In 1990, Max M. Kampelman was appointed Ambassador and Head of the U.S. Delegation to the CSCE Conference on the Human Dimension, in Copenhagen. He was recently asked by President Bush to serve in the same position in the CSCE talks which are scheduled to take place in September 1991, in Moscow.

Mr. Kampelman's impressive diplomatic career has included such positions as Senior Advisor to the United Nations from 1966 to 1967, Co-Chairman of the U.S. Delegation to Observe the Elections in El Salvador in May 1984, and Ambassador and Chairman of the U.S. Delegation to the Conference on Security and Cooperation in Europe in Madrid from 1980 to 1983.

Prior to his CSCE appointment, Mr. Kampelman served as the Ambassador and Head of the U.S. Delegation to the Negotiations on Nuclear and Space Arms, in Geneva from 1985 to 1989 as well as Counselor of the U.S. Department of State from 1987 to 1989. He is currently a Partner at the Law Firm of Fried, Frank, Harris, Shriver & Jacobson.

Dear Max,

Dr. Heinz Gaertner, a Resident Fellow at the Institute for East-West Security Studies, a research fellow at the Austrian Institute for International Affairs, and a member of the Expert Group on Arms Control at the Austrian Foreign Ministry, is in a unique position to explore the role of the smaller European states in arms control negotiations and verification.

The IEWSS Occasional Paper, by Dr. Gaertner Challenges of Verification: Smaller States and Arms Control published this month, considers whether the involvement of neutral and nonaligned states helps to overcome the traditional East-West polarization. It explores the possibility that smaller nations, including smaller members of the Warsaw Pact and NATO, could make positive contributions (1) to the verification of reductions in conventional forces, (2) to a chemical weapons conference, and (3) to a comprehensive nuclear test ban. Dr. Gaertner carefully analyzes the political and technological conditions necessary if neutral and nonaligned states are to participate in arms control negotiations and multilateral verification.

I am sending you a complimentary copy of Challenges of Verification in the hope that you will send me your comments and suggest others who would be interested in this IEWSS Occasional Paper.

Now's the time for you to visit the Institute. Bring Maggie and I'll put together a great luncheon discussion. M.
