

CONFERENCES AND CONVENTIONS HELD IN 1916.

The Mississippi Valley Conference convened in Minneapolis May 7, 8, 9 and 10. At this notable gathering, representatives were present from twenty-six states, while the speakers were not only from all parts of the United States, but from Canada. The program throughout was practical, instructive and inspiring and was graced by such brilliant speakers as the National President, Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, Mrs. Nellie McClung of Alberta, Canada, Mrs. Harriet Taylor Upton, Mrs. Ella S. Stewart, Mrs. Catharine Waugh McCulloch, Anne Martin, Marion Drake and Dr. Effie McCullom Jones.

The Annual State Convention.

The Annual Meeting of the State Association was held at the Radisson Hotel, Minneapolis, Monday and Tuesday, Dec. 4 and 5. There were two hundred delegates present and many interested, active suffragists attended each session.

The results of the election may be noted on pages one and two of this booklet.

The chief speakers at the great meeting at the First Baptist Church on the opening night were Mrs. Nellie McClung of Alberta and Hon. W. I. Norton of Minneapolis. A most successful luncheon was given on the second day, when Mrs. McClung and Mrs. Charles G. Arms of Boston spoke. At the close, Mrs. H. G. Harrison took charge of the pledge raising, securing \$8,300 for the year's work.

Quarterly Conferences.

Two interesting and successful conferences have been held outside the Twin Cities. The first was held at Albert Lea January 27 and 28. Besides all day business sessions there was a mass meeting held in the Library and presided over by Senator C. L. Swenson; this meeting was addressed by Senator J. W. Andrews of Mankato, Mrs. Andreas Ueland and Mrs. Charles P. Noyes. A banquet was given in the Presbyterian Church Friday evening, Mrs. Gertrude Kingsland was toastmistress and toasts were responded to by Mr. F. A. Day, Representative Claude Southwick, Representative George P. Lattin and others.

\$300 was raised for the Iowa campaign.

Pipestone Conference.

The second conference was held at Pipestone August 3 and 4. The Twin City suffragists crossed the state by automobile, were met by other suffragists in automobiles and escorted from town to town. Street meetings were held in the towns on the way, and in Shakopee, Mankato, Lake Crystal, Madelia, St. James and Windom the local suffragists had arranged meetings on the main street, on the Court House grounds or in the Town Park. In several places luncheons or dinners had been planned.

In Pipestone the conference was opened by a very large meeting on the Court House grounds with Mr. F. M. Payne, Mayor W. C. Briggs and Senator O. A. Lende among the speakers. At the banquet held Friday evening in the K. C. Hall, Mrs. Hayden R. Upton was toastmistress.

CONSTITUTION.

PREAMBLE.

Know all men by these presents that we, the undersigned, all residents of the State of Minnesota, have hereby associated ourselves together to become incorporated, and do hereby form a corporation under Sections 3102 to 3109 inclusive of the Revised Laws of 1905 of the State of Minnesota, and the acts amendatory thereof, and to that end have adopted and do hereby adopt the following Articles of Incorporation:

ARTICLE I.

NAME, OBJECT, PLAN OF OPERATION, LOCATION.

Section 1. The name of this organization shall be the "Minnesota Woman Suffrage Association."

Section 2. The object of this organization shall be to secure the right of suffrage to the women of Minnesota and of the United States, in order that they may obtain industrial and legal as well as political equality.

Section 3. The location of this corporation shall be in the city of St. Paul, Minnesota.

ARTICLE II. MEMBERSHIP.

Section 1. There shall be three (3) classes of members in this organization:—

Legislative District Organizations.
Suffrage Societies, and
Life Members.

Section 2. Any suffrage society in this state numbering ten (10) mem-

bers may become auxiliary to this organization.

Section 3. Any person who shall make a payment of fifty dollars (\$50.00) into the treasury of the Minnesota Woman Suffrage Association shall become a life member of the organization.

Section 4. Each auxiliary society or club of the Minnesota Woman Suffrage Association shall send to the Treasurer of the state organization ten cents (\$.10) per member on or before August 30th of each year.

Section 5. Each Legislative District of the Minnesota Woman Suffrage Association shall send to the Treasurer of the state organization five dollars (\$5.00) on or before August 30th of each year.

ARTICLE III. OFFICERS.

Section 1. The officers of this organization shall be a President, five Vice-Presidents, one Recording Secretary, one Corresponding Secretary, one Treasurer, one Auditor, all to be elected from its membership.

Section 2. The vice-presidents shall be elected one from each of the cities of first class, Saint Paul, Minneapolis, and Duluth, and two from the state outside of these cities.

Section 3. The control and management of this organization shall be vested in an executive Board which shall be composed of its officers and eight (8) directors, all to be elected from the membership of the organization at the annual meeting, the chairmen of its standing committees and the state members from the legislative groups.

Section 4. The General Officers of this organization shall be elected on the last day of the annual meeting.

ARTICLE IV.

Section 1. The annual meeting of this corporation shall be held on the second Friday and following Saturday of October of each year at ten A. M., at the City of St. Paul, Minnesota, but said corporation may hold any of its meetings or transact any of its business at such other time, place, or places, within the State of Minnesota as the majority of its members may determine by vote direct or through its executive board. Other meetings may be called by the president with the consent, or at the request of three members of the executive board.

BY-LAWS.

ARTICLE I.

Section 1. Election shall be by formal ballot.

Section 2. All elections shall be by the Australian Ballot system.

Section 3. A majority of all votes cast shall be necessary for an election.

ARTICLE II.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

Section 1. The duties of all officers shall be such as pertain to their offices.

Section 2. The Vice Presidents, in order, shall perform the duties of president in her absence.

Section 3. The Treasurer shall keep books of itemized accounts.

She shall render reports at all Exec-

utive Board meetings and at the annual Convention.

She shall furnish credential blanks to all auxiliary societies.

She shall pay bills only upon order of the Executive Board.

She shall give bond in such sum as the Executive Board may require. The expense of such bond shall be paid from the treasury of the organization.

Section 4. The Auditor shall examine the books and report of the Treasurer quarterly and report concerning them to the Executive Board.

Section 5. The Executive Board shall at all times carry out the will of the organization as expressed at any legal meeting.

ARTICLE III.

TERM OF OFFICE.

Section 1. Newly elected officers shall assume office directly after the last session of the annual meeting at which they have been elected.

ARTICLE IV.

ORGANIZATION.

Section 1. Each Legislative District in Minnesota shall be entitled to one District Suffrage organization, auxiliary to this organization.

Section 2. The Legislative District organization shall be presided over by a Leader who shall be a member of that District organization, elected for one year at the annual meeting of that District organization.

Section 3. The Legislative Districts of the state shall be combined into not less than eight groups.

Section 4. The Leaders of each group of Legislative Districts shall, before October eighth (8th) of each year

select one of their number to be the state member for that group on the Executive Board.

ARTICLE V.

VACANCIES.

Section 1. The Executive Board shall have power to fill all vacancies which may occur in its membership during the year.

ARTICLE VI.

REPRESENTATION.

Section 1. All members of the Executive Board are entitled to vote at any meeting of this organization.

Section 2. The President and three (3) accredited delegates from each auxiliary club of ten members shall each have a vote.

Section 3. For each ten members, after the first ten, each auxiliary club may send one accredited delegate.

Section 4. Each Legislative District shall be entitled to ten (10) delegates who shall be chosen as the District organization shall decide.

ARTICLE VII.

MEETINGS.

Section 1. Three quarterly conferences, beginning in January, shall be held during the year outside of Saint Paul and Minneapolis.

Section 2. The Executive Board shall hold regular monthly meetings.

Section 3. Special meetings of the Executive Board may be called by the President, or at the request of five members of the Executive Board.

Section 4. Written notice of each meeting shall be sent to every member of the Executive Board.

Section 5. The Legislative District organizations of the Minnesota Woman Suffrage Association shall hold their annual meetings not later than September 30th of each year.

ARTICLE VIII. QUORUM.

Section 1. Seven (7) members of the Executive Board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Section 2. Thirty (30) members of the state organization shall constitute a quorum for the annual meeting.

ARTICLE XI. COMMITTEES.

Section 1. The Standing Committees shall be:

1. Finance.
2. Press and Publicity.
3. Suffrage Periodicals.
4. Congressional.
5. Legislative.
6. State and County Fairs.
7. Public Demonstrations.
8. Member of National Executive

Council.

Section 2. Special Committees shall be appointed from time to time by the Executive Board as it shall deem them desirable.

ARTICLE X. PUBLIC AUDITOR.

Section 1. All accounts of the Treasurer shall be audited by a public auditor who shall report upon his findings at the annual meeting.

Section 2. This auditor, to be paid from the treasury of the Minnesota Woman Suffrage Association.

ARTICLE XI. PROCEDURE.

Section 1. At all meetings of this organization the procedure shall be according to "Emma Laird Longan's Parliamentary Rules Made Easy," unless covered by this Constitution and By-Laws.

ARTICLE XII.

Section 1. All affiliations of this association shall be decided by the association at its annual meeting or at a special meeting of the body.

ARTICLE XIII. AMENDMENTS.

Section 1. These By-Laws may be amended by filing notice of amendment with the Recording Secretary of the state organization, not less than thirty (30) days before the meeting at which the amendment is to be considered and appending notice of amendment to the call for the meeting.

Section 1. A vote of two-thirds of the members present shall be necessary to amend the By-Laws.

February 14th, 1916

Hennepin County comprises nine Legislative Districts described as follows:

The 28 District shall be composed of:

Ward 1.
Ward 10, Precinct 1.
Ward 3, Precincts 1, 2, 3, 4.
Ward 9, Precincts 5, 6, 7, of the City of Minneapolis
and shall be entitled to elect one senator and two representatives.

The 29 District shall be composed of:

Ward 2.
Ward 9, Precincts 1, 2, 3, 4, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14 of Minneapolis and the Town of St. Anthony
and shall be entitled to elect one senator and two representatives.

The 30 District shall be composed of:

Ward 4 of the City of Minneapolis,
and shall be entitled to elect one senator and two representatives.

The 31 District shall be composed of:

Ward 5.
Ward 6 of the City of Minneapolis
and shall be entitled to elect one senator and two representatives.

The 32 District shall be composed of:

Ward 11.
Ward 12 of the City of Minneapolis
and shall be entitled to elect one senator and two representatives.

The 33 District shall be composed of:

Ward 7
Ward 13 of the City of Minneapolis
and shall be entitled to elect one senator and two representatives.

The 34 District shall be composed of:

Ward 8 of the City of Minneapolis
and shall be entitled to elect one senator and two representatives.

Workers should attend; these meetings should be for the purpose of getting and giving information in regard to the progress of organization work.

District Leaders should become acquainted with persons politically prominent in their District, and should particularly make themselves known to the representative of their district.

On receipt of the filled out forms sent by the Precinct Chairman to the Legislative Leader, the Leader should make a record of the number of male citizens, female citizens, and enrollments in the HENNEPIN COUNTY WOMAN SUFFRAGE ASSOCIATION, separating them in such a way as to show the number for suffrage, opposed to suffrage, undecided, or enrolled.

District Leaders should send all enrollments, as soon as possible, to Miss Aimee Fisher, 403 Essex Building, Minneapolis, keeping in her own custody, in separate files, lists of the male and female citizens until such time as the work of organization is completed in her district.

DUTIES OF THE PRECINCT CHAIRMAN

The Precinct Chairman shall appoint an assistant; she shall confer with the District Leader, recommending for appointment Precinct Workers. The Chairman shall supervise the Precinct Workers, giving them assistance and encouragement as they may need it, and securing from them, if possible, the promise of one half day's work each week.

The Precinct Chairman shall procure blank forms and supplies from Headquarters, 403 Essex Building, and distribute same to the Precinct Workers; she shall also supply the Precinct Workers with maps of their precincts; these precinct maps should be prepared by cutting them out so that their boundaries may be clearly defined, when they may be pasted upon cards.

The Precinct Chairman should attend the monthly meeting in her Precinct, and should assist the Legislative Leader in finding a suitable meeting place.

The Precinct Chairman should endeavor to have sufficient time each week for the accomplishment of the work allotted to her.

On receipt of the filled-out forms, which shall be sent to the Precinct Chairman by the Precinct Workers, the Chairman should further arrange all three lists in the order of their street numbers, and of the streets in their relation to each other, keeping a carbon copy of each form for her own files, and sending the original forms to her District Leader on the first and the fifteenth of the month following the receipt of these forms.

The Precinct Chairman will be supplied with card files for the purpose of keeping her lists.

DUTIES OF PRECINCT WORKERS.

The Precinct Chairman shall allot a definite territory in her Precinct to each Precinct Worker; blank forms will be furnished to each Precinct Worker by the Precinct Chairman, for the purpose of obtaining a record-list of male and female citizens in each precinct, with information concerning their attitude toward EQUAL SUFFRAGE. This is the principal object of the canvass. In addition to the above, the Precinct Worker should see that all who desire it are enrolled in THE HENNEPIN COUNTY WOMAN SUFFRAGE ASSOCIATION.

The Precinct Worker should carry a carbon paper and make a copy of each record secured; these completed forms should be arranged by the Precinct Worker in the order of the house numbers on the streets; the originals should be placed in one package, the copies in another, all to be mailed or delivered to the Precinct Chairman promptly on the first and the fifteenth of each month.

The Precinct Workers should make every effort to attend the monthly Precinct meetings; due notice of these meetings will be given by the Legislative Leader to each Precinct.

Each LEGISLATIVE DISTRICT is divided into precincts, the boundaries of which are already established as voting precincts.

Each Legislative District shall have a Leader to be appointed by the Board and shall be known as the DISTRICT LEADER.

Each District Leader shall appoint a Chairman in each precinct who shall be known as the PRECINCT CHAIRMAN.

Workers shall be appointed for each precinct and shall be known as PRECINCT WORKERS.

DUTIES OF LEGISLATIVE LEADERS.

District Leaders shall appoint an assistant, who shall take charge of the affairs of the district in the absence of the Leader.

The District Leader should appoint Precinct Chairmen for all precincts in her Legislative Districts, as soon as possible, sending their names to the Chairman of the Organization Committee, Mrs. A. L. Searle, 1781 Logan Ave. South, Minneapolis.

The District Leader should consult with the Precinct Chairmen about appointment of Precinct Workers, making an effort to appoint, as soon as possible as many Precinct Workers in each precinct as are available. Precinct Chairman will notify the Precinct Workers of their appointments.

SYNOPSIS.

Premier Fixstjerna of Sweden, who is most reactionary in his views in regard to the woman movement, endeavors to block the granting of the ballot to Swedish women by submitting a counter bill which will necessitate a sort of public service probation for women before they can be granted the vote, believing that by this method he can convince them that they do not need the ballot. In order to be entirely consistent, he insists that his daughters take service, one as a laundress, one as a housemaid and one as a clerk in a department store. Their mother is told that they have gone to Copenhagen to visit friends. The treatment received by the three girls in their respective situations is such that they return to their home absolutely confirmed in their belief that women must have the ballot for their protection, and are able to convince their father of the fact, he having been quite sincere in his mistaken belief that women already have full protection. In the meantime the mother finds that she has been deceived, and, enraged that her children's father is able to send them hither and thither at his will without her consent, in her turn becomes a staunch suffragist. The result is that the Premier's counter bill is never presented.
