James L. Oakes has served as a U.S. Court of Appeals Judge for the Second Circuit for almost 20 years; he was appointed Chief Judge, January 1, 1989.

Though born in Springfield, IL, and admitted to the California Bar, Judge Oakes has spent most of his life in the East. He was graduated from Harvard College A.B. cum laude and Harvard Law School cum laude, where he was Book Review and Articles Editor on the Law Review; and thereafter served two terms as Law Clerk to the Hon. Harrie B. Chase on the court of which Judge Oakes is now Chief Judge.

Residing in Vermont since 1950, Judge Oakes was a partner in Gannett & Oakes and Gannett, Oakes & Weber (1950-64); was a member of the State Commission on Procedural Revision, Statutory Revision Commission, Board of Bar Examiners; counsel to the Public Service Board; was a former President of the Vermont Bar Assn. and the Vermont Trial Lawyers' Assn., and served as Vermont State Chairman of the A.B.A. Junior Bar Conference. He served two terms as Senator from Windham County and was Attorney General of Vermont from 1967-69. Prior to his current appointment, he was a U.S. District Judge for Vermont.

Judge Oakes has also served on the A.B.A. Associate and Advisory Committee to the Standing Committee on Membership and the State Committee of Vermont Section on Judicial Administration. He was an Adjunct Professor at Duke University School of Law, and received honorary degrees from New England College and Suffolk University. He is a long-time member of the American Judicature Society and the Institute of Judicial Administration and recipient of the Learned Hand Medal (1983).

It is with great pride that Brandeis University presents the Louis Dembitz Brandeis Medal to the Honorable James L. Oakes.



Leon Silverman, senior litigation partner at Fried, Frank, Harris, Shriver & Jacobson for more than 30 years, has had a distinguished career bringing him national recognition as an attorney, public servant and humanitarian.

As Special Advisor to the Court in the Johns-Manville reorganization proceedings, he was described by the *New York Times* as "the key figure responsible for calming one of the most rancorous legal fights in recent history." He was recently appointed Special Advisor to the Court in connection with the restructuring of the Manville Trust. Fried Frank's litigation dept., which he heads, has been a major force in some of the most significant legal and business issues of our time.

Early in his career, he demonstrated a commitment to public service, spending three years as an Asst. U.S. Attorney for the Southern District of NY and two years as Asst. Deputy Attorney General of the U.S. during the 1950's. In 1981 he served as U.S. Special Prosecutor in the Secretary of Labor Investigation.

Throughout his career, Leon has been a leader in his profession, giving freely of his talents to the improvement of the administration of justice. A past president of the Legal Aid Society of NY, he has served on its board for more than 25 years. He also serves as V.P. of the U.S. Supreme Court Historical Society. He is a past president of the American College of Trial Lawyers, and has been active on many key committees of city, state and national bar organizations. Areas of special concern include human rights, juvenile justice, criminal justice, drug laws, legal aid and judicial appointments.

Recognized for his humanitarianism by numerous philanthropic organizations, he has received the AJC Learned Hand Human Relations Award (1981), the Federal Bar Council's Emory Buckner Medal (1982) and the UJA's Proskauer Award (1985).

Brandeis University takes pride in presenting its 1991 Award for Distinguished Community Service to Leon Silverman.

REMARKS OF
AMBASSADOR MAX M. KAMPELMAN
BRANDEIS UNIVERSITY
LAWYERS DIVISION

New York, New York

April 10, 1991

Thank you Mr. Chairman. At the outset, let me offer my congratulations to the Honorable James L. Oakes, Chief Judge of the U.S. Court of Appeals, Second Circuit. The Louis Dembitz Brandeis Medal for Distinguished Legal Service is a significant award. I cherish the medal that I received, and I know, Judge Oakes, that you will cherish this well-deserved tribute to you as well. Congratulations.

Aware of the story of the newly selected minister who was told by the elders of the church that there were no time limits on sermons but that they believed very few souls were saved after the first twenty minutes, I asked those who arranged this meeting how long I should speak in connection with my task this evening to present Leon Silverman with his award. I was told in a rather unsubtle fashion that I had about three minutes. Even though I am persuaded that no souls will be saved in this audience of lawyers and judges, even in twenty minutes of preaching, the restriction to three minutes did seem arbitrary and onerous.

What to do in three short minutes? Do I praise Leon Silverman, or do I praise Brandeis University? Leon would obviously feel that I could not do justice to him in 180

seconds. He is likely to be dissatisfied with anything less than a major eulogy. So I have decided to talk about Brandeis, which, I remind you, is grateful for all favors, small and large.

Established only forty-one short years ago, Brandeis has, within that extraordinarily brief period, become one of our nation's finest and most highly regarded institutions of higher learning. Its accomplishments, I respectfully suggest, are due to its effective merging of Jewish values with the promise and reality of American democracy, thereby creating a rich atmosphere, a deep and broadly encompassing ethic, which is at the core of our democratic society.

In successfully executing that effective merger, Brandeis has successfully acquired the essential strength of both traditions. It has thereby followed in the footsteps and indeed added to the accomplishments of our nation's oldest and most illustrious universities, nearly all of which were founded by Christian religious leaders who were themselves thoroughly imbued by Old Testament learning. These were people captivated by the Hebrew language, the language of the Holy Scriptures, which they used for their emblems and proceeded energetically to teach. Their's was an ethic motivated by a religious commitment to learning. Brandeis, founded by Jewish leaders, stands tall in that same tradition. Those of us here this evening have every reason to be proud of our identification with this tradition.

My dear friend and long-time law partner, Leon Silverman, belongs to that tradition, lives it, strengthens it, and is indeed most worthy to receive the Brandeis Distinguished Community Service Award this evening.

Leon is not a particularly humble man. But what he lacks in humility he more than makes up in humanity and in his commitment to human values and compassion. In any event, it is not easy in the Jewish tradition to be humble. The tale is told of a Kol Nidre synagogue service where the ancient Jewish Rabbi, taken by the solemnity of this most somber of Jewish holidays, loudly proclaimed: "Oh, Lord, I am a nothing, a nothing!" The Cantor, caught up in the emotion, sang out: "Oh, Lord, I am a nothing, a nothing!" The President of the synagogue, similarly moved, shouted: "I, too, dear Lord, I am a nothing, a nothing." Whereupon, the lowly sexton, affected by the emotion of the moment, joined in with "I am a nothing, a nothing." At that, the President turned to the Rabbi and whispered: "Look who thinks he's a nothing!"

Leon's extraordinary gifts as a lawyer and human being have shone through the galaxy of stars who habituate this great city, many of whom are in this distinguished audience tonight. Brooklyn born, he stretched beyond his environment to become editor of the Yale Law Review and then built on that accomplishment by studying at the London School of Economics.

He reached for and then outdid himself in pursuing and then persuading Rita to become his wife, thereby easing his path toward further success. He became a partner in a most distinguished law firm in which he has had an opportunity to serve as its co-chairman. His public service brought him to the U.S. Attorney's Office, and then to Washington as Assistant Deputy Attorney General of the United States. My luxury is to invest my surplus effort . . . to the pleasure of taking up a problem and solving or helping solve it for the people without any compensation . . . I have only one life and it is short enough. Why waste it on things I don't want most? I don't want money or property most. I want to be free."

The recipients of the Brandeis Distinguished Community Service Award reflect and enlarge upon Justice Brandeis' original ideals in both professional and social life serving as role models and leaders in their given fields and communities. In countless ways, their leadership has served to enhance the lives of others although their efforts have, at times, gone unrecognized. In honor of their good works, the University confers the Distinguished Community Service Award upon the men and women who have given so generously of their time and support.
