### William J. Baroody, Jr.

Born November 5, 1937 in Manchester, N.H., son of William J. Baroody, Sr. and Naabeeha Baroody.

Graduate of Holy Cross College, Worcester, MA. in 1959. Pursued graduate work in political science at Georgetown University.

Served as an officer in the U. S. Navy from 1959 to 1961.

Worked on the staff of Congressman Melvin Laird of Wisconsin from 1961 to 1968, then became Research Director of the House Republican Conference.

From 1969 to 1973 he was at the Department of Defense, as Assistant to the Secretary, with responsibility for long-range planning. He received the highest civilian award that can be given by the Secretary of Defense, the Defense Distinguished Civilian Public Service Award, in 1973.

He was a member of the White House Staff, as Assistant to the President of the United States, from 1973-1977. In this capacity, he organized and was the first Director of the Office of Public Liaison.

He became President of the American Enterprise Institute in 1978, where he served until 1986.

He holds honorary degrees from Seattle University, Marist College, Assumption College and St. Mary of the Woods College.

In March, 1981 President Reagan appointed him to fill the remainder of his father's unexpired term on the Woodrow Wilson Center's Board of Trustees. He was appointed Chairman of the Board in January, 1982, and was reappointed to a second full term expiring October 23, 1994.
