The Global Leadership Award

The Association's Global Leadership Award is given in recognition of outstanding leadership by an individual in furthering the broad purposes and principles of the United Nations as set forth in its Charter. We present this award to Secretary-General Boutros Boutros-Ghali in recognition of his leadership in peacemaking and peacekeeping, as well as his efforts to promote sustainable development.

Egyptian statesman, scholar, and diplomat Boutros Boutros-Ghali was appointed Secretary-General of the United Nations in December 1991. Immediately prior, he had served as his country's Deputy Prime Minister for Foreign Affairs since October 1977, and as a Member of Parliament since 1987. He had also been Vice-President of the Socialist International.

Since taking office as the sixth U.N. Secretary-General, Mr. Boutros-Ghali has been actively involved in the search for solutions in various areas of conflict in Africa, Asia, Central America, and Europe. On January 31, 1992, at the first Security Council Summit ever held, the Secretary-General was invited to prepare an analysis and recommendations on ways of strengthening and making more efficient the capacity of the U.N. for preventive diplomacy, peacemaking, and peacekeeping. His groundbreaking report, "An Agenda for Peace," was published on June 17 of that year.

The Congressional Leadership Award

The Association's Congressional Leadership Award is given in recognition of outstanding congressional leadership in furthering the broad purposes and principles of the United Nations as set forth in its Charter. We present this award to Senator Daniel Patrick Moynihan in recognition of his many years of leadership on U.N. related issues.

*The Honorable Daniel Patrick Moynihan
United States Senate*

Daniel Patrick Moynihan, senior U.S. Senator from New York, is Chairman of the Senate Committee on Finance; Vice Chairman of the Joint Committee on Taxation; a member of the Committee on Rules and Administration; and Chairman or member of several key Subcommittees, including Chairman of the Subcommittee on Near Eastern and South Asian Affairs of the Committee on Foreign Relations.

Elected to the Senate in 1976, Senator Moynihan has served in the Cabinet or Sub-Cabinet of Presidents Kennedy, Johnson, Nixon, and Ford, the only American to serve in four successive Administrations. He was Ambassador to India from 1973 to 1975 and Ambassador to the United Nations from 1975 to 1976. An author, a professor, and a statesman, Senator Moynihan is the recipient of numerous awards and some 55 honorary degrees.

The Eleanor Roosevelt Award

The Association's Eleanor Roosevelt Award is given in recognition of exemplary service to the United Nations Association of the U.S.A. Ambassador Kampelman served as Chairman of the Board of Governors from 1989 to September 1993.

The Honorable Max M. Kampelman

A lawyer, diplomat, and educator, Max M. Kampelman was Counselor of the Department of State and Ambassador and Head of the U.S. Delegation to the Negotiations on Nuclear and Space Arms in Geneva, before returning in January 1989 as a partner in the law firm of Fried, Frank, Harris, Shriver & Jacobson. Recently he was appointed by President Clinton to the Boards of the Eurasia Foundation and the U.S. Institute for Peace, both of which he serves as Vice Chairman.

Ambassador Kampelman is Chairman Emeritus of Freedom House, newly retired Chairman of the Board of Governors of the United Nations Association-U.S.A., and Chairman of the Jerusalem Foundation. His book, Entering New Worlds; The Memoirs of a Private Man in Public Life, was published in 1991 by HarperCollins. In 1989 President Reagan awarded him the Presidential Citizens Medal, which recognizes "citizens of the United States who have performed exemplary deeds of service for their country and their fellow citizens."

Carroll Petrie National U.N. Day Chair

Internationally acclaimed art patron, philanthropist, and civic leader Carroll Petrie has assumed the title and duties of 1993 National U.N. Day Chair, overseeing UNA-U.S.A.'s coordination of U.N. Day (October 24) celebrations in cities and towns throughout the United States. Upon accepting the position, Mrs. Petrie paid tribute to Eleanor Roosevelt, a founder of UNA-U.S.A., and to Senator Nancy Kassebaum, National U.N. Day Chair for 1992.

Carroll Petrie serves on the board of several medical and cultural institutions as well as of Petrie Stores, the enterprise founded by her husband, Milton. The couple is well known to art lovers through the Carroll and Milton Petrie European Sculpture Court, a feature of New York's Metropolitan Museum of Art since 1990. Mrs. Petrie has been awarded honorary degrees by the New York Institute of Technology and Long Island University.

REMARKS BY
MAX M. KAMPELMAN
ACCEPTANCE OF ELEANOR ROOSEVELT AWARD
UNITED NATIONS ASSOCIATION
OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

Washington, DC

October 29, 1993

Thank you, Bill.

Mr. Secretary General, Senator Moynihan, Mr. Deputy
Secretary, Chairman Whitehead, Ambassador Albright, Mrs. Petrie,
Mr. Allard, Your Excellencies, Ladies and Gentlemen.

Let me end the suspense and hasten to assure you that I
accept your Eleanor Roosevelt Award with great pleasure, pride
and personal satisfaction. As for your generous introduction,
Bill, I enjoyed every one of your lovely exaggerations.

Human history is a progression from the individual to the
family with the loyalties accompanying that expansion; from the
family to the tribe; from the tribe to the village; from the
village to the state. With the globalization of science,
technology, communications and economics, the dominant question
today is whether the world body politic is ready to take the
next step toward the globalization of human loyalty.

The concept of national sovereignty has undergone immense change as we have learned that national boundaries do not restrain missiles, money, terrorists, satellites, crime, refugees, pollution. It is no longer considered to be an improper interference in the internal affairs of a country for international concern to be expressed -- and even acted upon -- where human rights are abused, aggression is apparent, people are starving, terrorism is sponsored, and peace is undermined. Border guards we, know, can keep out vaccines, but they cannot keep out germs, or ideas, or broadcasts.

The course from individual to family to tribe to village to state calls for building on the foundations of the past rather than destroying them. The family is built on the individual; the tribe is a form of extended family; the village is based on these extended relationships; and the state today shows extraordinary resilience as individuals and families desire to preserve their history, take pride in their ethnicity, and honor their flags. The new dimension of political globalism, if it is to prevail, must be based on the dignity of the individual, and respect for the institutions and aspirations created to reflect that dignity.

With the United Nations approaching it's 50th year, we of the UNA-USA are aware of the opportunity that is ours to help our country find its way in this dramatically evolving new world with its trials, traps and challenges.

Our task is a formidable one. It is nothing less than helping to build a world community in which we can evolve from the species Homo sapiens to the species "human being".

Mr. Chairman, friends, thank you for your award. I shall cherish it. My nearly five years as Chairman of your Board have been enriching. It was a special privilege to work with our staff, with our Board, and with my good friend John Whitehead, an extraordinary leader and exemplary citizen.
