

- We had 9 nonprofit organizations who had booths and 10 for profit organizations who also had booths. All were a big hit. These provided a great opportunity to examine, see, and taste India culture. We want to extend a special thanks to **Sunu Kunjummen** for her hard work and special efforts in co-ordinating the booths and providing many areas of assistance.

The Festival of India was very well attended and enjoyed by all. The credit goes to **Betty Thomas** for the excellent job she did in publicity. Thanks very much to Betty for her work. **Stefan Peterson** co-ordinated the set up for the Festival. Thanks much to Stefan for coming in early and working hard even though he had tickets to the Vikings game at noon!

Finally, a great thanks are due to **Ajit Varghese**, our **1994 Festival of India Chairperson**. Ajit did a fantastic job of managing endless details and unexpected events. The India Association is grateful for his sacrifices, dedication, and good attitude. Thanks, Ajit, for a great event!

#### LAMP Thanks the Community

LAMP (Literacy As Movement of the People) is an organization that has successfully integrated the literacy movement with rural development. Minnesotans are in the forefront of this movement.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank the Indian community for their support of this organization. Through the sincere and sole efforts of MN volunteers and contributions from you all we have managed to literate 10,000 Indians in different states of India. As you know, literacy is directly related to the economic and social progress of a country.

Let me give you a few highlights about our work in Minnesota.

1) Apart from the money we send to all other states, every year we choose a special state program that will receive a large sum of money from us. Tamil Nadu was the chosen state in 1993 and we have sent \$5300 to BGVS-Tamil Nadu.

2) In the year 1993 we also sent \$3462 to all other states. For the year 1994 we have so

far collected \$5305 as contributions. It takes \$5 to literate one person.

3) In the summer of 1994 one of our volunteers taught in Delhi and saw to the appropriate distribution of our funds. As you already know our volunteers have visited and taught in Bengal, Tamil Nadu, Haryana, Andhra Pradesh and Pondicherry. Many associated India groups are involved in similar efforts in several cities in the United States.

4) Starting in 1995 we hope to approach the American Community to lend their support to

our movement. If any of you have good ideas on this please contact us.

In the past few months there has been considerable activism in the Indian Community in political matters in U.S. which will also impact on the progress of Indians here as well as in India. We hope this enthusiasm persists and we work together as a Community. We would also like to thank India Association for their continued support of our organization.

The Consulate General of India in Chicago has informed us that there has been an increase in fees for various kinds of visas. These increased rates are in effect as of November 1. 1994. The new fee schedule is given below:





#### P.I.C.

#### (Adoptive) Parents Of Indian Children

Minnesota is home to over 718 children born in India, who have been adopted by married couples or single people who are not of Indian descent. The children come from all parts of India - Calcutta, Kerala, Bombay, Madras, Patna, Delhi and points beyond. These children range in age from one year to 18 years old.

International adoption is relatively new. The first adoptions of Indian born children occurred in 1978. Recognizing how essential a child's culture of origin is to his or her sense of self, several adoptive parents joined together to form (Adoptive) Parents of Indian Children, or P.I.C. The organization has four objectives. The first is to provide parenting support for the parents of adopted Indian born children. Second, to offer information and guidance to parents waiting for their Indian born children. Third, to provide cultural activities and events to enhance the families knowledge and appreciation of the child's cultural heritage. The last objective is to provide opportunities of social and/or cultural nature which would allow development of relationships with Indian children and adults. Currently, P.I.C. has a membership of 100 families. Activities over the last year have included a well attended workshop by Ranee Ramaswamy and a cultural camp which was planned and conducted with the generous support of the School of Indian Language and Culture. This year, P.I.C. will be conducting a workshop for parents on working with the schools on cultural competency issues. It will again be sponsoring a culture camp and other social/cultural events for members.

P.I.C. is a resource to families both in the area of multicultural heritage and in the area of being an adoptive family. Parents and children who come together to form adoptive families face predictable developmental issues which are unique to adoption. P.I.C. works with adoption programs to provide long term resources to families.

P.I.C. members are grateful for the support and interest shown by the Indian Community of Minnesota. We would welcome a chance to answer any questions people might have regarding our work or regarding adoption. Please feel free to contract Lynn Malfeld at 645-9068 if you would like more information.

#### Perspectives of a P.I.C. Child:

Children begin to tell their parents and the P.I.C. organization how they feel about their Indian heritage and what things have been supportive to them in learning about themselves and their country of origin. One young girl who was willing to share her thoughts on this is 13 year old Holly

Cole. Holly arrived home to her parents while a very young infant.

Her parents, Lon and Marge Cole, like other PIC parents, have been strong advocates for the importance of supporting the children's (and their adoptive families) linkages with the Indian culture and community. Holly and her parents have been involved in social events and Indian cultural events all of her life. They are regular attendees of the culture camp, Festival of Nations, and India Day.

When Holly was asked what her thoughts are about her Indian heritage and what she would like to teach her children about her heritage she replied, "I think it is great that I am of Indian heritage because my friends may ask questions about India and I can answer them, I'm not treated differently than anyone else because I'm from India. When I have children, I'll tell them all the things I've learned from P.I.C., especially from the Indian people in the community."

#### ST. PAUL NEEDS "SISTER CITY" IN INDIA:

During a recent meeting with the Board of Directors of The India Club of Minnesota Mr. William Wilson, President, City Council of Saint Paul requested assistance in identifying a city in India that could eventually become a "sister city" with the City of Saint Paul.

The India Club of Minnesota requests all Asian Indians in the Twin Cities to identify any city in India that could become a sister city with the city of Saint Paul. General guidelines that should be kept in perspective are as follows: the city should be a medium size city in India with schools, colleges, museums, theaters, commerce and industry that are similar to Saint Paul. For example, the city of Saint Paul established a sister city relationship with the City of Nagasaki, Japan in

Some of the by-products of a sister city relationship between Saint Paul and a city in India will be the establishment of exchange of arts, culture and official visits by city officials from India to Saint Paul and vice versa. 

Of course, thanks are due to Shanti Shah for her attention to detail and for her open ear in listening to all our various views.







#### A Visit from the Ambassador

The Twin Cities' Asian Indian community has hosted diplomats from India in the past, but His Excellency Abid Hussain, Ambassador to the U.S. from India was exceptional in his substance and truthfulness. Mr. Hussain spoke to an audience of about 90 of us at a dinner reception at the Minneapolis Radisson Plaza Hotel on the evening of March 16. #### WHAT MY FRIENDS THINK OF MY BEING AN INDIAN by Jaicy Cherucheril, age 15



My fellow classmates and friends mainly regard my Indian nationality as being unique. They like the thought of my being from a far away, exotic country. They presume that I know another language, so they're anxious to hear some of the words or phrases from my native tongue. I, being amused by their curiosity, announce a few words and sentences, in which they become puzzled, but still urge for more.

Because I am from India, my friends also want to know why we wear, as they state, "those red dots on our forehead". I tell them it's used as an accessory, similar to earrings or rings. Although they think it's rather peculiar, they respect our choices. A particular friend of mine thought all Indians were Hindus. She was surprised I was a Catholic. I told her even though the majority of them are Hindus, others are also Moslems, Christians, or other religious followers. Remarks like that often irritate me and I think of them as ignorant, but at least I stated the facts to her. Therefore, being an Indian may be looked upon as a minority in the United States, but we are at most thought of as a normal family living our own like just like everyone else.



Festival of Nations The Festival of Nations was held in late April. This event, as sponsored by the International Institute of Minnesota, gave many of us a chance to work together to promote awareness of Indian culture. Students and staff of SILC and other members of the community participated in cultural programs, food booths, bazaar, and exhibits. India Club's participation was well received. Special Olympics The International Special Olympics was held in Minneapolis/St. Paul in July 1991. There were 35 athletes, 12 coaches and two delegates from India that participated in this program. To most of the members it was the first time that they had been to America. Dilip Malik and Pranab Lahiri planned a special award ceremony in which all athletes, coaches, and delegates were presented with a trophy and certificate of participation. Mr P.L. Santoshi, the Indian Consulate General from

Chicago, made a special trip to present the trophies and certificates to each team member.





Total amount: \$4307


The task committee will continue to appeal to businesses and individuals for their generous support of these projects. The committee has set a goal of \$6000.



The world's largest and richest democracies have had a tumultous relationship. The political side of the equation has often resembled a roller coaster ride. The alternating phases of romance and benign neglect, sprinkled with a dose of 'tilts' (to use Nixonesque) to one side or other, make for an atmosphere not unlike the one Alice fell into through the looking glass.

There is, nevertheless, a history of positive interchange between India and the United States that spans several decades, if not centuries. Arguably the most significant of all events was that of an errant Italian navigator who set out for India and landed in New World in 1492. The understandable error in navigation was later compounded by labelling the unsuspecting inhabitants of this continent with a moniker shared by several million of us half a world away. The result, of course, is that we go about brandishing prefixes like 'Asian' or 'East' before our national origin identifiers.

Several centuries later, revolutionaries(contras please note) dressed in costumes normally worn by the very same indigents featured in the Columbus story, decided to decant several crates of Assam tea into Boston harbor; thus sparkling off the revolution that created this republic. (If only Dukakis had known how far back the pollution of Boston Harbor started etc., etc..)

But, historical accidents and trivia aside, the Indian freedom movement received significant support from both Presidents Roosevelt and Truman. That this occurred despite the close nexus between the Presidency and Winston Churchill, who was dead set against Indian independence, is remarkable.

The intervening decade of the Cold War saw the two countries at ideological loggerheads, with the bipolar Washington world vision colliding with the winds of non-alignment emanating from New Delhi. It is nevertheless notable that the U.S did come to India's aid during the Chinese aggression of 1962. Democrats will be pleased to know that there are movie houses and other businesses named after Kennedy doing well in India today.

The decade of the 60's saw a close link between the two countries at a grass roots level, despite a cooling of governmental relations that hit the sub-zero mark during Nixon's infamous 'tilt' in 1971. The decade, however, saw the Civil Rights movement under Dr. Martin Luther King change race relations in this country, with the help of a page or two from Mahatma Gandhi's thoughts and ideas. There was also the wholesale import of Indian thought, music, yoga, and clothing care of the Woodstock generation. (If you think the 60's are over, just go to Anjuna Beach in Goa sometime and count the Strawberry Fields Forever!).

In the opposite direction was the flow of massive American food aid and the Peace Corps, that were invaluable in the dismal days before the Green Revolution.

As we draw nearer to the dawn of the 1990's, the United States remains India's largest trading partner. India's large trained, English speaking workforce, and expanding middleclass, indicate significant bidirectional mercantile exchange ahead.

But, dollars and rupees notwithstanding, the fact remains that there is a tremendous commanality in the fundamental belief in the human spirit, and its infinite capacity to fashion a better world.

Therein lies the promise—

# Book review by Victor B

Mix arrid deserts, towering mountains and plateaus, to the rich cultural mileau of the most populous nation on earth, season with keen insights into the human condition and serve. The delightful result is *From Heaven Lake* by Vikram Seth (his previous book was Golden Gate), winner of prestigious Booker prize.

While the book is an account of Seth's trek across China from Sinkiang, across Qinghai and Tibet into Nepal and India, the work goes beyond mere travel writing. The book also reflects Seth's inherent ability to relate to the many people he meets, whose cultural meanings are far removed from his own ethnic Indian background. It is as much a book about people as one about places.

The chapter on Tibet is particularly revealing in light of the recent revolt and suppression on the Roof of the World. Seth writes from an Indian perspective, offering his thoughts on the comparitive development of the two Asian giants.

The book is made particularly appealing to readers who know India, ranging from a desert rendition of Awaara Hoon to a chance encounter with an abandoned purple match box( the kind that is ubiquitous on the subcontinent) on the Nepal-Tibet border.

A weekend spent trekking along with Seth is the best frequent flier award around.





## Upcoming Indian festivals.

Holi - March 4: This festival has some historical significance, when it is celebrated with the advent of Spring season. People dance around a bonfire of the demoness Holika. Holika is believed to be the aunt of child Prahlada the son of demon, Hiranyakashipu, who would not accept his father as the supreme God but prayed to Vishnu. Holika tried to burn the young boy, who was saved, but she was burnt instead. The bonfire celebrates this event. During the celebration of Holi, people throw colored powder or color water on each other.

Jamshed-I-Navroz - March 14: This is the New Year's day for one section of the Parsis and goes back to the time of the King of ancient Persia Jamshed who introduced the solar calendar. The festival is celebrated by wearing new clothes and visiting fire-temples and make offerings of sandalwood.

Ram Navami - March 26:
Shri Ram's birth and is observed in homes and temples.

Mahavir Jayanti - March 31: This day commemorates the birth anniversary of Lord Mahavira, the founder of Jainism, a highly ascetic religion preaching Ahimsa or non-violence birth anniversary.



JAWAHARLAL NEHRU:
His Legacy to India and the World

Jawaharlal Nehru, India's Prime Minister, was a talented diplomat and statesman who has left his mark on many aspects of modern India and worldwide affairs. For instance, India's unique democratic-socialist-secular ideology was Mr. Nehru's concept. He is also responsible for the stability of India's government today, for he looked upon his office as a way to serve the people rather than a vehicle by which to gain power for himself. Furthermore, he determined India's non-aligned status. In fact, he was instrumental in forming the "Third World" non-aligned group of countries.

Another debt that India owes Mr. Nehru is the major industrial advancements it has made since independence. Mr. Nehru managed to turn a totally agriculturally oriented economy into one that is industrially oriented.

Today, India turns out thousands of skilled workers due to the extensive educational programs instituted by Mr. Nehru. Mr. Nehru truly believed in children as humanity's principal resource for the future. That is why his birthday is celebrated as "Children's Day" in India today.

Modern India owes many of its better aspects to Jawaharlal Nehru. However, he has left other legacies for us to deal with. For example, Mr. Nehru's consent to statehood based languages helped lead to the lack of a common identity in India today. Mr. Nehru's achievements in industrial development, though phenomenal, were unfortunately made at the expense of agriculture. Very little money was

spent on agricultural development in the first few five-year plans. As a result, there is widespread poverty in the rural areas and a constant influx of people into the cities. During Mr. Nehru's residence in office, India's stockpile of weapons was kept small. This led to loss of land later in the 1962 China invasion, and a land dispute with Pakistan over part of Kashmir. Unfortunately, Mr. Nehru's characteristic faith in people did not lead to a good result in these cases.

Jawaharlal Nehru was a great man whose dynamism and idealism set the patterns for India today.



INDIA CLUB MEMBERS LEARN POLITICAL CAUCUS PROCESS



Mr. Swinson was invited to do a workshop presentation on the political caucus process in order to familiarize club members with Minnesota political political caucuses which were held on February 23rd. On October 8, 1987 I introduced H.R. 3455 to authorize the establishment of a memorial for Mahatma Gandhi in the District of Columbia.

Although authorization for the memorial was approved by Congress in 1949, the relatively new Indian American community at the time was unable to raise funds for its construction. In 1982, the Indian American Forum for Political Education was established to provide political education of American citizens and residents of Asian-Indian origin. Today, this organization remains firmly committed to raising private funds for the memorial so that no expense will incur on U.S. taxpayers.

I am confident that many of you share in the enormous contribution by Mahatma Gandhi to world peace and human dignity. His non-violent approach towards political and social change represents a model respected by millions. In the United States, Gandhi's perspective on peace and the applicability of his pacifist approach had an enormous influence on our civil rights movement.

As a major figure of peace in our century, Gandhi warrants our serious attention, both for his ideas of nonviolence and for his courageous translation of these ideas into action. As Martin Luther King, Jr., so aptly said, "If humanity is to progress, Gandhi is inescapable. We may ignore him at our own risk."




# MEMBER PROFILE-







Indian Students At Youth In Government


The 1988 YMCA Youth in Government program was well represented by three outstanding Indian students at the recent session.

## 'Woman Seeks Long Lost 'Ayah'



Asha and Gillian, Middlelands, Simla, 1942

Gillian Ronson was 11 years old, daughter of a British civil servant, when she last saw the Indian woman who had raised her since infancy.

That was 43 years ago in Simla.

Gillian is married and living in the United States but tears still well in her eyes when she talks about "my ayah," the Indian woman who cared for her when she lived in India as a child.

"I feel she's a part of me," Gillian Furst says. "I feel a terrible inner distress that I have been separated from her all this time, that I haven't been able to tell her that I appreciated her kindness and love for the first 11 years of my life."

The Indian woman's name was Asha Bebe, but shortly before Gillian left India in 1945, Asha remarried a man who was a cook and Gillian does not know his name. Today, Asha would be about 72 years old.

"I love her," Gillian Furst says. "She is part of my roots in life and I feel a terrible loss that I haven't been able to contact her."

In an attempt to locate Asha, Gillian has printed up leaflets with a photo of Asha and herself as a child, and given them to Americans and Indians who are travelling to India. She is also planning to go on a trip with her husband to see if she can locate the woman.

"I have never faced losing her, even though I lost her," Gillian says.

Gillian, who is British, was the daughter of Harry Ronson, a British civil servant, and Accountant General in charge of the sugar supply, prior to Indian independence from Britain.

Gillian was born in Lahore, then a part of British India in 1933 and she and her father and mother, lived in various parts of India over the next decade. Her father was based in Delhi, but they spent much of their time in Simla. His last job was in Ranchi (in Bihar) and he died in Poona, now Pune, on September 13, 1944.

Gillian and her mother returned to Simla—the last house they lived in was Minorma, and in 1945 they returned to England where Gillian grew up.

Today, Gillian is a factory worker, living in Minneapolis, Minnesota in the United States, where she is married to an American journalist. And her heart still pounds when she thinks about Asha who she longs to see again.

"She was intelligent and kind and nurturing," says Gillian. "And she did everything for me. She changed my diapers. She trained me. The first words I spoke were Hindi. This was the person who brought me up. I don't know what village she came from, but she always lived with us."

Gillian remembers that Asha's first husband was Hashim Bebe who she divorced. Asha remarried a cook in Simla in 1942 or 1943...

"She was unusual in that she spoke some English which she learned from me," Gillian says. "She was extremely admired and sought after as an ayah because she was such a good one with me."

When the family moved to Bombay, Asha went with them. When they returned to Simla, so did Asha.

For a short period they lived in a house called Middlelands in Simla where a photo of Gillian and Asha was taken in 1942 when Gillian was 8 years old.

"My impression was that her (second) husband wanted her to stay home and have children," Gillian recalls. "She was extremely admired by my mother's friends and by my mother because she did brilliant embroidery. She was highly skilled."

At the end of World War II, Gillian and her mother were stranded in India. Gillian's father had died, and they had to wait some 9 months to return to England, because British troops were being given priority on ships leaving India.

Gillian vividly recalls the day she left Simla for the last time.

She and her mother were going to be picked up by a car that would drive them to a railroad station that would take them by train to Delhi, and then to Bombay where they would get a ship to go to England.

"We were going to meet Asha," says Gillian. "She was going to give me her address and I was going to give her mine."

But the car had to leave a little early.

"I dug in my heels," Gillian says, "and said, I'm not going to go until I see her. But my mother said we had to go because if we don't go this car won't get this connection and we'll miss the ship we've waited nearly a year to get a passage on. And I was virtually forced into the vehicle and I never saw her. I never said goodbye. I never gave her my address and she never gave me her address."

Forty-three years later, Gillian Furst is still searching for her ayah.

What Have We Done So Far - A Progress Report

We have crossed the fourth month of the year 1987. The India Club has been fortunate to get the cooperation of a large number of people in the community. Through their support we have participated in some noteworthy programs since the beginning of the year.

After the new board was formed, we promoted the Youth Festival in February which was organized to a great extent by our young people with the board members serving as mentors.

To name a few, who have requested and appreciated our participation, are The Children Home Society, Parents of Indian Children (adopted from India), organizers of the Ethnic Day Celebration, Compatible Technology Incorporated and some church groups. It goes without saying that we cannot thank enough to Indrani Mallik, Rita Mustafi, Shirin Friestad, Rajshree Puri, Neena Gada and many others who very gracefully display their talents with short notice on these occasions.

On April 29, we participated in in the Women's organization of the Asia Pacific Council. This organization is formed to promote fellowship and understanding and to highlight the responsibilities and needs of Asian women in our community. Indu Misra presented the role of Indian women and their contribution to our community.

We are happy to report that Hon. Ambasador P.K.Kaul, of India has accepted our invitation to come to the Twin Cities on July 18 to be our guest of honor at the Tagore Jayanti program. Our board meetings are held on the third Wednes day of every month at the International Institute, 1694 Como Av., St. Paul. You are welcome to attend these meetings and contribute in any way you can.


#### India Club Members At The Asian Pacific Community Meeting

India Club continues to provide assistance to groups such as the Indo-American Club, Children's Home Society, Parents of Indian Children, etc. and to interact with community leaders. That over 4000 people attended the India Festival at Landmark Center last fall is a tribute to the progress acheived by the Club and the results of cooperation between organizations such as the Indian Music Society. It is gratifying to watch a number of dedicated individuals discharge their self-imposed commitments in the spirit of camaraderie to promote the traditions and culture of the whole of India. I am convinced the spirit of ownership in the Club exhibited by these members is largely responsibile for the success of the Club so far.

Early successes such as these lead to loftier goals. I am sure you will approve of the ambitious mission undertaken by the current Board of Directors. Plans for the coming year include 1) establishing closer working relationships with local organizations of Indian as well as non-Indian origin, state and local government agencies, educational institutions, etc; 2) building the resource collection of materials on India; 3) arranging visits to the Twin Cities by dignitaries; and 4) expanding the cultural activites list by considering participation in the State Fair, the Winter Carnival, the Aquatennial, etc.

#### FATAL HEART ATTACK CLAIMS PHD CANDIDATE

Recently a fatal heart attack claimed the life of Sunderajan Ramamurthy, a PhD candidate in the Physics Department at the University of Minnesota. He was also the Past President of the University Tennis Club. Sunderajan was survived by his mother and brother, both in India.

The best in mankind came to the forefront on this tragedy. Members of the community and friends of the deceased all put in considerable effort and donations toward the disposition of the remains and settlement of debts. Raja Seshadri and an anonymous (by request) volunteer spent untold hours on the phone with local authorities, the Consulate in Chicago and with the family in India ensuring that the proper steps were taken in honor and dignity given the absence of local family members or written final instructions. Dr. Dixit performed the final ceremonies.

With no estate or instructions available, the community responded generously to an appeal for funds to defray expenses, with India Club offering to settle any claims forthwith and making up any shortfall. ADDENDUM: PREPARING FOR THE WORST

It seems worthwhile to comment on preparedness for such a tragedy, especially for the single members of the community who may not have family here to carry out their wishes should they become incapacitated for any reason. A contingent plan covering your wishes in the form of a legal document like a will, will assure that your wishes are carried out. To prepare these documents, plenty of help, much of it free, is available. The Legal Aid Society, for example, can help with a simple will. Life isurance agents are afountain of information and can help with writing a small term insurance policy to cover any expenses.

In those documents you can specify some good things, if you wish. Not that anyone would want my liver, but I am an organ donor, which is noted on my drivers license. Also, remains can be donated to the University Medical School with final disposition according to wishes.

From my experience there is one thing that is really important in case of death, and that is a final ceremony that allows those who know you to grieve and say a final goodbye. Your document should make provisions for such a ceremony.

Incapacitation or death are never easy subjects to address, but do keep in mind that you will help yourself and your friends and family by preparing. Even though one is healthy there are all kinds of things that can happen, from lab explosion to a car accident. We kill more people with cars in a year than the Irish kill with guns in a decade.

"Utsāv" is the Sanskrit word for festival or celebration; it is the cinema component of the widely publicized "Festival of India 1985-86," which is the biggest cultural blitz ever to hit the U.S.-an ambitious potpourri of the arts and cultures of India playing in 90 cities and 36 states and ranging from exhibits of sculpture, jewelry, calligraphy to dance, music, theater and film. Estimated total cost for the more than 500 events in this moveable feast, celebrating the 5,000year legacy of the Indian sub-continent: \$15 million, with the U.S. putting up more than half. (Time and Newsweek carried major stories last

FILMS FROM

(The surprising thing is that the Twin Cities has not plugged into the riches the Festival has offered, except for the film portion, which will be shared by the Minneapolis Institute of Arts and the U Film Society.)

The planning began in 1982 when the late Prime Minister Indira Gandhi visited the U.S. The idea was to try to reach cities and towns across the U.S., not just the ethnic India populations of major cities, Americans who have only a passing acquaintance with the "real India" tandoori chicken, the Nehru jacket, Masterpiece Theater and all those nasty upper-class Englishmen, the Oscared rendition of Gandhi.

The film tour is composed of two sections-a "Panorama" series of 19 major films comprising "India Cinema 1980-1985" and four big documentaries (the Nehru and Satyajit Ray profiles were included in the Dec. to Feb. flyer), and a "Profile" series, which spotlights the works of five directors considered important both to the development of Indian film from the Thirties on as well as artistically significant

in their own right. (V. Shantaram, a classic studio director of the '30s; Raj Kapoor and Guru Dutt, who represent "the golden age" of the Indian musical of the '40s and '50s right after Independence ('47); and Ritwak Ghatak and Mrinal Sen, who, like their better-known contemporary Satyajit Ray (The Apu Trilogy), brought to Indian films of the 1960's and '70s social and political concerns seldom found in the commercial In-

Because of intersecting programming among more than a dozen museums and film groups across the country, a sampling of "profiles" directors will be presented by UFS between Feb. and April. Their remaining works would be shown at June and July dates. (If you think you might be interested in any of the works of these "name" Indian directors, you should try to see one or two of their films when they are first shown in Feb. and Mar. You will then know if you want to see the rest later.)

India is the world's most prolific producer or feature films, as some filmgoers in the area may know, turning out some 800 titles a year. (The U.S. film industry-primarily Hollywood- racks up 250 a year by comparison.) Owing to the strong national character of Indian film, few of these reach the U.S. It is doubtful that even the knowledgeable reviewers in the Twin Cities press, let alone the faithful cinephile at the Uptown, Bell or Walker, could name more than one or two Indian directors on the shooting set today. For the ethnic Indian audience in the Twin Cities (estimated 5,000 population, many of them in highly skilled professions) it is a different matter; they are heavily into videocas-

(Here is a chance, however, to see Indian "classics" in beautiful, new 35mm prints or resee those famous films many left back home a decade or more ago. All films are subtitled in English, with original dialog intact.)

Film is by now the dominant art form of the 850 million people of India, evolving into a medium since its beginnings in 1913 (the almost-forgotten figure of D.G. Phalke, "the father of Indian film," set up the first studio), translating mythology, ritual, music and dance into the highly spirited and choreographed brew of Hindi (or all-India) films centered around Bombay. The power of film is enormous and filmgoers have been known to take off their shoes and prostrate themselves before their screen gods and goddesses. In the 24 states that make up the nation (16 languages, more than 1,500 dialects), movie stars more and more are becoming powers in politics (as in U.S.), regional filmmaking has been flourishing (there are "many Indias", so goes a cliche in the West).

Film-Utsāv India will be, thus, a window on a culture the realities of which Americans too long have ignored. The Profiles of five directors will introduce a more sober note to the traditional melodrama structure of Indian film. The Panorama series will reveal the most significant development in Indian cinema history, the emergence of what Indian critics themselves now call "the New Indian Cinema movement," stark and uncompromising visions of village and city life and new positions of women and minorities within the culture.-A.M.

Bell Auditorium (Bell)

Raj Kapoor

The key link between the unsophisticated, glossy formula films of the Bombay industry (girls running through tree-tops singing away) and the serious work of the New Indian Cinema is director, actor, producer, writer Raj Kapoor, who ushered in what critics have come to call "the golden age" of Indian cinema of the '50s and '60s. His own screen persona, introduced in Awara was a variation on the Chaplin tramp, a quick-witted simpleton, the criminal with a heart of gold. Kapoor was the Indian alter-ego of Busby Berkeley, Frank Capra and Chaplin all rolled into one and most famous member of the family that has dominated Indian show business for almost 50 years. (They are known as the Barrymores of India.) His films are deeply felt and "populist" protagonists in his tales of village and city poor are often the luckless poor.

Sat., Feb. 22 2:00 p.m. Shree 420 (Mr. 420) Bell

A mixture of high jinks and social conscience that proved a triumph in socialist countries (one of the songs brought down the house from Russia to the Fiji Islands, "My Shoes Are Made in Japan, but My Heart Was Made in India"). An honest country boy comes to Bombay in search of work and quickly discovers that honesty is not much of an asset in the big city. Raju (in the first half) is decidedly the Chaplinesque tramp underdog; in the second half he encounters the jolly have-nots, out of Capra's 30's social comedies.

India 1955/dir. Raj Kapoor, script by A.K. Abbas, b&u; 170 min., in Hindi (Eng. subtitles)

Sun., Feb. 23 2:00 p.m.

Awaara(The Vagabond)

This is the Raj Kapoor classic that made his name a household word across Asia, the Middle East and Russia. Kapoor stars as the abandoned son of a wealthy Bombay magnate (played by his father Prithviraj Kapoor). He grows up a

son of a wealthy Bombay magnate (played by his father Prithviraj Kapoor). He grows up a low-life and thief, but learns the circumstances of his birth when he falls in love with his father's ward (the beautiful and earthy Nargis).

India 1951/dir, prod. Raj Kapoor, written by A.K. Abbas, music by Ravi Sbankar, in Hindi, Eng. subtitles, 175 min. b&w West Bank Showings (Willey & WBPH)

Special programs, long runs are presented at two theaters located in Willey Hall (U) of M West Bank campus, next to the Law School and one block cast of 7 Corner business area): Willey Hall 125 on main floor, remodeled West Bank Program Hall (WBPH) on ground floor, east end. #### Ritwak Ghatak

Ritwak Ghatak (1924-1975) with only eight films exerted a profound influence on the contemporary Indian cinema. A native of East Bengal, Ghatak was shattered by the partition of that "orphan state" after the Hindu-Muslim riots of 1947 into the creation of Bangladesh in 1972. His films reflect the personal urgency of refugees whose lives and culture are forever ruptured. During his tenure at the National Film School at Pune he became "spiritual father" to leading talents of the "New Indian Cinema" (see Tarang). Steeped in the rich Bengali culture, Ghatak's work attempts a fusion of epic and archetype (the Mother image as a destructive and regenerative force), Jung and Marx.

Sat., Mar. 8 3:00 p.m.

Fire (Aag) Bell

Kapoor's feature debut, right after Partition, was seen as a breath of fresh air to Indian cinema. The 24-year-old director borrowed heavily from Citizen Kane and German Expressionism to etch a brooding melodrama of a theatrical producer who meets a woman off the street. Stars Kapoor and the seductive Nargis (the two of them became the Garbo and Gilbert of the Indian screen, commented critic Elliott Stein.) 1948, b&u; 133 min.

Sun., Mar. 9 1 p.m. The Mechanical Man

(Ajantrik) Bell

Ghatak's best known film and one of the seminal works in the development of modern Indian cinema, this is the ironic story of a taxi-driver whose greatest friend is his vintage taxi; a comedy about obsession. 1958, b&u; 102 min.

**E-Flat** (Komal Gandar) 3:00 p.m. Based on incidents from Ghatak's early life, when he travelled small villages doing plays, Komal Gandar tells the story of a young man whose mission in life is to reach people through his "People's Theater Group." Film crystallizes many of Ghatak's preoccupations: the fate of an exile (from Bangladesh), the meaning of patriotism in a partitioned country, experiments with sound and image. 1961, b&w, 110 min. (see also Ghatak screenings Sun., Mar. 23)

Stay Awake (Jagte Raho)

The populist Kapoor plays a down-at-the-heels country yokel desperately searching for a drink of water in the fashionable Chowrhingee district of Calcutta. This is the first Indian film to win a prize at an international film festival (Karlovy Vary, Czech.) after its first unsuccessful release at home. It often crops up on Indian critics' 10-best lists. 1957, b&w, 143 min.

#### Reason, Debate and a Tale Ghatak Bell

Ghatak's last completed feature and highly autobiographical, Ghatak stars as an alcoholic intellectual in the Bengali '70s scene, caught up in militant movements and the 1972 Bangladesh liberation (from E. Pakistan). Remarkable performances highlight Ghatak's own personal story with his estranged wife. 1974, b&w, 123 min.

The Runaway

(Bari Theke Paliye) 3:15 p.m.

Ten-year-old boy from a village runs away from the cruelty of his father and is befriended in Calcutta by a street peddler, once a school teacher. Eventually, the boy returns and tells his father what city life is really like. Ghatak, 1959, b&u; 123 min.

Sat., March 29 3:00 p.m.

Boot Polish Kapoor Bell

Kapoor teamed up with "leftist" writer A.K. Abbas to pen and direct one of the great tear-jer-kers of all time ("Right up there with Stella Dallas and Les Miserables" – Stein) in a story of a destitute brother and sister and an eccentric bootlegger, played by the late Jewish character actor from India, David Abraham. Film was patterned after DeSica's Italian masterpiece, Sboesbine; set in Bombay. "Seven-year-old Baby Nazz and Ratan Kumar are remarkable as the slum kids" – Stein. 1954, b&w. 131 min.

Wages and Profits (Tarang)

Described as kind of an Indian "Diary of a Chambermaid," this story of two women (widely diverging in class background) in the household of an industrial tycoon is a multi-levelled exploration of Indian epic and archetype story-telling form, from myth in the Vedas to power struggles of the Mahabharata, by visionary poet/director Kumar Shahani, who is considered the heir and disciple of Ritwak Ghatak. (Shahani, 45, spent the late '60s studying film in France and as an assistant to Robert Bresson). Amol Pelekar, Smita Patil and Girish Karnad star in the film. 1985, color, 171 min.

Sun., Apr. 6 5:00 p.m. Holi (Festival of Fire)

The Indian festival of fire, Holi, the traditional spring holiday involving ritual sacrifice for good crops, gets turned on its head when a student rebellion breaks out in an overcrowded high school during a tour by a visiting administrator. Director Ketan Mehta (his Brechtian Bhavni Bhavai was seen here in our '81 India season) borrows from some of his European mentors (Godard in particular) in this psychological probe of contemporary Indian youth. Ardh Satya (Half-Truth) Bell

Police corruption has moved to the fore and out of the closet as a taboo subject in India. This daring film by Govind Nihalani, a Mpls. visitor with his Aakrosb in 1981, bears a superficial resemblance to Dirty Harry. Om Puri stars as the idealistic policeman driven to take revenge when corruption infiltrates the force. Film took top Hindi feature award, 1984, and was called by many Indian critics "most provocative political film" of that year. 1984, color, 130 min

7:30 p.m.

Arth (The Meaning)

India's Unmarried Woman, Arth is the story of an actress (Smita Patil) who runs off with a film business executive to his beachhouse near Bombay. Film was seen as a sign of the once-potboiler Indian cinema coming up with "mature adult drama," which means subverting the mainstream (the "Bachchan" formula, after India's derring-do male star) cinema in favor of re-defining the role of women in society. (Kissing is even no longer taboo!) The fetching Shabana Azmi is the "wronged woman" in the triangle and Kulbhushan Kharbanda is the owner of the bed. Directed by Mahesh Batt. 1983, color, 140 min.

5:30, 9:30 p.m.

36 Chowringhee Lane Bell

An Anglo-Indian spinster (the late Jennifer Kendall and wife of Shashi Kapoor) teaches Shakespeare in a Calcutta girls school. One of her pupils, in love with a handsome young poet, needs a trysting place; she offers them her apartment in this "Checkohivan" love story. First feature by rising director Aparna Sen, daughter of one of Calcutta's leading critics, Chinandra Das-Gupta. 



## President's message

As we are midway through our third year of revitalization, perhaps it is timely to describe what the INDIA CLUB is and more importantly what it is not.

There are several fine religious, cultural and linguistic organizations that can meet your internal needs for a tie to the motherland-a little piece of the Old Country-as my immigrant grandparents would have put it. We are not such an organization.

The main thrust of the India Club is external in nature so that we can be involved in the mainstream. All the better to introduce ourselves to America and Americans to India. We have only two regular functions during the year. Both the Festival of Nations, and India Day are intended to present a small slice of our culture to our countrymen of different national origins.

We are in the process of adding more such activities, for example building up a resource center for teaching aids, participation in other community events such as Aquatennial, and a continuing interest in cooperating with the civic mainstream of Minnesota.

Scholarship, in the bilateral sense, is a cornerstone of our charter. The club hopes to be able to help bright students without minimum means obtain a fitting education, whether it be the American wishing to study in India or whether it is one of our own progeny in the years to come when our socioeconomic profile more nearly approximates that of the community in general.

Let's look at what we are not. The Indian Music Society and Natyakala can produce and stage music and dance in superlative fashion. While we can act as a forum for several groups to undertake a performance of enormous scale, we are not a producer of cultural events.

We are not a religious organization. Again, there are several that do an outstanding job. Nor are we a school. SILC and other avenues of instruction in the language and arts of India are available to you.

Is it important to have that interface to the community of the United States? Ask a Jew that survived the Holocaust. Ask an Indian whose family had resided in Africa for generations. You will get from your own self the answer to the above question.

Is it important to be in the mainstream? Ask your children, if they are in their early teens or are older, what their nationality is.

Won't you join us? We can offer you an avenue to expand your horizons and some hard work with an outstanding cross section of colleagues.

#### FESTIVAL OF INDIA

To give you some idea about these activities let me quote from the April 1985 of the National Geographic Magazine. In May the National Gallery of Art Washington, D.C. will open exhibition, "The Sculpture of India:3000 B.C-1300 A.D" This event will lead off an 18-month Festival of India in the United States, perhaps the largest program of its The festival art, music, drama, dance, film, and crafts to scores of institutions in this country, including New York's Metropolitan and Lincoln Center, Washington's Smithsonian Institution and Center, the Cleveland Museum of Art, and the Asian Art Museum of San Fransisco.....

The festival will also bring to this country 150 scholars and academicians, 40 films, displays of modern scientific achievements, living folk arts, puppeteers, magicians, displays of village life-all to depict the variety and richness of modern India

The India Club and the Indian Music Society of Minnesota have been working together to collect as much information as possible about the details activities in order to arrange some of them in the Twin Cities. Though our plans are still sketchy, we have been able to reserve the Landmark Center, St. Paul on September 8,1985 for organizing some program of a concert, exhibit and food. 

## President's message

As my term as President of the India Club comes to an end, it is gratifying to look back at the last two years' progress and look forward to the future. The events of the last two years are well enough known, ranging from India Day, to getting interviews with our congressional delegation for voicing our opinion on the Simpson-Mazzoli Bill. Some activities have been of a service nature and some of a cultural nature. Like any other group, we have sometimes veered away from our main mission of being a service organization and of developing a scholarship fund. Two years ago our treasury had only a meager operating capital. Now there are enough funds to think about isolating the scholarship funds and starting to invest those funds. Our membership, which we have not pressed actively, approaches 75 or so families, and that I hope will rise more rapidly in the future.

It has been a privilege for me to serve the last two years. All the activities of the club, from their conception through execution, are the direct results of the efforts of some very talented people that have worked hard to serve both the Indian community and the broader community of our city, state, and nation. My own role in these activities was minor compared to theirs. If I were to thank each of those that contributed so much here, this newsletter would need another ten pages. Those same people will continue to serve and a few bright young people are joining to bring new viewpoints

and talents to the club.

Now, I'd like to look to the future and your involvement in the club. First, this is an outward looking service club. We are not here to sponsor professional music and dance. Events have proved that the Indian Music Society is very accomplished at such cultural events and our role should be only supportive. More recently a new association, Natyakala, has also made its mark to foster South Asian dance. Social events are ably handled by each of several clubs and our role there should also be only supportive.

The India Club can best serve by hewing closely to our published long range goals of educational funding by scholarships; interfacing with the broader community to present Indians as Americans, and India as a fellow democracy, not an adversary; and to share that rich 5000 or more years of heritage with our

neighbors of other heritages.

Now the avenue to those ends is involvement-your involvement. As one of the board members put it, "Let's not become an old boys club, let's have new blood and youth in the club to direct it!" It's good advice, and the broader the base of activities, the broader and more complete the abilities of the club.

The club works by consensus and your consensus counts!

Let's put some numbers to that concept of volunteerism. Let's say that each of the two thousand families here adds an hour of work for the community each week for each member of the family. How many manhours is that? Let's also say that each member of those families puts away the price of a coke each day for community service. How much would that total in a year? Would the combination of the manhours and the funds bring within reach some of the projects you hold dear?

As the new board takes over, I am looking forward to you becoming an active member of the club, with its modest dues of \$10.00 per family, \$5.00 per individual, gratis to students, and contributing your talents to the club and the community.

Thank you for the last two years.

INDIAN COMMUNITY SPONSORS GANDHI MEMORIAL: A remembrance evening in honor of the late Mrs. Indira Gandhi was held at the International Institute on Sunday, November 18, 1984. Friends of the community who spoke in honor of Mrs. Gandhi were Marlene Johnson, the lieutenant governor of Minnesota, John Derus of the Hennepin County Board and a former Peace Corps volunteer in Haryana, Dr. Paul Singh, an elder of the Sikh community, Dr. Rao, Anita Raturi, Preeti Mathur, Sabir Hasan, and Dr. Raj Dutt. The central theme by all the speakers was that of conciliation and responsibility to the democracy in India.

The people of India are struggling to overcome the shock of the death of Mrs. Gandhi and of the innocent people that followed. And now the tragedy at Bhopal stares at us. Nothing can redeem the lives that were lost and suffering that was borne. But one could look to the future with courage to overcome the obstacles.





In this short period of time the club has attracted several energetic members and has organized programs and initiated projects which indeed should guarantee continued vitality. Our long range plan is in place which includes a scholarship fund, a resource center, a directory (with a special section of businessmen, professionals and artists). The underlying theme is to provide a means whereby several segments of our Indian Community can join together for a specific project that no one segment can accomplish on its own.

Committees are also formed for specific projects.

## **CLUB ACTIVITIES**

#### INDIA CLUB SPONSORS INDIA DAY

October 2, 1983 was the first full day program of the India Club, celebrating Gandhi's birthday. The Governor of Minnesota, the mayors of the Twin Cities, the Hennepin County Board and the City Council of Minneapolis declared

the day "Gandhi Day".

Over 800 people attended a wide variety of cultural and culinary delights of India. Dance, music, food, exhibits, slides, movies and games presented an excellent picture of the rich Indian heritage to attendees at the International Institute that day, from morning till evening. This has been decided as an annual event and this year "India Day" will be on October 6.

#### CHILDREN'S HOME SOCIETY SEEKS INFORMATION

Members of the India Club following the lead of other members of our community have given generously of their time to educate prospective and past adoptive parents who are bringing children from India. Activities have included panel members, providing lunches, and planning activities. Dr. Saxena reviewed the considerable political accomplishments of the AIA.

Over the first few months of the year, several members of the club and others in the community visited several members of Congress, and responded with others to pass on the consensus of the community in opposition to the Simpson-Mazzoli legislation in Congressional committee last year. All the politicians contacted gave us a courteous and attentive reception.

#### INDO AMERICAN ASSOCIATION AND INDIA CLUB COHOST INDEPENDENCE DAY PICNIC

With the India Club providing the food and the site, and the IndoAmerican Association providing the rest, a festive Independence Day picnic was held at Wirth Park in August. The event will be repeated this year at Bassett Creek on August 18, 1984 noon to six.

#### FESTIVAL OF NATIONS

This year Santi Shah from India Club coordinated the representation of India at the festival which was in the last weekend of April. If those who have not attended the festival look at the items from India, they would realize what a mammoth affair the festival was because we were only one among 50-odd nations who participated.

Food Booth: An extremely successful menu of sheek kabob, rice, pakodas, and mango shakes at the Festival of Nations kicked off the India Club Scholarship Fund with a substantial deposit. The cafe also featured the help of almost all parts of the community to prepare, sell, and serve the food at

the cafe. Two "supersalesmen", and a good crew made a reputation for fast and courteous service of excellent food with a sense of humor to reach as far as the St. Paul paramedics and other Americans who visited the stall. At times customers were seven deep at the stall.

Exhibition Booth: Preeti Mathur coordinated the presentation and originated this year's theme the "Cuisine of India'. She proclaimed "Here is our chance to dispel the 'curry myth' and explain to the visitors that Indian cuisine is as diverse as the country itself." And there were spices, dry food goods, grains, cooking utensils, serving vessels, vibrant pictures of vegetables and cooked dishes, all arranged to transport you to another world. It was a feast for the eyes, to look at the raw materials and equipment for feasts. It drew numerous people and was hailed as the most informative and for its exquisite design.

The Cabaret area entertainment consisted of classical dances by Aparna Ramaswami, Geeta Seshaiyer, harvest dance by children from SILC and raas by Gujarati Samaj. Rani Ramaswany arranged an adult folk program in the entertainment area. In the Demonstration Booth, SILC children guided by Anju Relan presented yoga postures; Reena Patel and Lisa Gada thrilled people by their exposition of the art of sari-cladding. #### **KUCHIPUDI DANCE DRAMA**

On June 12th the troupe from Kuchipudi Art Academy from Madras performed the dance ballet 'Srinivasa Kalyanam'. Several associations joined hands with the leadership, initiative and verve of Padu Arimilli to organize this program. Many were enthralled. A success it was. Of thirty or so performances in the U.S. the artists themselves rated three cities in the top for planning and organization, stage facilities, fullness of the hall, size, response of audience and participation by Americans. Twin Cities was there along with Miami and Milwaukee.

## MINNI-INDIA

A revised list of linguistic, cultural and social associations.

BHARATI CULTURAL ASSOCIATION OF THE TWIN CITIES It is in the organizational stage. Initiatives for this venture are from Prakash Puram 375-0477 and Kris Balasubramaniam 941-3233. The new association, like its predecessor, plans to cater to the cultural interests of the Tamil speaking South-Indian Community.

GEETA-ASHRAM The activities of Geeta-Ashram are directed to the development of a fuller man, closer to God, devoted to the service of mankind through selfless work, in accordance with the teachings of 'Bhagwad-Geeta'. Monthly meetings are scheduled for the first Sunday (11:30 AM) of each month at the residence of families. These meetings include Bhajans, Geeta-path, discourse by a speaker followed by Arti and Prasad, Weekly Sunday meetings (8:30 AM) are also held which primarily focus on seeking the application of 'Bhagwad-Geeta' in our day to day living.

Children and youth programs are an important part of the monthly meetings. The children narrate stories and Bhajans, and present talks on topics such as religious festivals. The major project now underway at Geeta-Ashram is the development of a common facility named INDIA-INSTITUTE, to be used by all groups for their religious, social, cultural and spiritual needs. The facility is planned to be constructed on an eleven acre piece of land in Brooklyn Park. S. R. Arora 633-0076; Kunal Kamran 645-4827.

GUJARATI SAMAJ A non-profit cultural organization, Gujarati Samaj has a current membership of 116 Gujarati families. The Samaj's activities include organizing Gujarati dramas, Garbas, Ras, movies, variety sports and recreation including Cricket and of course Navratri and Dewali celebrations. HINDU MANDIR Hindu Mandir of the HINDU SOCIETY OF MINNESOTA through the past few years has become the center of religious activities in the Twin Cities. Weekly discussions on the fundamentals of Hinduism in both theoretical and practical aspects, take place every Sunday from 10 AM to noon. These discussions are based on key vedic scriptures such as Geeta, Upanishada, Ramayana, and also

on many aspects of Jainism and Sikhism. This is followed by Arti, Prasad, and community luncheon.

Almost all types of religious services from Namkaran to Antyasamskar are available at the Mandir. A small library of books on Indian culture and philosophy is also maintained. Indian dance classes are held every Sunday. Bal-Vihar, a special educational program designed for exposing the children to Indian heritage and religion is also conducted on Sundays. The materials are taught primarily through stories, discussions and audio-visual presentations.

Durga Pooja, Dashehra, Diwali, Holi, Ram Navami, Mahavir Jayanti, Krishna Janmashtami and Ganesh Chaturti are celebrated at the Mandir on a regular basis. Guest speakers such as Swami Bhashyananda-Vivekananda Vedanta Society, Swami Chinmayananda-Hrishikesh, Swami Chinmayananda-Chinmaya Mission, Sant Kesavdas, Prof. Puri-Nirankari Mission, Dr. Usharbudha Arya and Dr. Palvia have visited the Mandir on several occasions. Music concerts of the Indian Music Society are often held in the mandir. Several ethnic groups such as the Bengali Samaj, Kannada Koota, Marathi Mandal, Telugu Association, Bharati Cultural Association and Gujarati Samaj celebrate their special events at the Mandir. In addition, members of the Indian community use the Mandir facilities for Poojas, birthdays, vedic weddings etcs. With the objective of serving the religious, cultural, social and human needs of the Indian community the Mandir has become the focal point where the entire community could get together. K.S.P. INDIA CLUB In 1973 an association was formed to promote activities of interest to both India-born persons and native Minnesotans. This association - INDIA CLUB - is a secular organization and is without any particular provincial orientation. It has as its purpose the general advancement of the Indian community and the preservation of its national and cultural values.

In pursuit of those goals, the club has participated in programs of The Festival of Nations as well as providing support for the Children's Home Society. Members have met with Minnesota Representatives Vento, Frenzel and Sabo to discuss pending immigration bills. Work is underway to develop a Directory of Indians in Minnesota to aid professional contacts throughout the community. The club has also worked in cooperation with the International Institute of Minnesota, U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service,

the Indian Embassy and the Office of Foreign Students' Advisors of the University of Minnesota.

In its short history, the club has demonstrated its potential to serve as a forum presenting the many aspects of Indian culture to other international communities and Minnesotans.

Looking to the future, the India Club has established several important priorities and projects. Realizing the importance of education, the club has turned its attention to the specific needs of Indian students. About 40 students per year arrive in the Twin Cities in pursuit of higher education. To assist them, a scholarship fund is being promoted. Funding will come through membership dues, participation in the Festival of Nations and other fund raising events such as the State Fair. The needs of these students, however, are not solely financial. Many can benefit from the counseling of community members who have themselves survived the academic experience and are thus well suited to offer useful advice.

Considerable attention is also being given to the establishment of a Media and Resource Center. With an India-born population of almost 4,000, the Twin Cities abounds with professional and technical people as well as artists and scholars. From their ranks can be drawn persons to work through the Resource Center in presenting Indian life and culture to local schools, clubs and other organizations.

The goal, therefore, of the India Club is nothing less than the gathering together of the entire Indian community. It provides a means for sharing talents and expertise to the benefit of individual members and the community at large.

It can succeed in that ambition only to the extent that participation of all potential members is secured. Those interested in advancing the Indian community are thus urged to join in the India Club's work. Membership fees are modest. The potential returns are limitless. F.F. #### INDIAN MUSIC SOCIETY OF MINNESOTA

Indian Music Society of Minnesota is a registered non-profit organization supported by members interested in fostering and promoting classical music and dance of India in the Twin Cities region. Founded in 1980, the Society received a grant from the Metropolitan Arts Council in the 1981/82 seasons. Since then membership contribution and concert receipts have been the sole source of financial support. Eight to ten concerts are arranged every year.

Membership contributions are the most important resource for the continued success of the Music Society. These dues allow the Society to make commitments to artists well in advance of the concert date and arrange for them to perform in the Twin Cities area as part of their North American tour. Annual memberships are \$40 for a family and \$25 for an individual. Members receive mailings on all upcoming events and receive a discount for admission to the concerts. While funding is important, the Society offers an opportunity for additional support - volunteerism. Member volunteers who help in ticket selling, publicity, mailings, staging, ushering etc., are the life blood of the organization and its activities. INDO-AMERICAN ASSOCIATION A student organization at the University of Minnesota, Indo-American Association is one of the many nationality clubs under Minnesota International Student Association. Its activities are primarily for fostering cultural exchange. The association has actively taken part in programs arranged by the Minnesota International Center such as the Spring Festival, and has had the privilege of co-sponsoring several concerts with the Indian Music Society.
