## EUGENE J. KEOGH DISTINGUISHED PUBLIC SERVICE AWARD

New York, New York

June 19, 1996

Thank you. One of the ancient Hebrew sages taught that the worthiness of an honor directly relates to the extent of the wounds suffered in the earning of that honor. By that wise standard, I accept your honor with genuine humility, because the wounds have been few while the opportunities I have had for public service have brought me many satisfactions and numerous stimuli toward personal growth. The rewards and recognition have been generous and extensive and the pleasures have been bountiful. By the standards of the sage, this award is obviously unearned — but most welcome.

It has been suggested that my remarks be brief. I shall be guided by that advice, although I surmise that the source for the advice was either unaware of my close relationship with Hubert Humphrey; or was too young to understand the possible consequences that flow from that close association. His wife, Muriel, on a number of occasions had to remind him: "Hubert, a speech need not be eternal to be immortal." And Senator Dole in his recent farewell remarks to the Senate quoted Humphrey as saying to him: "I never thought my speeches went too long. I enjoyed every moment!"

Not all of us in our lifetimes have the opportunity for public service. As a young university instructor in political science who became friends with the new elected young Mayor

of Minneapolis, I had the opportunity to engage in many of the intricacies of municipal government, from charter reform to crime to race and human relations. I soon thereafter found myself organizing politically in rural Minnesota. When Humphrey's ambitions led him to Washington and the Senate, I accepted his invitation to become his counsel, and the scope of my work encompassed the nation and the world, an interest which continued even after I left the Senate to build a law practice. The ambassadorial assignments which followed under Presidents Carter, Reagan and Bush, seemed to flow naturally.

My opportunities for public service were fortuitous and unique to my personal interests. Some may prefer other roads to travel and opportunities to develop. What all of us in this room must appreciate is that we are the more fortunate among our fellow citizens and that carries responsibilities as well as blessings.

I close my remarks this evening with an observation that is the central point of my focus as I contemplate the onrushing 21st century we are about to enter. Each of us and our blessed nation is part of a shrinking world from which we cannot isolate ourselves. Our economy, our science, our values, our technology, our communication, our missiles, our medicines, our crime, our drug problems — these are all inter-related with the rest of the world. Boundary lines and policed borders can keep out vaccines, but they cannot keep out germs, or broadcasts or ideas. Our future is global. We are proud citizens of the United States, but we must also realize that we are citizens of the world — and both of these provide us responsibilities as well as opportunities.


