest land, which destroyed a thousand lives and the homes of thousands of our citizens.

We are a stricken people and yet, in spite of all, it is a time for thanksgiving.

The Great War is over. Our Minnesota boys have played a noble and thrilling part in averting the danger that threatened civilization. Those left in the fire swept regions are making a brave stand against the forces of discouragement and despair. They are rebuilding their homes and taking up the threads of their broken lives while our citizens are rallying to their assistance with sympathy and energy.

A strong determination and zeal has arisen to build a better civilization. Women will be partners with men in this reconstruction as they have been in the sorrows and labors that are past.

They will need mightily the tool—the ballot—that will make their aims and opinions effective, that will give power to the viewpoint of mothers and teachers and industrial workers.

The end of the long road of our suffrage association is in sight. Our cause is gaining momentum day by day. As with the end of the great war, our victory, when it comes, will come suddenly.

Three states—Michigan, South Dakota and Oklahoma—have rolled up great majorities in favor of suffrage amendments; and in Louisiana, the first southern state to have a referendum vote on woman suffrage, the amendment received a favorable vote throughout the state only to be defeated by the vote in New Orleans.

The Federal Suffrage Amendment is pending in the United States Senate having been passed by a two-thirds vote in the House of Representatives. The recent elections indicate the final passage of the amendment in Congress before many months.

We must see to it that our Minnesota Legislature does its share in helping to enfranchise the women of the country by duly ratifying the amendment.

This is the dawn of a new day. Let us come together with courage and hope, and with open minds. Let us consider the part that the women of Minnesota, with the freedom of spirit and the power that comes with political equality, may take in the great future of our state.

This call goes forth to the women of this State who have so long borne the burden and the heat of the day—women whose truth seeking minds have beheld the vision of a new freedom.

Naturalization. Privileges and benefits of American citizenship. The Civil War and the struggle made by Lincoln and others for the preservation of the solidarity of the United States, also the present day effort for national unity.

Geography of America. Stereopticon lectures showing varieties of American scenery and the varied resources and opportunities of the country.

General Review of Historical Facts.

Inspirational Suggestions. Songs—stories. Poems—speeches.

Visualization of Inspirational Suggestions. The drama. The pageant.

Summary of Course. The Vote: Practical directions as to the mechanics of voting. The vote as the means of securing the political ideals of the citizen. The ballot as against revolutionary methods necessary in countries where political representation is restricted, but unnecessary in America.

Miss Mary L. Guyton, the teacher of the Saturday Morning Citizenship Class, is one of the first in the new field of citizenship instruction. She brings to her work practical experience not only in preparing men and women for citizenship, but in the training of teachers of civics.

She and her eight assistants have successfully carried on factory classes in Americanization and hundreds of Italians, Armenians, Portuguese, Czech Slovaks, Greeks and Germans have been first taught to speak English and later prepared for citizenship and finally conducted by Miss Guyton to the Naturalization Court in the Federal Building. Her graduating class of aliens passed one hundred per cent in the tests given them by the federal examiners.

Miss Guyton is Director of Immigrant Education for the Malden Public Schools, Director of Immigrant Education for the Boston Rubber Shoe Co. of Malden and has been the teacher of the Americanization Observation Class held under the direction of the Women's Municipal League and has also been the lecturer at the Windsor Training School. Miss Guyton was herself trained under the State Board of Education of the Commonwealth and was a student in the summer school of Americanization held at Harvard University.

The present course consists of twenty lessons and will cover town, city, county, state and national government, the Constitution of the United States, naturalization, the geography of America with stereopticon lectures a review of the important historical facts, inspirational suggestions such as are found in community singing, moving pictures, poems and stories.

At each meeting of the class, there will be a period devoted to the practical side of politics. As practice work, the class will duplicate the procedure and political machinery of the State, beginning with registration for the vote and concluding with the election of candidates for office. Speakers and timely subjects for discussion will be announced through the press.

Miss Guyton's class will aim to fill the great demand of manufacturers who are asking for teachers in Americanization, and a registry of teachers will be kept at the Citizenship Room for the use of those who wish teachers of Americanization for plant classes.

THE Massachusetts Legislature has passed an Americanization Act authorizing the Board of Education, with the co-operation of cities and towns, to promote and provide education for persons over 21 years of age, not only in speaking, reading and writing the English language, but also in the fundamental principles of government and in other subjects adapted to fitting the scholars for American citizenship.

The act further provides for classes under the public school system in day schools, evening schools and industrial establishments. Any city or town desiring to obtain the benefit of this act will be entitled to receive from the Commonwealth, at the expiration of the school year, one-half of the sum expended by it in carrying out such provisions.

The Saturday Morning Citizenship Class is intended to meet the demand which this act will undoubtedly create, for trained teachers of American Citizenship.

The Americanization movement, especially that part of it which deals with plant classes and the naturalization of aliens, is held back because as yet there is no system of citizenship instruction equal to the difficult, yet necessary task of carrying abstract ideas of government to the average person. Educators know what they want; here and there individuals have developed a successful technique and undoubtedly, within a few years, the teaching of citizenship will become a recognized part of the school curriculum with a properly trained corps of teachers. At present, the imperative need is for teachers of citizenship who succeed in actually teaching citizenship. Poor teaching or no teaching at all of citizenship is largely responsible for the slow progress of Americanization.

Graphic methods must be employed, such as the use of charts, maps, the stereopticon, the moving picture, visits, either in imagination by the use of pictures on the screen or by planned expeditions to the libraries, courts, town or city hall, the State House and the capital, the Legislature and the Congress. In short, every device must be used to bring home to the student, the government in action as an actual force in daily life. No time, no effort nor expense should be spared to hasten an adequate system of citizenship instruction with a proper class room equipment and trained teachers.

The best cure for national unrest is a knowledge of the Constitution of the United States, and the history of our nation out of which our government grew. With this knowledge, will come the realization that revolution in the United States would mean nothing less than the people revolting against the people, since they themselves are the makers of the government under which they live.
