Minutes From the Annual Meeting on November 21, 1992

Shanti Shah reviewed the 1992 goals and accomplishments. Shanti described an year full of activities and great accomplishments.

- Festival of India was organized by Raja Ramaswami and it was also was very successful. This year various political leaders from the State and City Governments, and the Indian Consular General were present at the Festival
- Political Liaison: The India Club gave a reception to the Indian Ambassador during his visit to Minnesota. Rahim Rahiman organized the reception. 
I've looked over your samples of past newsletters, and offer the following comments. They refer to the style of the piece, not its contents, since I'm not familiar with the club, its aims and goals.

Generally, a newsletter, like the organization it represents, should strive for an identity through consistency. This is the best way to achieve recognition and reader interest.

- 1. Maintain a consistent, professional writing style through careful editing. Watch for typographical errors.
- 2. Use one type style for body copy, one style for headlines. Don't mix a variety of styles.
- 3. Pick a column format -- one, two, or three column, and stick with it.
- 4. Try to maintain the same number of pages for every issue. This helps control costs, and also helps the editor plan each issue. There may be good reasons to vary the page count from time to time, but it works best to be consistent.
- 5. Try to place recurring departments—editor's article, book reviews, upcoming events, etc.—in the same position in each issue. Again, this helps build consistency and readership.
- 6. It's hard to tell from the samples what the mission of the club and the newsletter is—simply a clearinghouse of information, a forum for readers, or an opinion journal with definite viewpoints on issues facing India and the Indian community. The newsletter can incorporate all three areas, of course, but there doesn't seem to be a strong thrust in any particular direction. (I guess this does get into content, after all).
- 7. I know the newsletter recently went through another design change, but I think a few dollars spent on a professional format would be well spent. I'm also not crazy about the paper stock.

Hope these comments are of some value.



President Granner Reports on Bethania Visit

Bob Granner, President of the Bethania Foundation in the United States, spent several weeks in India this summer. What follows is his report on the Bethania Home as he found it.

It was two years ago, in the summer of 1987, that Priscilla and I stood on bare ground, just outside the village of Kannivadi in South India. We hardly dared to imagine that this might be the place where our dream of creating a home for destitute children might come true. Still, we were committed to the children—to Pandy (who later took the name Susannah), Thomas, and James, who had been abandoned on Dayavu's doorstep. We had promised them a home.

It was largely Dayavu's faith that gave us the courage to begin to build the Bethania Home. She had had a recurring vision for many years of a countless line of such children coming to herabandoned, abused, crippled, poverty-stricken—all in need of love.

Dayavu's dreams are big ones. As many of us know, she dreamed long ago of coming to America, the "great land of plenty," to tell about her vision and to make each one of these children come alive for us through her vivid stories of their lives. That dream, of course, has come true, for her and for us, many times. We have heard the stories, and we have responded to the need. By God's grace the Bethania Home for Children is now a reality.

Today the ground is tilled and covered with lush vegetation, with millet and various types of lentils (dry cereal crops) that grow well in an arid climate. There are mango trees, coconut palms, and banana plants, set in the ground recently by students from Kodaikanal International School. The trees will soon



provide not only good food but also tropical beauty and shade from the hot sun. Two cows, one with calf, and the chickens scurrying about gave me the impression of being back on the farm in Iowa, but it was the water pump that thrilled me the most.

You cannot imagine what a rare gift it is in India to have fresh water. To see the children come, one by one, to the pump, to take as many buckets of water as they like, for drinking, for cooking, for bathing: this is luxury beyond belief for Indian children, most of whom live in crowded rural areas or in squalid city slums. "Our" children—there are thirty of them now—also have plenty of fresh air and space to run about, to laugh, to play. They have a real home for the first time in their lives. It is their vitality, their smiles, and their exuberance that give life to the land and to the Bethania Home.

The main structure is a large rectangular stone dormitory, with an attached kitchen, a two-room apartment for houseparents, and a covered veranda in front that stretches the full length of the building. It is a single story building at this point, but the roof of reinforced concrete will be adequate to support a second floor. The present structure will house up to forty children, the engineer tells me, and the second story would make room for twice that number. A temporary thatched roof is being constructed until the funding for the second story can be provided. The long line of children in Dayavu's vision continues. Children are brought nearly every day, and it is difficult for Priscilla and Dayavu to tell them we can't take anymore just now, until we are sure we can provide for them.

The most recent building is a hexagonal guest house that provides a place for Dayavu and Priscilla and others who make regular visits. Students involved in the outreach program at Kodai School, for instance, come down regularly to work on a project, such as planting trees, learning about agriculture, or just to have a peaceful weekend on the plains playing with the Bethania "kids." The guest house is big enough to house twenty of these young people at a time, or more if they choose to "sleep out" on the roof.

And what of the future? Now that the initial building phase is nearing completion, what next? Priscilla feels the top priority for the coming year is adding to the professional staff. We need professionally qualified houseparents, she thinks, who have both managerial and nurturing skills and who would also serve as models of Christian love for our children. It would be ideal, too, she feels, if the housemother were a registered nurse who could oversee a small medical clinic there on the site. Besides the clinic, Priscilla wants to start a school for grades one through five so the younger children, some badly crippled, do not have to walk into the village every day, and so they can begin to learn English. She would also like to develop some of the agricultural possibilities that our small acreage calls for. Her immediate plan is to begin a poultry farm that would provide not only meat and eggs for the children but also meaningful activity and light industry for the Home. There is apparently a good market for eggs in the surrounding community.

The possibilities at Bethania are endless—just as endless as the long line of children in Dayavu's vision. If you were to visit the Home, you would agree, I am sure, that we must continue to open our hearts and our minds, as well as our pocketbooks, to say "Yes" to more of these children—to continue to provide for their spiritual welfare as well as their physical and emotional needs. Jesus said, "... forbid them not, for such is the Kingdom of Heaven." Let us do all we can to add to that Kingdom at Bethania.

"At the end of the [July 1989 Board] meeting, Bob Granner announced his resignation as President of the Board effective June 1, 1990. At that time, Bob will leave for India in order to teach in Kodai School. His presence in Kodai will understandably be an asset as far as Bethania is concerned; however, it is with regret that the Board accepts his resignation. Sincere gratitude was expressed for all that he has meant and will continue to mean for Bethania."

Americans Visit Bethania

Bob's daughter, <u>Carrie Granner Reed</u>, traveled with her dad back to her childhood home in India this summer. Here are her comments about Bethania:

"I will remember everything about our visit at Bethania—the simple yet fantastic food, the sparkling, welcoming, playful eyes of the children, both the ones who shyly, wordlessly watched from a distance, and those who came close and touched my hair, held my hand, and climbed onto my lap, chattering in Tamil non-stop. They were affectionate and curious, and delighted to have visitors.

"One afternoon after lunch, several of the children asked me if I wanted to go on a hike up the small mountain near Bethania. They took my hand and off we went. Karis and Dana went, too, and helped translate for me. (Karis and Dana are Priscilla's young daughters.) We climbed for a long time up huge rocks and stopped now and then to inscribe our names on cactus leaves, and to slide down smooth grooves in the rocks. We had some hard candy, but when that was gone, we decided to go back home to get some water. I'll never forget, on one broad open space, holding hands with two of the children and running down, down, jumping over plants and rocks, laughing, shrieking with laughter... it felt like we were flying!

"Later in the evening we played jump rope and some handclapping games I remembered from grade school days in Kodai, and of course I had to pick up each child and twirl round and round until we all collapsed in a dizzy heap. "The politeness of the people at Bethania—the grown-ups and the children—the way they all helped each other, impressed me very much. No one made fun of anyone else for being crippled or for "walking funny" or for having a "white face." (One of the boys is an albino.) It felt like a family in which each person is grateful to belong to a loving group. Naturally, like any family, life at Bethania couldn't always be so harmonious. But there are many people there who are working hard to create a safe, comfortable, structured, and very loving life for a lot of beautiful children."

Bill Bauschke, a friend of Bob's, from the Chicago suburbs, had this to say about his arrival at Bethania:

"After descending about 7000 feet down the long winding road from Kodaikanal to the plains, passing through several crowded villages, we began to see signs that read Kannivadi, 10 kilometers—Kannivadi, 6 kilometers—Kannivadi, 3 kilometers and so on, until we reached a narrow dirt road that turned into the Bethania grounds.

"Seeing Bethania for the first time, I thought, 'My God, this is not only a real place; it's flourishing!' I knew right then that anyone who has ever been a part of this dream would approve of what we saw.

"We could only be there for a few days, but in that time we participated in the dedication of the new guest house; we planted coconut palm trees in a sort of ceremony; and best of all, we made friends with a lot of wonderful kids.

"India is a great country, but it is a country in need of such places as this for "displaced children." Bethania already could be bursting at its seams if it didn't have to restrict its intake now. Think of it!

"Someday, if you are able to make the trip across the miles, I think you will see signs on the road to Kannivadi that read: 10 kilometers to *Bethania*; 6 kilometers to *Bethania*; 3 miles to *Bethania*, and so on. Wouldn't that be something!"

Another visitor, <u>Manuel Rameriz</u>, was especially interested in the women who serve in Bethania. She describes them as . . .

"... beautiful in appearance and service. Jayarani, the cook, arrives at dawn each morning to start the fire and begin the preparation of the first meal. Using the same primitive methods of food preparation and cooking that are used throughout the villages of India, thirty children and whatever guests are fed. Cheerful, bright-eyed Bimla was abandoned by her parents, who could not afford to keep her. She earns her keep, the same as the young woman, Ritu, preparing the food for cooking, serving in the main house and in the guest house, and caring for the children. Of course, there is the heating of the water over the fires, and a lot of clean up. These women are the nurturers these children have never had before. They are also good role models, I think, for the young girls at Bethania."

Meet "Joseph"



This fine looking young man was named Muruhasan when he came to Bethania a few months ago. He was not so happy looking then. His mother had just died and his father did not want him. He sat listening avidly to the Bible stories that Prebhu, the housefather at Bethania read to the children each evening before meals. One evening he came up and said that he wanted to change his name. Prebhu was surprised but listened to the boy's reason. He liked the Christmas story, he said, and he wanted to be called Joseph. Prebhu couldn't think of a reason why the boy should not have a Christian name, so he has been JOSEPH ever since.

Follow-Up on Thiruchelvam

Do you remember the young man pictured in an earlier newsletter recently working busily at his sewing machine? Thiruchelvam, a post polio victim, spent several months in tailoring school while he was at Bethania. Now he has returned to Kodai where he works in a tailor's shop to support his asthmatic father. It is rewarding to realize that Thiruchelvam's experience at Bethania has had a direct influence upon his rehabilitation. Bob Granner visited him in his "new" shop this summer and found him to be a very happy young man.

"The Greatest of These is Love"

The author of the article which follows was written by Bonni Belle Pickard, a teacher at Kodaikanal International School. She and her husband, Alfred, also a teacher there, and their three children visited Bethania recently.

The pathway twisted and bumped along beneath our car while branches brushed the sides and swept inside the open windows. Suddenly the brush cleared and it stood before us—long, cream-colored, crisp and new, and the sign above announcing, "Bethania." We made our way slowly, amidst excited dancing children, chattering away and trying to peer into every window at once! Stopping at what seemed to be an appropriate spot, we began introductions (and found that our hostesses, Dayavu and Priscilla, had gone to Madras!) while our car seemed to unload itself, its contents instantly transported to the "office." It seemed the Guest House wasn't quite finished, but within minutes, the children and the orphanage staff had moved us in, made the beds, pumped us buckets of water, swept the floor, turned on the fans, and grinned a thousand noisy grins at us.

And so it went for the day we spent at Bethania, food, smiles, songs, prayers, games happily were shared. Rajesh, the proud owner of a play watch and plastic sunglasses, immediately lent them to our toddler for the duration of our stay. The only other toys consisted of an ancient (but heartily used) basketball, a collection of small stones that the girls used as jacks, and two sticks that became the sole equipment for a village game the boys played with my husband, Alfred, throughout the afternoon. All the children's belongings, including their straw mats and a few pillows (which were offered to us, but we'd brought our own) were stored on the shelves along the side wall of the long, spotlessly clean common room. Those walls witnessed playing, singing, prayers throughout the day and guarded the girls' sleeping on the floor at night. On Sunday morning, a pink plastic card of dangling earrings appeared from one small trunk.

Intense whispered negotiations led to three little girls preening each other's earlobes while one of the smallest happily spent the rest of the morning playing with the pink plastic card!

Upstairs in the "loft," the boy's sleeping area was protected by thatch roof and walls. The rest of the flat roof was the perfect viewing area for the spectacular display of the countryside. Behind rose the gray worn hills of stone and then the sudden green mountains. In front, fields and villages tumble down the gentle slope to the plains. On the rooftop at dusk, time stood still in true Indian fashion—until the electric lights began to dot the plains with hundreds of new spots! The boys below scurried around with kerosene lanterns as the electricity decided to avoid Bethania for a while. Soon the bell summoned us all to "Juh bum" (prayers). I caught about one in fifty of the Tamil words that whirled around in the Bible readings and songs and prayers (though one girl proudly offered me her new Tamil bible) and finally identified their rendition of "Abide With Me."

Supper finished, bedtime—the fans went off and on. My thoughts sought to sort themselves out. So much has been done with so little! Next time I'll bring my button boxes and get those shirts and blouses fixed... and some pictures and posters for the walls. They liked the tapes we brought—are there Tamil Christmas music tapes? Would they like more earrings?... my trinkets pale beside their hospitability. "The greatest of these is Love."
