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Kampelman REMARKS OF MAX M. KAMPELMAN TO SECOND INTERNATIONAL SCHOLARS COLLOOUIUM OF AMERICA-HOLY LAND STUDIES September 1, 1983 Washington, D.C. Mr. Chairman, distinguished guests, learned scholars on the dais and in the audience, ladies and gentlemen, friends, it is appropriate that we should have formalized the community of interest that exists between the United States of America and that area of the world which is holy to so many religous groups. The Holy Land is correctly identified as the cradle of our civil-

ization. History will record that the United States of America is the birthplace of a new civilization, one marking the continued evolution of the human being toward the God-like dimensions which is the essence of all religious faith.

It is thus not only appropriate but fully understandable that the National Archives and Records Service of the United States of America, the Jewish Historical Society and the Institute of Contemporary Jewry of the Hebrew University of Jerusalem should be engaged in a joint scholarly effort to explore the serious historic relationship between the Holy Land and the United States.

This is now the third and final day of that scholarly colloquium, the second such international colloquium. It is my privilege at this final luncheon to express the appreciation of those engaged in this scholarly effort to the Archivist of the United States, Robert Mark Warner. Dr. Warner and I have been associated together in other activities committed to the pursuit of learning. We are colleagues on the Board of the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars of the Smithsonian Institution. In all of his activities, Bob Warner has lent dignity, scholarship and wisdom to the proceedings.

The National Archives is a unique and irreplaceable institution. It preserves and makes available for reference the permanently valuable records of the government of the United States. It operates 15 record centers and 7 presidential libraries. It directs the massive government records management program. It is truly a national monument and treasure.

The America-Holy Land Study Program comprises 72 books. It is fitting that copies of those volumes be placed in our Archives, in the collection of our nation's home for priceless documents.

It is my pleasure to present this collection to Dr. Warner, the Archivist of the United States, who, with his staff, symbolize the dedication to learning and the commitments to the preservation and strengthening of scholarship. Thank you for graciously and warmly acting as our host for this colloquium.

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THE AMERICA-HOLY LAND PROJECT AND COLLOQUIUM

FACT SHEET

The America-Holy Land Project promotes the study and understanding of the varied relationships between the United States and the Holy Land between 1620 and 1948.

PURPOSE: The project develops research and reference tools designed to aid scholars in locating, identifying and describing original resource materials. It maintains an ongoing research program, sponsors scholars, collects and publishes appropriate materials, as well as holds academic conferences.

FIRST INTERNATIONAL SCHOLARS COLLOQUIUM: An International Scholars Colloquium was held in 1975 at the United States National Archives. The Colloquium proceedings were published in the volume With Eyes Toward Zion (New York: Arno Press, 1977). The Colloquium also provided the impetus for the publication of 71 volumes of previously out of print material determined as essential to understanding America-Holy Land relations.

1983 INTERNATIONAL SCHOLARS COLLOQUIUM: From August 30th to September 1, 1983, The Second International Scholars Colloquium on America-Holy Land Studies will be held at the National Archives and Records Service, to report on progress as well as new findings made in Great Britain, Turkey and Israel. The Colloquium will include a session which will demonstrate how America-Holy Land Studies can be utilized on the university level in the teaching of American and Religious Studies. The proceedings of the Colloquium will be published shortly.


RELATED PUBLICATIONS: In 1980, Guide to America-Holy Land Studies, Volume 1 "American Presence" was issued, describing in detail various collections which contained material appropriate for research. A volume issued in 1981, entitled The Holy Land in American Protestant Life 1800-1948, provided selections of published materials describing associations of the Protestant American community with the Holy Land. A second Guide volume, "Political Relations and American Zionism," appeared in November 1982. The third Guide will deal with economic relations and philanthropy. Additional publications will be concerned with scientific and cultural contacts and the contents of the collections found in Israel. The publishers of volumes 2 and 3 of the Guide and the proceedings volume of the Second Colloquium is Praeger Publishers.




