Minneapolis, Minn., Oct 16, 1914
 Dr. Mary McCoy of Duluth second
 vice president, called the
 33rd annual convention of the
 Minnesota Woman Suffrage
 Association to order at 10 a.m.
 in the Unitarian Church. In
 the absence of the president,
 Mrs. A. H. Bright, Dr. McCoy
 invited Mrs. Stockwell to preside.

Rev. Wm. Backus led the
 convention in prayer after
 which Mrs. V. B. Blythe of
 Minneapolis made the address
 of welcome in the name of the
 six Minneapolis suffrage clubs,
 which was responded to by Dr.
 Mary McCoy of Duluth.

The chairman appointed the
 following committees:

Mrs. V.C. Sherman, Dr. Koch
 and Mrs. E.B. Farmer on
 Resolutions.

Credentials Dr. Mary McCoy
 of Duluth, Mrs. F.L. Washburn,
 Miss Youmans (Winona)

Dr. Ethel Hurd moved that the
 first work of the resolutions
 committee be done at once; That
 they frame a special resolution
 of sympathy to Mrs. Bright and
 send it immediately by special
 messenger. *Carried.*

The reports of officers were
 then called for.

The corresponding secretary

reported the work that had been done in her office.

This was followed by a letter from the president in which she urged that the convention provide for the expenses of the State Board in its work.

The treasurer, Mrs. F. L. Washburn reported a balance of \$2 2.13.

* As the auditor was not present, the treasurer's report could not be acted upon until later.

In Dr. Anna Hurd's report for the Lecture Bureau she pointed out the need of money to place a free lecture before non suffrage assemblies. Report adopted.

Mrs. A. H. Potter, chairman of the Woman's Journal committee reported 109 new yearly subscriptions and made a plea that all good suffragists subscribe for the Woman's Journal. Report adopted.

In the report of the Chairman of the Church Committee, Mrs. H. A. Tomlinson said that altho there was not much local work done the outlook in the church at large was encouraging. R. Adopted.

Dr. Auten Pine, chairman of the literature committee reported that much literature had been sent out and the expense incurred had been met by the chairman.

Report adopted.
Dr. Hurd gave a report of the Publicity work which was accepted.

To Members and Others Interested:

The 33rd Annual Convention of this Association will be held at Minneapolis, in the First Unitarian Church October 16th and 17th, 1914. All members are expected to attend if possible and a cordial invitation is extended to all others who believe in the political freedom of women and also to those not yet in sympathy with the movement, but are open minded and willing to fairly consider the wisdom and expediency of a broader democracy.

This movement has passed the experimental stage. More than four million women in ten states are now enfranchised and no evil predicted has resulted. Are they not as capable and trustworthy as the women already enfranchised? We appeal to those who are guided by reason, not prejudice, who are not afraid of human aspiration toward a larger life and fuller liberty, who really believe in Democracy and are not at heart believers in some sort of aristocracy.

Mrs. V. C. Sherman, chairman of the Constitution committee presented the following amendments:

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE BY-LAWS OF
THE MINNESOTA WOMAN SUFFRAGE ASSOCIATION.

(a) Amend by changing the number of Section 2 of By-Laws to Section 8.

(b) Insert as Section 2.

Standing committees shall be as follows:—Press, Legislative, Literature, Publicity, Constitution, Woman's Journal, Lecture Bureau, Church Education, Ways and Means. Other committees may be added at the discretion of the Official Board. The President may select chairman of standing committees, subject to the approval of the Executive Board, and shall be ex-officio a member of all committees.

(c) Amendment to Section 4.

Strike out Robert's Rules of Order and insert Emma Laird Longan's Parliamentary Rules.

The Constitution Committee recommends:

1st: That the existing clubs be urged to extend their membership throughout their respective legislative districts. In all cases when club membership is composed of individuals scattered through two or more legislative districts, such membership shall become the nucleus and basis for a separate organization in each legislative district represented.

2nd: That a state committee be appointed to initiate such work in those districts where no club exists according to the Political District Plan as outlined in the Hand-book for working suffragists.

Mrs. Lewis moved that the amendments be considered separately. Mrs. Sherman, re-read the first amendment, which was ^{Sec 2.} Mrs. J. F. Martin moved to adopt this amendment.

Mrs. Lewis moved to amend the amendment by changing may to shall. ^{Carried.}

On motion the amendment as amended was carried.

Dr. Hurd moved Sec. 4 be adopted. ^{Carried.}

Dr. Hurd moved that the next amendment be left to be considered after the work conference as it was chiefly valuable in the event certain plans were made

^{Carried.}

The press chairman, Mrs. E. B. Farmer reported that she had sent out 6000 pieces of printed matter, 6000 leaflets and had written 335 letters on suffrage work. Adopted.

Mrs. P. S. De Voist of Duluth reported for the Educational Committee which was adopted.

The member of the National Executive Council, Mrs. George M. Kenyon urged that every suffragist attend a National Convention as it was impossible to be a full fledged suffragist without that experience. Adopted.

This finished the morning program but as there was still some time remaining Dr. Hurd

moved that the reports of clubs be heard at ~~that~~ time. Carried
Dr. Mary McCoy of Duluth reported
that her club held 10 regular
meetings during the year and
that educational and propaganda
work was continually carried on.

Adopted.

Mrs. McRae read the report of
the Redwood Falls Club which
had been very active during the
past year. Among its other
activities it had a successful
automobile parade which was
later shown at the moving
picture shows and won great
applause. Approved.

Dr. Hartman reported for the
St Paul Political Equality Club.
Among other things this club had
helped in the May 2 demonstrations
and had secured permanent lodgs.
It has brought prominent speakers
to St. Paul and has arranged
for local speeches and debates. Approved.
The Political Equality Club of
Minneapolis was reported by Mrs.
Jaeger. The club has carried on
the legislative luncheons and
took an active part in the May 2
parade. It sent out many resolutions
and letters of protest many of
which were heeded.

Ms. Finsterbach reported for the
Socialist Suffrage Club. She
said in part that they were

working with the lid on because they were anxious not to injure the suffrage cause and that all socialists were suffragists and were always glad to assist in spreading suffrage literature.

Approved.

Dr. Hard asked the chairman to assign places to the different clubs so the delegates of each club could sit together.

Mrs. Lewis announced that at the request of the president Mrs. A.H. Bright she had brought copies of Anna Laird Longair's parliamentary law which could be obtained from her.

The afternoon meeting of the Convention was called to order by Mrs. Andrias Ueland at 1:30

Dr. Hurd asked to have Mrs. Atwood, president of the State Federation of Women's Clubs, come to the platform.

The minutes of the morning session were read and approved.

Mrs. Ueland opened the afternoon program with a presentation of the need of immediate work in Minnesota and different ways of carrying on this work.

Mrs. A. H. Potter presented the political district plan which is in successful operation in New York. If this were put in operation in Minn. there would be 67 districts. This requires a leader for each district and as each district would be divided into precincts a chairman of each precinct. These leaders would keep in touch with each other through some state organizations and it would be possible to easily reach every suffrage leader in the state.

Mrs. Kingsley suggested ways of advertising suffrage.

 The Convention was called to order by the 1st vice president, Miss Doherty. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

Dr. Hurd gave formal notice that she would propose an amendment to the constitution changing the method of electing the officers.

As some clubs did not make their reports yesterday they were invited to make them to-day.

Mr. Childs was invited to bring greetings from the Saturday lunch club which he characterized as a message from political meddlers to political meddlers.

At the conclusion of Mr. Childs' remarks Dr. McCoy asked if those delegates ^{present} from clubs who were also members of the State Board were entitled to two votes.

In answer the presiding officer asked for an official parliamentarian. Mrs. Stockwell moved that Mrs. Lewis be invited to act.

Carried.

Mrs. Lewis ruled that no person was entitled to more than one vote.

Dr. McCoy gave formal notice that at the next convention

she would introduce an amendment to the constitution forbidding proxies to be used in the next convention.

Mrs. Errie Williams moved that the credential committee ask the delegates from the different clubs whether the clubs had authorized the delegates present to vote for the absent delegates. Carried.

As Mr. Albert of Washington was in the room the presiding officer invited him to address the convention. He said his residence in a suffrage state had converted him.

Mrs. Stockwell moved that the next order of business be made the election of officers. Carried. The credential committee was asked to prepare to make its final report on the absence of the auditors
the chair appointed Mrs. H. A. Tonlinson and Miss Ross of Winona.

Mrs. Stockwell moved that we refuse to ratify the action of the delegates at the Washington convention in pledging \$100 instead of \$50 as they were instructed by the Board. Carried. Ayes 54 Noes 26.

Mrs. Uland announced that a member of the Equal Suffrage Association of Minneapolis will pay the \$50 if no Miss can meet the pledge to the national

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.

NAME.

The name of this organization shall be the "Minnesota Woman Suffrage Association."

Carried

Dr. Hurd moved that the preamble as given in the old constitution be retained.

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS, that we, the undersigned, all residents of the State of Minnesota, have hereby associated ourselves together to become incorporated, and do hereby form a corporation under Sections 3102 to 3109 inclusive of the Revised Laws of 1905 of the State of Minnesota, and the acts amendatory thereof, and to that end have adopted and do hereby adopt the following Articles of Incorporation:

Article I

OBJECT.
The object of this organization shall be to secure the right of suffrage to the women of Minnesota and of the United States in order that they may obtain industrial and legal as well as political equality.

shall be in the city of St. Paul, Minn.

Article II.

MEMBERSHIP.

Section 1. There shall be three (3) classes of members in this organization:-

Legislative District organizations,
Suffrage Societies, and
Life Members.

Section 2. Any suffrage society in this state numbering ten (10) members may become auxiliary to this organization.

Section 3. Any person who shall make a payment of fifty dollars (\$50.00) into the treasury of the Minnesota Woman Suffrage Association shall become a life member of the organization.

Section 4. Each auxiliary society or club of the Minnesota Woman Suffrage Association shall send to the Treasurer of the state organization ten cents (\$.10) per member on or before August 30th of each year.

Section 5. Each Legislative District of the Minnesota Woman Suffrage Association shall send to the Treasurer of the state organization five dollars (\$5.00) on or before August 30th of each year.

Article 7 of the by-laws was moved to Art II. of the constitution and adopted as sections 4 and 5 of that article.

Article IV

MEETINGS.

Section 1. The annual meeting of this corporation shall be held on the second Friday and following Saturday of October of each year at ten A. M., at the City of St. Paul, Minnesota, but said corporation may hold any of its meetings or transact any of its business at such other time, place, or places, within the State of Minnesota as the majority of its members may determine by vote direct or through its executive board. Other meetings may be called by the president with the consent, or at the request of three members of the executive board.

OFFICERS.

Section 1. The officers of this organization shall be—
a President,
five Vice Presidents,
one Recording Secretary,
one Corresponding Secretary,
one Treasurer,
one Auditor,

all to be elected from its membership.

Section 2. The vice-presidents shall be elected one from each of the cities of first class, Saint Paul, Minneapolis and Duluth, and two from the state outside of these cities.

Mrs. Goff moved that the clause "and the state members from the legislative groups" be added to the third section in article III. This amendment carried and the amendment as amended was adopted.

Section 3. The control and management of this organization shall be vested in an executive Board which shall be composed of its officers and eight (8) directors, all to be elected from the membership of the organization at the annual meeting; and the chairmen of its standing committees,

and the state members from the legislative groups.

Article I section 1 of the by-laws was moved to section 4 of Article III. Dr. Hurd moved that the word second be changed to last and as this amendment carried the section is as follows:

Section 1. The General Officers of this organization shall be elected on the second day of the annual meeting.

Proposed Constitution and By-Laws of the Minnesota Woman Suffrage Association

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.

NAME.

The name of this organization shall be the "Minnesota Woman Suffrage Association."

ARTICLE II.

OBJECT.

The object of this organization shall be to secure the right of suffrage to the women of Minnesota and of the United States in order that they may obtain industrial and legal as well as political equality.

ARTICLE III.

MEMBERSHIP.

Section 1. There shall be three (3) classes of members in this organization:

Legislative District organizations,
Suffrage Societies, and
Life Members.

Section 2. Any suffrage society in this state numbering ten (10) members may become auxiliary to this organization.

Section 3. Any person who shall make a payment of fifty dollars (\$50.00) into the treasury of the Minnesota Woman Suffrage Association shall become a life member of the organization.

ARTICLE IV.

OFFICERS.

Section 1. The officers of this organization shall be—

a President,
five Vice Presidents,
one Recording Secretary,
one Corresponding Secretary,
one Treasurer,
one Auditor,

all to be elected from its membership.

Section 2. The vice-presidents shall be elected one from each of the cities of first class, Saint Paul, Minneapolis and Duluth, and two from the state outside of these cities.

Section 3. The control and management of this organization shall be vested in an executive Board which shall be composed of its officers and eight (8) directors, all to be elected from the membership of the organization at the annual meeting; and the chairmen of its standing committees.

ARTICLE V.

AMENDMENTS.

Section 1. Amendments to this Constitution may be proposed by any member of the organization, provided that notice of such proposed amendment shall be filed with the Recording Secretary of the organization not less than thirty (30) days before the annual meeting at which such amendment is to be considered.

Section 2. A two thirds (2-3) vote of those present, entitled to vote, shall be necessary to amend this Constitution.

Section 3. Thirty (30) shall constitute a quorum for amending this Constitution.

BY-LAWS.

ARTICLE I.

ELECTIONS.

Section 1. The General Officers of this organization shall be elected on the second day of the annual meeting.

Section 2. Election shall be by formal ballot.

Section 3. Nominations for General Officers shall be made in writing on sheets prepared and posted in the assembly hall on the first day of the annual meeting by the chairman of the Elections Committee.

Section 4. The three candidates for each office receiving the largest number of votes on the informal ballot shall be the nominees for the formal ballot.

Section 5. A majority of all votes cast shall be necessary for an election.

ARTICLE II.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

Section 1. The duties of all officers shall be such as pertain to their offices.

Section 2. The Vice Presidents, in order, shall perform the duties of president in her absence.

Section 3. The Treasurer shall keep books of itemized accounts.

She shall render reports at all Executive Board meetings and at the annual Convention.

She shall furnish credential blanks to all auxiliary societies.

She shall pay bills only upon order of the Executive Board.

She shall give bond in such sum as the Executive Board may require. The expense of such bond shall be paid from the treasury of the organization.

Section 4. The Auditor shall examine the books and reports of the Treasurer quarterly and report concerning them to the Executive Board.

Section 5. The Executive Board shall at all times carry out the will of the organization as expressed at any legal meeting.

ARTICLE III.

TERM OF OFFICE.

Section 1. Newly elected officers shall assume office directly after the last session of the annual meeting at which they have been elected.

ARTICLE IV.

ORGANIZATION.

Section 1. Each Legislative District in Minnesota shall be entitled to one District Suffrage organization, auxiliary to this organization.

Section 2. The Legislative District organization shall be presided over by a Leader who shall be a member of that District organization, elected for one year at the annual meeting of that District organization.

Section 3. The Legislative Districts of the state shall be combined into not less than eight groups.

Section 4. The Leaders of each group of Legislative Districts shall, before October eighth (8th) of each year select one of their number to be the state member for that group on the Executive Board.

ARTICLE V.

VACANCIES.

Section 1. The Executive Board shall have power to fill all vacancies which may occur in its membership during the year.

ARTICLE VI.

REPRESENTATION.

Section 1. All members of the Executive Board are entitled to vote at any meeting of this organization.

Section 2. The President and three (3) accredited delegates from each auxiliary club of ten members shall each have a vote.

Section 3. For each ten members, after the first ten, each auxiliary club may send one accredited delegate.

Section 4. Each Legislative District group shall be entitled to ten (10) delegates who shall be chosen as the District organization shall decide.

ARTICLE VII.

DUES.

Section 1. Each auxiliary society or club of the Minnesota Woman Suffrage Association shall send to the Treasurer of the state organization ten cents (\$.10) per member on or before August 30th of each year.

Section 2. Each Legislative District of the Minnesota Woman Suffrage Association shall send to the Treasurer of the state organization five dollars (\$5.00) on or before August 30th of each year.

ARTICLE VIII.

MEETINGS.

Section 1. The annual meeting of this corporation shall be held on the second Friday and following Saturday of October of each year at ten A. M., at the City of St. Paul, Minnesota, but said corporation may hold any of its meetings or transact any of its business at such other time, place, or places, within the State of Minnesota as the majority of its members may determine by vote direct or through its executive board. Other meetings may be called by the president with the consent, or at the request of three members of the executive board.

Section 2. Three quarterly conferences, beginning in January, shall be held during the year outside of Saint Paul and Minneapolis.

RESOLUTION PASSED BY THE BOARD OF THE
NATIONAL AMERICAN WOMAN SUFFRAGE ASSOCIATION
ON WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 8TH, 1916.

WHEREAS, It has been brought to our attention that in filling positions in the civil service, officials of the Federal Government discriminate against women applicants because of their sex; and

WHEREAS, Public records show that since September 8, 1916, among 120 appointments and 33 transfers to clerical positions in the War Department at Washington only one woman was included, although it does not appear that the positions were such that sex would have been a factor in efficiency or suitability; and

WHEREAS, The civil service registers of eligibles from which said appointments were made reveal no lack or corresponding disproportion of qualified women as compared with qualified men, there being 937 women and 1,208 men on those registers on October 23, 1916; and

WHEREAS, The discriminatory attitude of officials of the Government is further reflected in the fact that women are not admitted to the special civil service examinations for stenographer and typewriter now being held monthly in 400 cities of the United States, and are similarly excluded from many other examinations which they are competent to take; and

WHEREAS, This discrimination appears further in the fact, as set forth in the Civil Service Manual, that the usual entrance salary for men stenographers and typewriters is \$900 per year, while for women stenographers and typewriters it is \$720, and we are informed that men are also given preference in promotions, upon grounds of sex alone; therefore be it

RESOLVED, That the National Board of the National American Woman Suffrage Association express to the President of the United States and to the head of each of the executive departments of the federal government their emphatic protest against this discrimination on the part of appointing officials, and demand, in behalf of the women of the country, who are taxed equally with men, to support the government establishment, that women be admitted to the civil service and promoted therein upon the same terms as men; and

RESOLVED FURTHER, That a copy of this protest be sent to the women's organizations in each of the various states, to the various suffrage journals and women's periodicals, and to the newspapers throughout the country, that the public in general and women especially may be informed in this matter.

Whereas, it has been amply demonstrated that suffrage through Federal action can no more be won without the specific help of the individual states than suffrage through state action can be won without activity in the counties,

Report of the N. A. W. S. A. Midyear Conference
held in Chicago June 7th & 8th 1915.

Given before the Minn. W. S. A. Convention Oct. 8th

MADAME PRESIDENT,
MEMBERS OF THE CONVENTION
AND FRIENDS:-

Those of you who read the newspapers at the time of the Chicago Conference last June, learned that the meeting was no love feast; that there were differences of opinion which were threshed out in open meeting, so that the representatives of the Press could report it as they saw fit.

Later the Headquarters News Letter, with the report of the proceedings from the standpoint of the National Association, was sent broadcast, helping to create a different impression of the feeling, atmosphere and results of the Conference, from that which was carried away by your delegates.

We are all apt to consider that any differences of opinion as to methods and tactics in a work like ours, are sure to lead to disaster, when the truth is, that they are only evidences of a livelier interest and a greater growth.

Now I feel that the members of this Convention are entitled to more than a brief outline of what happened at the Chicago Conference.

They should be made intelligent as to preceding conditions which have led up to the present situation.

Those of my audience who do not already know, may be interested to learn that in the early days the workers did not agree upon methods and policies any better than do the modern workers, and as a consequence there were at one time two National organizations formed in the same year, one being called

the National Women Suffrage Association and the other the American Women Suffrage Association, of which Henry Ward Beecher was the first President.

This state of things continued for twenty years, at the end of which time the two associations merged into one, under the name of the National American Woman Suffrage Association, the organization which has been doing such admirable work ever since along educational lines, that now we have eleven states and one territory where women are fully enfranchised; and one other (Illinois) where the women have Presidential and Municipal Suffrage.

This gives us about 4,000,000 women voters; which means a wonderful leverage in Congress, since one-fourth of the Senate, one-sixth of the House of Representatives and one-fifth of the electoral vote comes from the Suffrage states, which is an unprecedented, and by many people, an under-rated political situation.

Under this condition of affairs it is but natural that there should arise among the newer and younger workers, an organization of strong, influential and devoted women, who think that there is now another and easier way of gaining the ballot, than by the slow, laborious, expensive and tedious process of appealing to every voter in every state, whether he be educated or ignorant, high principled or vicious, native or foreign born, white, black, red or yellow.

This grand-child of the National American Women Suffrage Association, being a vigorous and headstrong youngster of decided opinions about the best way for it to do its work, continued to carry out its own policy, using new, novel and

effective methods successfully, in spite of the protests of the older organization, until in exasperation Grandma finally picked it up and metaphorically spanked and disinherited it.

The difference, in a nut shell, is that the National Association believes in still working in the old way, gaining the ballot state by state, while the Congressional Union thinks that that method has been used long enough, and that we now have enough latent political power in our Equal Suffrage States to force Congress to give us a Federal Amendment, provided we can educate those twelve states to see their political power, and to realize the necessity of their using it, in order to help to free the women of the East, so that they may become the political equals of their Western sisters.

I do not wish to carry the impression that the National Association does not believe in Federal work, for they do, as will readily be realized when I tell you that they have put the seal of their approval upon three amendments.

First, the Susan B. Anthony Amendment, the one which when passed by Congress, and ratified by a majority vote of three quarters of the legislatures of the states, gives the vote to all women, subject to the same qualifications as pertain to male electors.

Second, the Sheafroth Amendment, which is designed to be a National Initiative and Referendum on the one question only, that of Women Suffrage.

Third, an Amendment which would enfranchise the women and men of the District of Columbia.

Besides these three Amendments, they favor working for the Federal Elections Bill, a bill which if passed by Congress and approved by the courts, would give to women the right

to vote for United States Senators and Representatives.

The Congressional Union, on the other hand, works for the Susan B. Anthony Amendment only, and believing that the party in power could put the measure through Congress if it would; it advocates holding the controlling party responsible for the measure.

This is considered good politics by such an authority as Charles A. Beard, Professor of Political Science of Columbia University.

In a public speech made in Connecticut last June, he said; "Women who can vote can demand of the party in power favorable action on Woman Suffrage, and judge those who seek re-election at their hands, as representatives of that party, by its record on Woman Suffrage."

Up to a year ago the work of the Congressional Union was done almost entirely by the District of Columbia. But in order to carry out their ideas, they found that they must have the help of their sympathizers throughout the country, and since they were working for the benefit of the whole country, why should not the whole country help?

This accounts for the Congressional Union going into the different states to form its own associations, which is one of the things for which it has been criticized.

It has seemed to me necessary to give this condensed historical outline, in order that you may understand as well as hear my report of the Chicago Conference. Also I wish to make it plain to you that, although there were radically different

views taken there, and freely expressed, it does not necessarily mean that the consequent disagreements are going to, in the least, affect the work of the suffragists of the country, nor cause any serious ruction, any more than did the disagreements of the earlier workers of the seventies and eighties; unless our National Association, itself continues to do in the future, what it has done in the past; viz., call public attention to, and exaggerate the differences and the disagreements between the two factions, which mode of procedure seems very reprehensible to most people.

The Chicago Conference was supposed to be called for the purpose of discussing Congressional work.

That the greater part of the time was devoted to discussing and denouncing the work and the policy of the Congressional Union was perhaps to be expected, altho in the opinion of many, it was a most unwise thing to do, as well as being unfair to the delegates, as it took up almost the entire time of the Conference, crowding out such important topics as, "The Inter-relation of State and Congressional District Work, by Harriet Taylor Upton, and the discussions of "Methods of Campaign in Congressional Districts", as well as "Getting Suffrage Planks in the National Platforms of the two great political parties;"

— Subjects which, had they been fully and intelligently discussed, would have been of great value to sincere workers, who are trying to do solid constructive work.

Early in the Conference Mrs. Youmans, President of the Wisconsin Association, endeavored to head off the public discussion of the differences between the National Association and the Congressional Union, by moving that an Arbitration Board,

made up of representatives from the National Association and from the Union, be chosen to sift the differences between the two organizations, and report on a compromise and "get together" platform.

This was tabled, with the result that the Conference was practically turned into a trial court, with the Congressional Union as defendant, without Counsel.

An inquiry as to whether the Congressional Union had been asked to send a representative to explain their policies, and tell of their work, was ruled out of order, and the following day the question was ordered stricken from the minutes.

Fully one half hour was given to telling of the improvements made in the moving picture play "Your Girl and Mine", but, with representatives from twenty-five states in attendance, no effort whatever was made to help the four campaign states, nor to create any special interest in their work.

Much time was taken up explaining and re-explaining the alleged merits of the Shafrroth Amendment, which was vigorously opposed by a number of the states.

Your own delegates went instructed by their Board to work against that measure, and after repeated attempts by Mrs. A. H. Potter, to get a motion before the meeting, she finally succeeded in moving that the National Board be instructed to drop work on the Shafrroth Amendment. The motion was defeated fifty-seven to twenty-one.

A resolution in favor of the Susan B. Anthony Amendment was passed unanimously.

Another resolution, which was given to the Press, as having been passed, before it was presented to the Conference even, was to the effect that Suffragists, who worked with the Congressional Union should be barred from being members of the

National Executive Council.

Miss Blackwell immediately moved that this Resolution be tabled, stating that it was unconstitutional.

The most interesting and able address of the Conference was that given by Miss Laura Clay of Kentucky on Monday evening. She explained fully and clearly and with much real eloquence, the Federal Elections bill, referred to earlier in my report, as aiming to give women the vote for Senators and Representatives.

She advocated that the National Association should work persistently for that bill, as, could it be passed, it would make the women of the country the constituents of the Congressmen, and so would aid in getting the Susan B. Anthony Amendment through Congress.

The social aspects of the Conference were not neglected. Mrs. Medill McCormick was our hostess at a luncheon given Tuesday on the roof garden of the hotel, the LaSalle, and that same evening the Chicago Equal Suffrage Association gave us a beautiful and elaborate dinner at the same place, which was attended by several hundred guests.

And finally, in closing my report, I wish to pay my tribute of respect and admiration to Alice Stone Blackwell and her very beautiful little sermon or exhortation to all Suffrage workers, to always try to be kind and considerate to each other, in word, deed and thought, and to lay emphasis on the points of agreement, rather than on the differences of methods and ideas.

2 WHEREAS, the world is aroused to a sense of calamity due to the ravages of war in Europe, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, that we take our stand on the side of organized constructive effort for permanent world peace.

3 WHEREAS, the abolition of the saloon is now an active issue in the state of Minnesota, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that we are unalterably opposed to the saloon as a menace to the home and strongly commend all effort to rid the community of this intolerable burden.

4 WHEREAS, Suffrage amendments are pending in the states of New Jersey, New York, Massachusetts, and Pennsylvania, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED that we send messages of greeting to the women of these states expressing our earnest hope that they may be enfranchised at the coming election.

WHEREAS, the Minnesota Federation of Labor assembled in Convention at Winona, in July, 1915, rescinded many former declarations in favor of Woman Suffrage, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that we deplore this repudiation of the principle of democracy by the organized labor of our state.

WHEREAS, publicity is one of the greatest assets of the Equal Suffrage movement, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that we express our appreciation to the press of St. Paul and Minneapolis for the generous space accorded us throughout the convention and during the past year.

FINALLY

WE RESOLVE that this Association express its grateful appreciation to our hostesses, the Political Equality Club and the Woman's Welfare League of St. Paul, and to all others who have by service and by gift contributed to the success of this convention.

MARRIAGE AND DIVORCE

Whereas, by the provisions of the Constitution of the United States legislation on Marriage and Divorce is left exclusively to the several states, and

Whereas, legislation thereon by the several states has been far from uniform, some few attempting to limit the marriage of the unfit, and some allowing no divorce at all, as South Carolina, and some allowing divorce for so many and such trivial causes as amounts practically to divorce by mutual consent; some attempting to prohibit remarriage by the wrong doer, and some prohibiting remarriage by divorced persons for a limited time without reference to which was the wrong doer, and

Whereas, under the "full faith and credit" clause of the federal constitution it is possible with little trouble or expense to go to another state for marriage or divorce and thus nullify the laws of the state of the domicile, and

Whereas, it is believed to be practically impossible to induce the several states to enact uniform marriage and divorce laws, and

Whereas it is impossible for the general government to do anything to stem the evils arising from the marriage of the unfit, the rapid increase of defectives, criminals and degenerates arising from such marriages, or even to enforce the prohibition of polygamy which the congress compelled to be inserted in the Utah constitution.

Therefore, **be it resolved** by the Minnesota Woman Suffrage Association
that we

recommend that the Congress propose to the several states an amendment of the Constitution of the United States giving the Congress full power to enact legislation controlling marriage and divorce in the several states and suspending all state laws thereon as soon as appropriate federal laws have been enacted.

Resolution.

Whereas: mental and criminal defects and tendencies are known to be to a large extent hereditary, and

Whereas: defectives and habitual criminals, as shown by the United States Department of Census, and the vital and criminal statistics of the several states and cities, are increasing out of proportion to the increase of population, and

Whereas: crimes of violence against women and children are alarmingly and increasingly prevalent, therefore be it

Resolved by the Minnesota Woman Suffrage Association

..... in convention assembled, that we recommend to the legislature of the several states that they enact laws authorizing, with proper safeguards, the sterilization of the above mentioned defectives and habitual criminals, in the discretion of the court or competent board of examiners.
